Band Uniform Fund

The true figures are: Band Mothers' Club \$675.30. This money was accumulated by the Basket of Food raffle, card parties, gymnastic show, baked food sale and the cedar chest raffle. The Lions Club donated the proceeds from two Lions Club sponsored activities for a total of \$150.75. The Band sponsored "Freezing and Cooking School" netted the Band Uniform Fund \$104.45. The Cameron Ladies Aid donated the proceeds of a card party, \$25.50. The V. F. W. gave \$10.00, as did the V. F. W. Auxiliary; the Daily Idahonian sent a check for \$10.00. 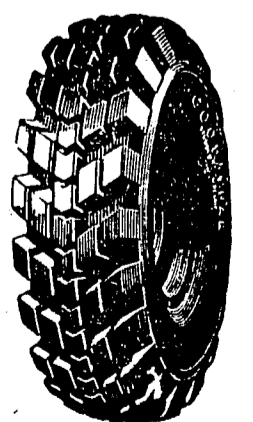
