### Fire Damages Lutheran Church

Fire damaged the interior of the Zion Lutheran Church here Sunday morning, two hours before the congregation expected to gather for the annual Christmas morning services.

A defective chimney was blamed. The blaze spread up one wall, through a false ceiling and into the attic and belfry.

Mike Hedler, who was caretaker, said he had started a fire about 6:00 a. m. in the heating stove to warm it for the services at 9:30 a. m. When he went back about 7:00 to check the fire, someone had already alerted the Juliaetta Volunteer fire department.

Smoke pouring from the upper part of the building had attracted the attention of others living nearby. The Juliaetta firemen had the blaze under control when an engine from Kendrick arrived.

No estimate has yet been placed on the damage. Mr. Hedler said, however, that considerable remodeling had been done in recent years and the cost of repairing the damage undoubtedly would be high.

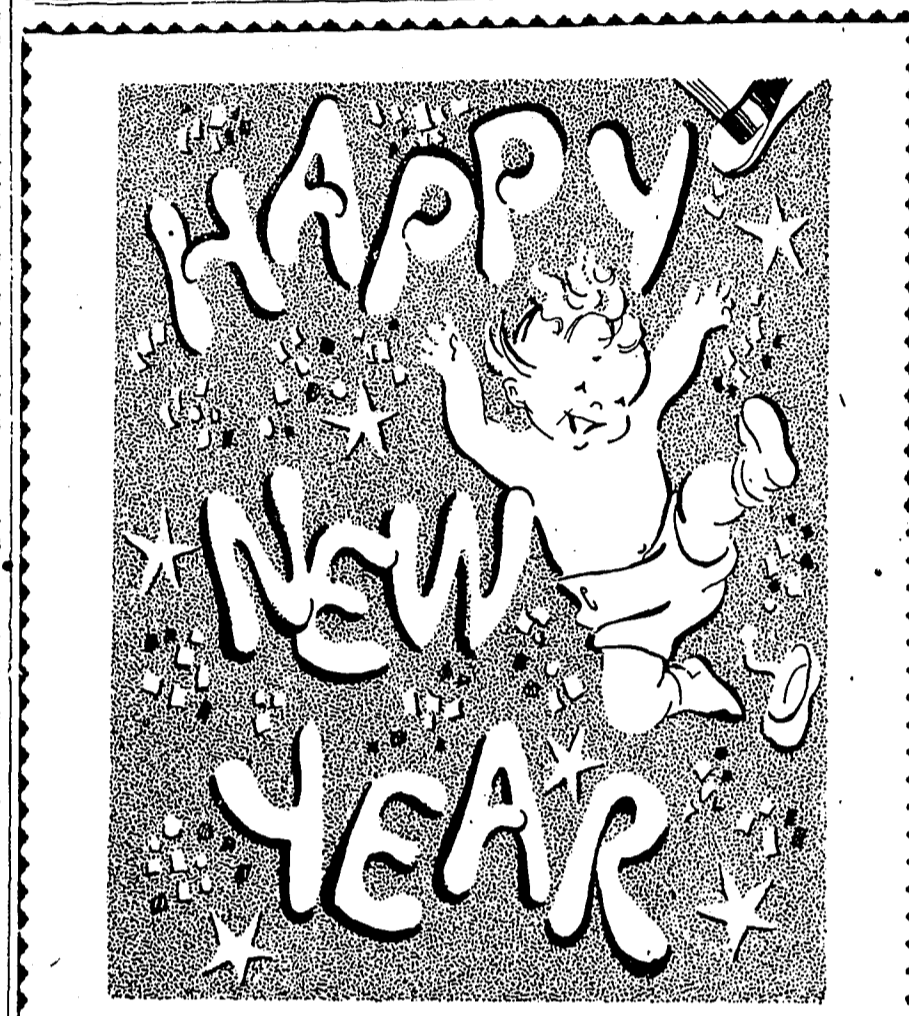

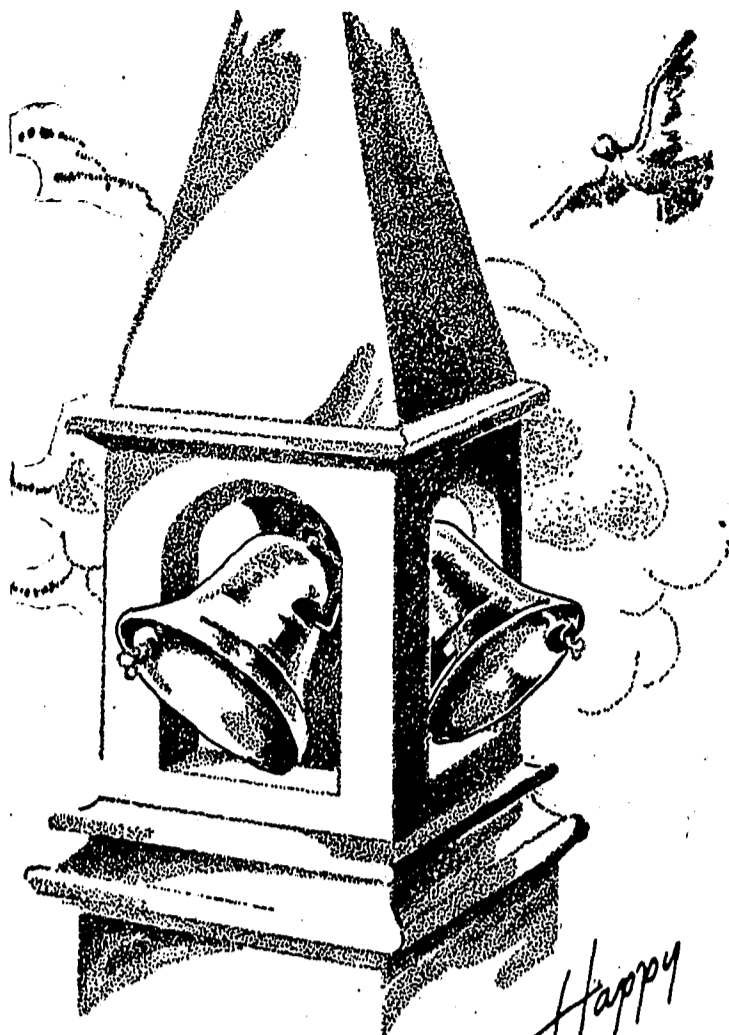

**OASH GRAIN MARKETS UNSETTLED; DEMAND SLOW**

Cash grain markets were unsettled during the past week, the Department of Agriculture reported. Wheat prices were mostly unchanged to 1c above a week ago, while spring wheat dropped 1/2c per bushel. Durum wheat dropped 5c per bushel at Minneapolis with the demand very selective. All white wheat prices were unchanged to 1c per bushel higher at Portland with the mill demand very limited. Oats and barley prices were mostly unchanged.

The International Co-operation Administration issued a procurement authorization last week in the amount of \$320,000 to France for the purchase of coarse grains.

A second agreement between Israel and the United States providing for the sale of surplus agricultural commodities to that country for Israel pounds was announced. Sales under the program will include approximately 90,000 metric tons of wheat; 80,000 metric tons of feed grains; 6,000 metric tons of cottonseed oil; 8,000 bales of cotton; 500 metric tons of cheese; 1,000 metric tons each of butter, non-fat dry milk solids, navy pea or Great Northern beans and 250,000 pounds of tobacco. Also an agreement between the United States and Brazil for the sale of commodities for Brazilian currency was announced. The commodities include approximately 18.4 million bushels of wheat; 317,000 bags of wheat flour; 56,000 metric tons of feed grains; 100,000 pounds of unmanufactured tobacco and 11,000,000 pounds of lard.

