I. H. Buckallew Dies

I. Herman Buckallew, North Lewiston cabinet maker, died Monday morning at 11:35 at the St. Joseph's hospital. Death was attributed to the infirmities of age. He was 74.

Mr. Buckallew had lived near here since 1933, and at one time carried U. S. mail from Juliaetta. He also operated a cabinet shop at Kendrick for a time.

He moved from Idaho to Seattle in 1916 where he married Georgie Denney, July 17, 1920. They lived there until 1933.

He was born Dec. 27, 1880, at Terre Haute, Indiana, and came to Idaho with his parents 10 years later.

Mr. Buckallew was a member of the Lewiston Elks Lodge, the Masonic Lodge at Kendrick and the Lapwai Valley Grange. He was a past patron of the Southgate (Seattle) Chapter of the Order of Eastern Star. He was a member of the First Methodist church.

Surviving besides his wife at home are a son, Howard, of Sun Valley, Calif.; three step-children, Pearl, Gilpatrick of Clarkston, Kenneth Denney of Lewiston and Bonnie Hill of Allentown, Pa.; two brothers, Dennis of Palouse and Oscar of Seattle; a sister, Mrs. Ben Weatherly of Lewiston; and seven grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be conducted Thursday afternoon at 2:00 at the Brower-Wann Chapel. The Rev. R. S. Daugherty of the Clarkston Methodist church will officiate. Burial will be at Normal Hill cemetery, Lewiston. — Lewiston Tribune.

MRS. WM. F. MCCLELLAND DIES AT PRINCETON, DEC. 13

Eva L. Wetmore was born September 11th, 1870, at College Springs, Iowa. She grew to young womanhood there, and worked for several years with her father in the post office at Blanchard, Iowa, a new town on a new railroad.

In 1890 she and William F. McClelland, her teacher, were married and went to live on his homestead in the Black Hills of South Dakota. Mrs. McClelland taught one term of school while there, and endured many Indian scares, because the Sioux Indians were on the warpath. One time — just following the murder of three cowboys by the Sioux — Mrs. McClelland rode twenty miles on a spirited horse, side-saddle, to warn her brother-in-law of an impending Indian attack. The horse ran away with her, but she reached her destination in time in spite of the incident.

Mr. and Mrs. McClelland and their two children moved to Florence Colorado in 1895 where they lived for a short time, then went to Ratan, New Mexico and lived there four years while Mr. McClelland taught school.

In June 1901 the family — now numbering five — began a journey by covered wagon across the plains from New Mexico to Idaho. After experiencing a number of hardships and adventures on the way they arrived three months later at their destination Southwick Idaho. Several moves were made nearby then the family settled down on a farm near Southwick where Mr. and Mrs. McClelland lived for forty years.

To be nearer their children they moved to Princeton, Idaho, in 1944, and Mrs. McClelland lived there until her death, December 13, 1955, at the age of 85 years and three months. Mr. McClelland preceded her in death.

Mrs. McClelland had an exceptionally good disposition, was kind, unselfish, and a devoted mother.

Survivors are: Three daughters — Lillian A. McClelland, Mrs. Wilma McAntire and Mrs. L. M. Benjamin, all of Princeton, Idaho; one son, Marion Paul McClelland of Nine Mile Falls, Washington. There are no grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at the Kimball Funeral Home, Palouse, Wn., with the Rev. Elton Hillard officiating.

Interment was in the Palouse Fraternal Cemetery.

Pays Huge Property Tax

Tax coffers of nine Idaho counties will be enriched by over a half-million dollars on December 20, when the Washington Water Power Co. pays the first half of its 1955 property taxes.

The first half payment for Latah county will amount to \$30,086.55, and when the final payment is made next June it will bring the total to \$60,075.09. This is an increase of \$9,496 and is over twice the 1945 taxes paid by the utility, according to E. W. Hatch, W. W. P. district manager, who will deliver the check to Edna M. Theriault, Latah County tax collector.

Altogether, nine Idaho counties will receive \$531,244.40 in first half taxes from the Washington Water Power. Total for the year will be \$1,066,

269.58. This is \$140,551.50 over last year and \$606,115.66, or 132 percent over the tax paid just three years ago. In addition to the over \$1,000,000 of property taxes, approximately \$250,000 in kilowatt hour, net income and other taxes on business operations will be paid directly to the state of Idaho, tax officials said.

Following is the amount of property tax to be paid to the eight other Idaho counties Tuesday: Benewah, \$12,382.72; Bonner, \$224,051.32; Clearwater, \$17,541.23; Idaho, \$20,913.71; Kootenai, \$93,905.81; Shoshone, \$35,040.78; Lewis, \$14,311.74, and Nez Perce, \$83,010.04.

