The Other Side

The other side of the public power vs. private utilities question.

Professor A. J. G. Priest of the University of Virginia Law School recently said this about the Tennessee Valley Authority and its operations:

"As a matter of fair play I find it difficult to comprehend why the people of Tupelo, Mississippi, and Nashville, Tenn., (TVA consumers) should enjoy all the benefits of tax-free electric energy while my Virginia neighbors and I, and many others pay electric rates which properly reflect the substantial local, state and Federal taxes paid by the investor-owned companies."

TVA pays nothing in federal taxes, and only relatively small sums in lieu of taxes to other agencies of government. It pays no interest on its huge investment of taxpayers' money. That explains why TVA power is "cheap" — everyone in the country helps to subsidize it. It also explains why TVA is a phony and dishonest yardstick of power costs.

Private enterprise uses funds entrusted to it by investors . . . and sells the resulting electricity at rates regulated by government bodies.

Then like other businesses, it pays taxes to federal, state and local governments — on the average 23 cents out of every dollar in revenue taken in — a real addition to public treasuries that helps hold-down taxes for all.

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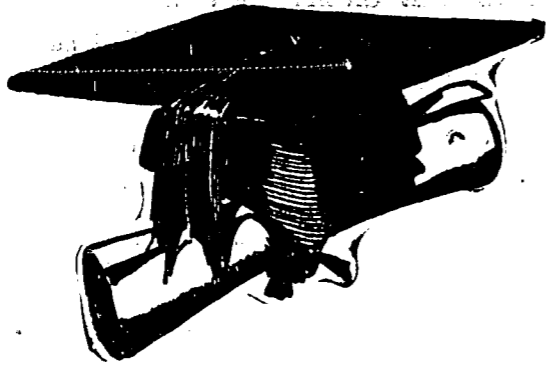

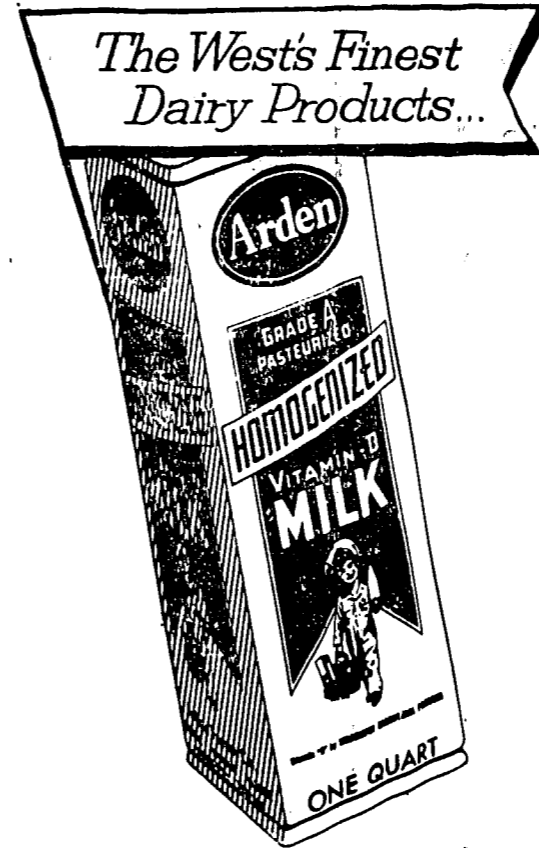

Little Known Facts
Seedless watermelons are likely to be scarce in Idaho for some time. Tony Horn, horticulturist at the University of Idaho extension service, says the supply of seeds is small. Most of the stock comes from Japan. Roland Portman, an insect specialist at the University of Idaho, says the best control for clover seed midge is to pasture or clip the first crop of clover to prevent the larvae from becoming adults.