Wheat receipts at the primary U. S. markets totaled 6 million bushels compared with 5.8 million last week and 4.8 million during the same week a year ago. The CCC reported sales of wheat totaling 3,064,000 bushels during the past week, which left a non-committed inventory of 900,455,000 bushels.

Pacific Northwest grain markets turned slower the past week with movement of grains being further

hampered by freezing temperatures, snows and storms throughout the entire area. Scarcity of boxcars prevailed as in other recent weeks, and the country loading operations and movement of loaded cars was slowed still further by bad weather. Wheat markets were still inactive, with mills providing a moderate to slow selective demand.

Wheat receipts at the principal Pacific Northwest terminals totaled only 471 cars as compared with 597 the previous week and 571 the same week last year. The CCC reported sales of 571,700 bushels of wheat to exporters. Japan purchased two cargoes of Northwest white wheat the first of the week and were expected in the market again at the close for an additional four cargoes. Cash trading was very slow.

Pacific Northwest oats markets held steady with trading quiet. Bidding was very slow despite the limited offerings.

Pacific Northwest barley markets weakened slightly despite the winter weather, which meant supplemental feeding. Malting grades held steady.

**New Station Soon On Air**

Charles R. White, manager of KLEW-TV, Lewiston, said today that, barring a return of bad weather, the station will have test patterns on the air by next Monday. White added that KLEW-TV will run test patterns for several days to make necessary re-adjustments on equipment and will then start regular broadcasting.

Due to the unseasonable weather of the past while work on the KLEW-TV tower a-top the Lewiston hill was delayed. Work was resumed this week and the base for footings and guy wires was finished. Tower construction is now under way.

The studio portion of the combination studio and office building is almost ready for occupancy.