Since each one of them has a long history of diligent service to humanity, it seems a real shame they can't be put back to work. Each of us needs one to take the rap for the petty annoyances of daily living. These out of the way, we could devote ourselves to the big problems.

According to the Childcraft reference library, our ancestors used the little people to full advantage. They let them take the responsibility of souring the milk, rattling the windows and creaking the stairs, and breaking Aunt Nellie's best china.

A nice feature of the little scamps, too, is their wide range of nationality.

Did your parents come from Scandinavia? Then you will want to select an elf. This pint-sized creature will live in your home and help keep the kitchen neat. If he occasionally cracks a dinner plate or burns the toast, you can't very well complain. That's what you want him for, to take the blame, isn't it.

Pixies are your choice if you have British ties, and there is a fine assortment of shees for you Scottish folks. If you are Irish you may select between the revelry-loving shees and the rather dour leprechauns, who, incidentally, are apt to ignore you as they spend most of their time making shoes for the shees.

If you favor France you will have to get along with a goblin. But maybe he's better than a German poltergeist, who is downright rowdy. He will cause no end of commotion until someone bakes him a spice cake.

Just a word of warning before you adopt one of these little chaps—they believe in people, and definitely expect people to believe in them.

Life Expectancy for Man Reaches 65-Year Average

Man once shared the life expectancy of a pack-donkey, but over a 2,000 year period has attained a 65-year average—almost rivaling the 70-year expectancy of the whale, the longest-lived mammal in the life chart.

But this increased age has drawbacks in the form of cancer, diabetes and heart disease.

The average Roman of about 50 B. C. lived only 25 years. Modern medicine and sanitation now give man at least 40 more years—and a greater chance of having one of the diseases usually associated with the aging of the human body.

Human progress up the life-expectancy ladder is something of a triumph for man, who is not too well endowed with protective equipment. He is the only mammal in the higher brackets who is without some form of protective armor. For example, he ranks with the whale, 70; the elephant, 60; the hippopotamus, 40; and the alligator, 40 years.

Domesticated mammals range in life expectancy from the dog, 10 years, to the cow and horse, 20 years, and the burro, 25. Lowest mammal in the chart is the mouse, who lives from 2 to 6 years.

"Breaking Up" Water

Water, which consists of hydrogen and oxygen, can be broken up into these elements by electrolysis. If two wires, carrying a direct electrical current, are placed in water, bubbles of oxygen form around the one connected to the negative side of the battery or generator, while oxygen forms around the wire connected to the positive terminal. Usually a small amount of acid must be added to the water to make it conductive of electricity. Also, if water, in the form of steam, is heated to a very high temperature, around 3500 F., it separates into hydrogen and oxygen. These recombine to form water as the temperature is lowered again.

Longer Life for Sheets

To lengthen the life of sheets follow these suggestions. Reverse sheets every other time by putting a bottom hem at the top. Cover bare springs with heavy sheet or sheeting to avoid snagging bed linens. And check all beds for needed carpentry. Put a mattress pad between the sheet and the mattress to avoid the abrasive action of the rough ticking against the sheet. Loosen the edges of the sheet until all around before stripping the bed. Use mild solution of bleaches and rinse thoroughly, or better still, let the sunshine do your bleaching. Always rinse thoroughly to remove traces of soap and soap powders.

Study Premature Babies

An instrument corresponding to a miniature iron lung has been used by University of Michigan researchers in studying premature babies. Object of the studies was to find out why premature babies breath irregularly—in gasps or jerks. The research has shown that the cause of this irregular breathing is that oxygen is not reaching the tissue of the brain center which controls respiration.

Four divisions of entry are "Cover Ideas," "Teen Headliners," "Picture Stories" and published news stories covering the contest.

Due to the cooperation of the newspapers in this area Notre Dame won the \$100.00 publicity award last year. They also won the \$100.00 prize for having the largest percentage of entries based on school enrollment.

Notre Dame Academy, a day and boarding school for girls, has participated in the "Extension" Teen Talent contest for five successive years.

What Will Be Effect?

What effect will the Pacific Northwest Power company's proposed power dams at Mountain Sheep and Pleasant Valley on the Snake river have on fish and wildlife?

That's what a special study launched by the fish and game commissions of Oregon, Idaho and Washington, and the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service aims to find out. Some 25 biologists, engineers and other workers are involved in the study project, which includes investigation of migration, habitat and numbers of sea-run and resident fish species, and big game surveys.

Pacific Northwest Power, which now seeks a federal license to construct two dams on the middle Snake between Oregon and Idaho, has advanced the necessary funds to cover the joint fish and wildlife study until March 1, 1956. What happens after that depends on what problems crop up, if any, during the study.

