Mrs. Nellie Goan, 76, of Kendrick, died at 6:00 p. m., Wednesday, Aug. 25, at the Gritman Memorial hospital in Moscow after an illness of 20 days. Death was due to the infirmities of old age.

Mrs. Goan was born Aug. 15, 1879, in Nebraska, and had been a resident of Kendrick for the past 40 years. She was a member of the Christian Church.

Survivors are her husband, Charles H. Goan, Kendrick; one son, Raymond Kaiser, Portland; one stepson, Charles H. Goan, Jr., Seattle; four step-daughters, Esther Adamson of Grangeville, Gladys Braimer, Chesapeake, Ohio, Marjorie Carpenter of Stevenson, Wash., and Zelma Goan of Amity, Oregon.

Funeral services will be conducted at 10:00 a. m. today (Thursday, Sept. 1) in the Kendrick Community Church with the Rev. F. C. Schmidt, pastor, officiating.