Everbearing strawberries recommended for most Idaho growing conditions include Twentieth Century, Rockhill, Redrich, Gem and Mastodon. There are 56,000 horses in Idaho, according to the U. S. D. A. The number is less than half of what it was ten years ago, and dropped eight percent last year. Mules are holding steady at 3,000. Almost two-thirds of the nation's farms get a part of their income from

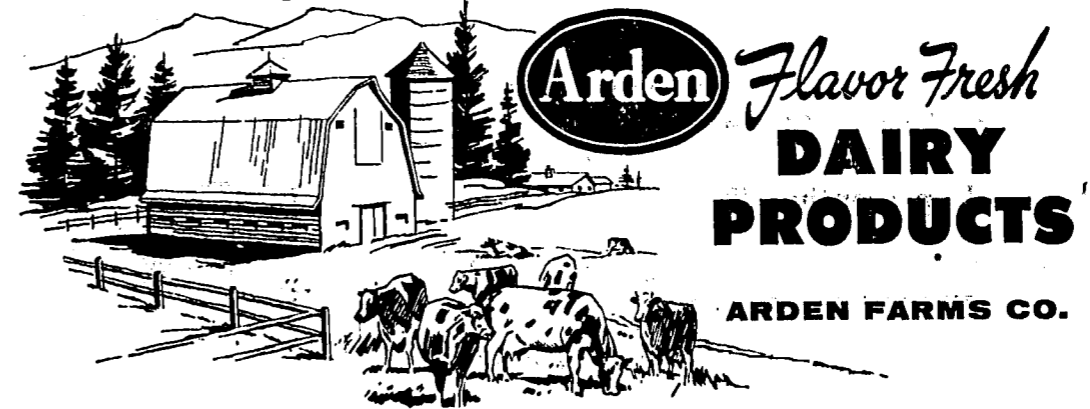

ORDINANCE NO. 107

AN ORDINANCE CHANGING THE MINIMUM METER RATES FOR WATER FROM THE JULIAETTA WATER SYSTEM.

Be it Ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of Juliaetta, Latah County, Idaho: That beginning May 20th, 1955, an additional minimum charge of One Dollar (\$1.00) per month for each user of the water system of the Village of Juliaetta shall be made to further provide for all expenses of operation, improvements, alterations, maintenance, replacement and depreciation of such works, including reserves therefor.
That meter rates for water are amended and shall be specified as follows: That the Minimum Rate for Water shall be Three Dollars (\$3.00) per month and shall entitle the user to six thousand gallons. That for each one thousand (1,000) gallons used in excess of the first six thousand (6,000) gallons the charge shall be twenty-five cents per thousand gallons.

That all Ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.
That this Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force after its approval and due publication, as provided by law.
Read first time May 3rd, 1955.
Read second time May 3rd, 1955.
Read third time and passed May 9th, 1955.

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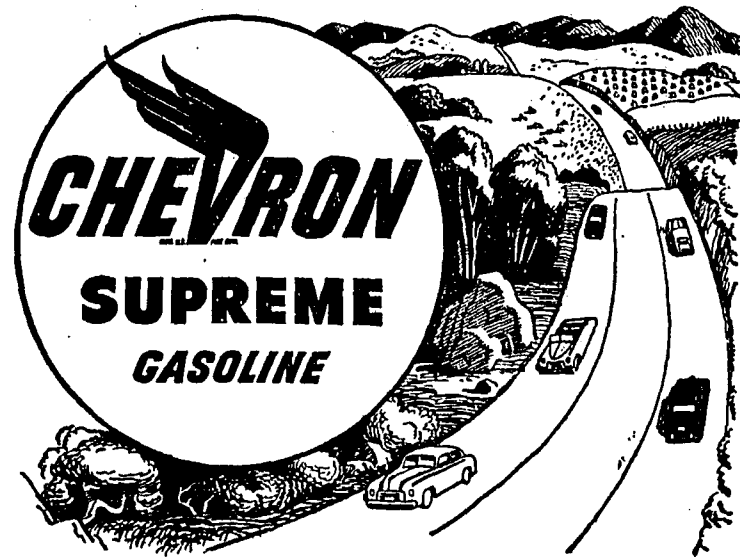