The generating firm, sponsored by Washington Water Power, Pacific Power and Light, Portland General Electric and Montana Power Companies — had located the \$210,000,000, two-dam project above the mouths of the Salmon and Innaha rivers in order to protect fish runs now known to be using those tributaries for major migrations.

Officials of both the power company (PNP) and the fishery group look upon the Snake river study as being "another important step" in the continuing research of fish and wildlife problem that exists in the Pacific drainage area where more and more hydroelectric dams are being built to keep pace with a growing economy.

PNP has asked to build a 255-foot-high dam at Mountain Sheep and a 534-foot structure at Pleasant Valley. The entire project would develop 1,446,000 kilowatts of new power for the Northwest. Officials of PNP said they recognized in the early stages of project planning that the dams would affect fish and wildlife, and had called on responsible agencies for "consultation and advice."

"This program is a result of conferences over a period of time," Kinsey M. Robinson, president of the generating firm, said. "We are pleased to cooperate in every way possible to find a solution for the fish and wildlife problems."

Seal Sales Are Lagging

Boise — Preliminary reports from 25 county tuberculosis associations show that returns from the 1955 Christmas Seal Sale are lagging in nearly half of the counties reporting. A. B. Wheeler, state Christmas Seal chairman announced this week.

"With less than two weeks of the five-week campaign left," Mr. Wheeler said, "we estimate that returns have reached only 40 percent of the \$60,000 raised last year in Idaho."

The Christmas Seal Sale is our only source of income, and our efforts to wipe out TB will necessarily be limited unless we have sufficient funds to finance our activities.

"Tuberculosis is not a disease of the past. At this moment it is important that we not interpret the decline in the number of deaths as the approach of immediate victory over tuberculosis. Such an interpretation could play into the hands of the tubercle bacillus, which would soon become as widespread and destructive as it was in this country some 50 years ago. The reduction in the death rate represents a battle less than half won against the dread killer."

"Lacking a universally acceptable vaccine against tuberculosis, the most direct approach to its eradication is to prevent the germ from reaching human beings. Christmas Seals play an important part in just such a preventive program," Wheeler said.

Aliens Must Register

J. M. Swing, commissioner U. S. Immigration and Naturalization service, reminded non-citizens today that they must report their address to the Immigration and Naturalization service during each January, under provisions of the 1952 Immigration and Naturalization Act.

The commissioner urged all aliens to go to the nearest postoffice or immigration office to fill out an address report card in compliance with the requirement.

Swing pointed out that willful violation of the Act could make an alien subject to a fine and/or deportation.

He noted that some 2,300,000 aliens reported their addresses under the act last year, and that the figure is expected to top the 2,500,000 mark in 1956.

Could We Use Them?

Thailand's use of elephants in logging operations has its good points, reports a University of Idaho professor now in that country, but he does not recommend the practice for Idaho forests. One reason: The elephants quit work at noon, and refuse to look at a log the rest of the day!

The professor is Darwin L. Mayfield, who is on a year's leave of absence as a Fulbright lecturer in chemistry at Kasetsart University. He is also a consultant on the construction of a new chemistry building at the university. His wife is a Fulbright lecturer in social work at Thammasat university, Bangkok.

Prof. Mayfield was shown teak logging operations by Kasetsart college of forestry faculty members. Included in the group was Sa-ard Boonkird, native of Thailand, who received both bachelor and master's degrees in forestry at the University of Idaho.

The bull elephants, some in their sixties, work industriously in dense growth where machines would be impractical, says Mayfield, but, once the sun reaches its zenith, balky mules don't compare with the elephants in quitting power. Then, too, there is another handicap.

The bull elephants don't like to work unless their families are tagging along. When a log is being moved, the forest sometimes gets a little crowded.

But the real slowdown is due to the density of the teak logs when first cut. The density is greater than that of water, and the logs can't be floated down a river until they have dried for three years!

Un-Popular — Yet Popular
 The new TV station, KLEW, at Lewiston is one of the most un-popular and yet popular stations on the air at this time.

In many of the "fringe areas," where TV reception is difficult, and farmers have spent large sums in the erection of antennas the new station on channel 3, comes booming in with such volume that channels 2 and 4, and sometimes 6, are knocked completely off the air. In other cases a "herringbone" pattern appears on the screen for channels 2 and 4, and an accompanying undertone ruins the reception.

For some, of course, whose ranches were so located that they were unable to receive TV — channel 3 has provided them with this pleasure — and so is very popular with them.

Here at Kendrick KLEW TV is being received on the Brocke & Sons cable system, but "arrives with such volume" that it is being carried on the big antenna "ladder wire" into the distribution system, and thence to the sets. It brings with it a "herringbone pattern" on the screen and

an annoying undertone. However, we are informed by Jack Kuykendall that when KLEW completes its adjustments, the cable system can be regulated to eliminate the "pattern" and undertone.

Ranchers in the fringe area are asking: "Why don't they use channel 8, 9 or some other further away so that we might enjoy them as well as the Spokane stations?" The answer to this is: "The FCC assigned that channel (3) to the station." It is possible that when adjustments are completed reception will be better. Who knows, if enough protest is heard, they might be assigned another channel.

In the meantime, Station KLEW remains un-popular — and popular.

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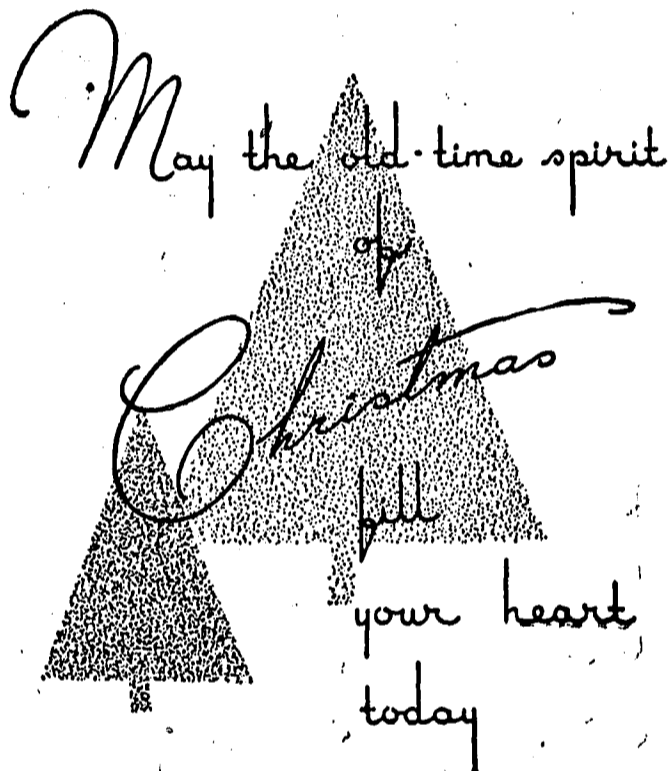

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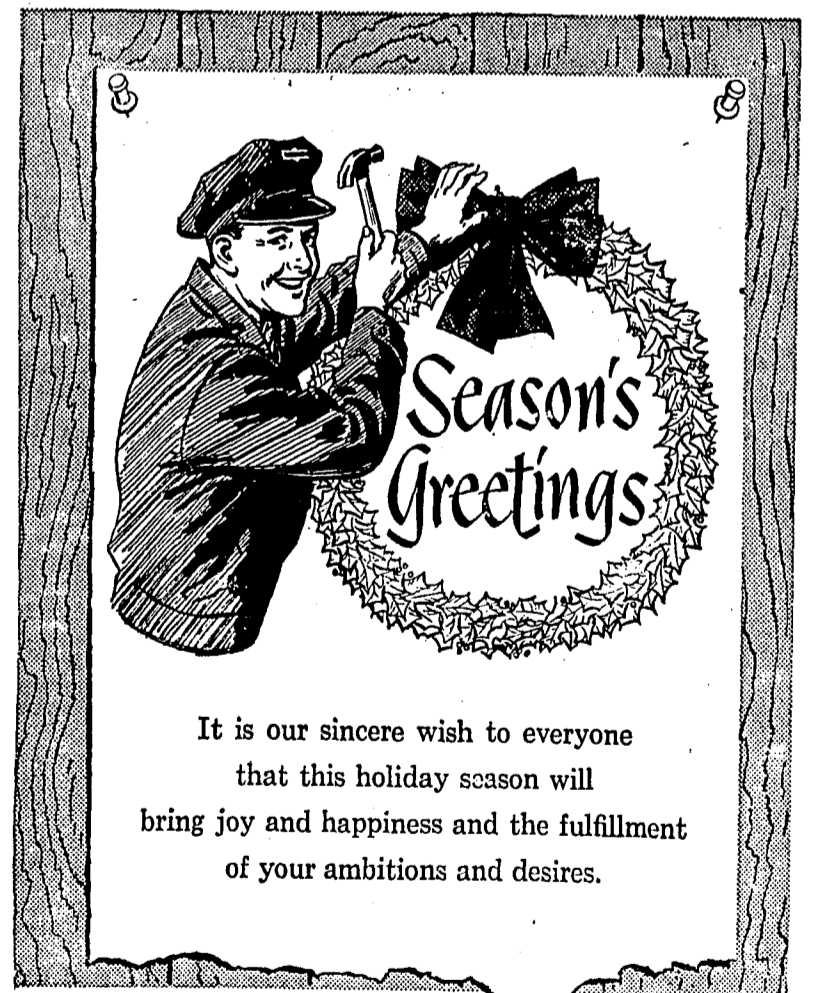