**Foresee Billion Barrels Jet Fuel from Oil Shale**

Jet engine fuel by the billions of barrels can be produced from the Green river oil shale formation in northwestern Colorado, Dr. J. D. Lankford, acting chief, of the United States bureau of mines oil-shale demonstration plant in Rifle, Colo., reports.

Low cost oil shale mining already has been found feasible, Dr. Lankford says, and he predicts that the present trickle of 100 to 300 barrels of gasoline and Diesel fuel from the formation will become a mighty torrent as techniques improve.

"It is estimated that 88 volume per cent of the crude shale oil could be converted into a hydrogenated product containing a premium Diesel oil and a high-quality jet fuel practically free of sulfur, oxygen and nitrogen compounds," Dr. Lankford stated. "If desired, the hydrogenated material could be converted easily to gasoline by standard petroleum refining processes."

"The United States bureau of mines oil-shale demonstration plant at Rifle, Colo., is engaged in an integrated research and experimental program to point the way toward the development of a tremendous natural resource, oil shale, for possible wartime emergency and for the ultimate peacetime production of liquid fuels by private industry."

"Billions of barrels of liquid fuels are potentially available from the oil shale of the Green river formation of northwestern Colorado. Research and development work will be necessary over an extended period of time to bring this great natural resource to the stage where utilization will be possible."

**Pocket Radiation Indicator Developed for Average Man**

An accurate pocket-size radiation indicator, so simple that the man on the street can learn to read it after a few minutes instruction, has been developed at the atomic energy project on the Los Angeles campus of the University of California.

The device was developed by Dr. George V. Taplin and Clayton Douglas of the U.C.L.A. medical school's atomic energy medical research staff.

It measures radioactivity by a color change of chemical solutions in small vials. The chemicals are inexpensive, and it is estimated that the instrument could be produced on a large scale very cheaply.

The vials fit into a compact case about the size of a pack of paper matches, which could be worn around the neck like G.I. dog tags. They also could be adapted to a pencil-like container for the pocket.

The new radiation indicator was specifically designed to measure large doses of gamma and X-rays immediately after an atomic blast.

It also lends itself to the development of important peacetime applications, says Dr. Taplin. For example, it could be useful in the calibration of such radiation equipment as fluoroscopes and X-ray machines. It might be used to measure radiation from radio iodine absorbed by the thyroid gland in treatment of hyperthyroidism.

**Origin of April's Fool**

It was the habit of observing July as the beginning of the year that is said to have started the whole idea of All Fools' Day. From its reputed origin in France, it quickly spread to other countries. We have such varied terms as the English "noddies, gawbies and April gobs," the French "April Fish," and the Scottish "April Gowks." While there are other theories about April Fool's day, the calendar story located by research librarians with Childcraft seems that when King Charles XI of France adopted the reform calendar in 1564, many Frenchmen refused to go along with the new January 1 New Year's. When they continued to celebrate on July 1, they were made the butt of countless jokes—receiving mock party invitations, fake gifts, and pretended ceremonious visits of congratulation.

**United Nation's Building**

Along the banks of East river on the Island of Manhattan between 42nd and 48th streets the Secretariat building of the United Nations is towering to the sky as workmen are rushing it to completion so that it can be occupied before the end of the present year. The structure will be 39 stories high. It is one of four units that will complete the headquarters as a "workshop for world peace." Contracts for the other three units have not yet been let but it is believed they will be completed during 1951.

**Suggestion for Farmers**

The average farmer spends 50 per cent of his time around the farmstead. This can be materially reduced by piping water to the point of use rather than carrying it. For example, consider what carrying water to a flock of laying hens involves. If the water point is 60 yards from the hen house, as it is on many farms, the farmer will carry approximately 10 tons of water a distance of 25 miles per 100 hens per year in addition to walking another 25 miles to the water point.

**The Price Of Electric Power**  
Socialized federal power is "cheap power" for only one reason — because it is tax-subsidized, largely or wholly tax-free, and because it receives many other costly advantages which must be paid for by the taxpayers in general.

The socialized power groups have been long saying that this "cheap power" is the key to industrial growth and employment in regions possessing major hydro sites — and that there must be more and more of these tax-supported projects, at a cost running into billions.

The Oregon Voter has effectively exploded that argument. It reports that in all the important fields of manufacturer, there are two alone in which the cost of electricity is an important percentage in operating costs — the aluminum and electric-metals industries. The average manufacturing concern in this country, the Voter adds, "finds its electric bills comprising only .59 percent of final costs!"

As every homeowner knows, the domestic electric bill is a small item in his budget — and he gets top value in the coin of service in return. It is vastly smaller, on the average, for instance, than his tax bill — which, of course, is inflated by socialized power with its endless subsidies and other tax advantages.

When facts like these get around, the socializers will have to start dreaming up new arguments. — Industrial News Review.

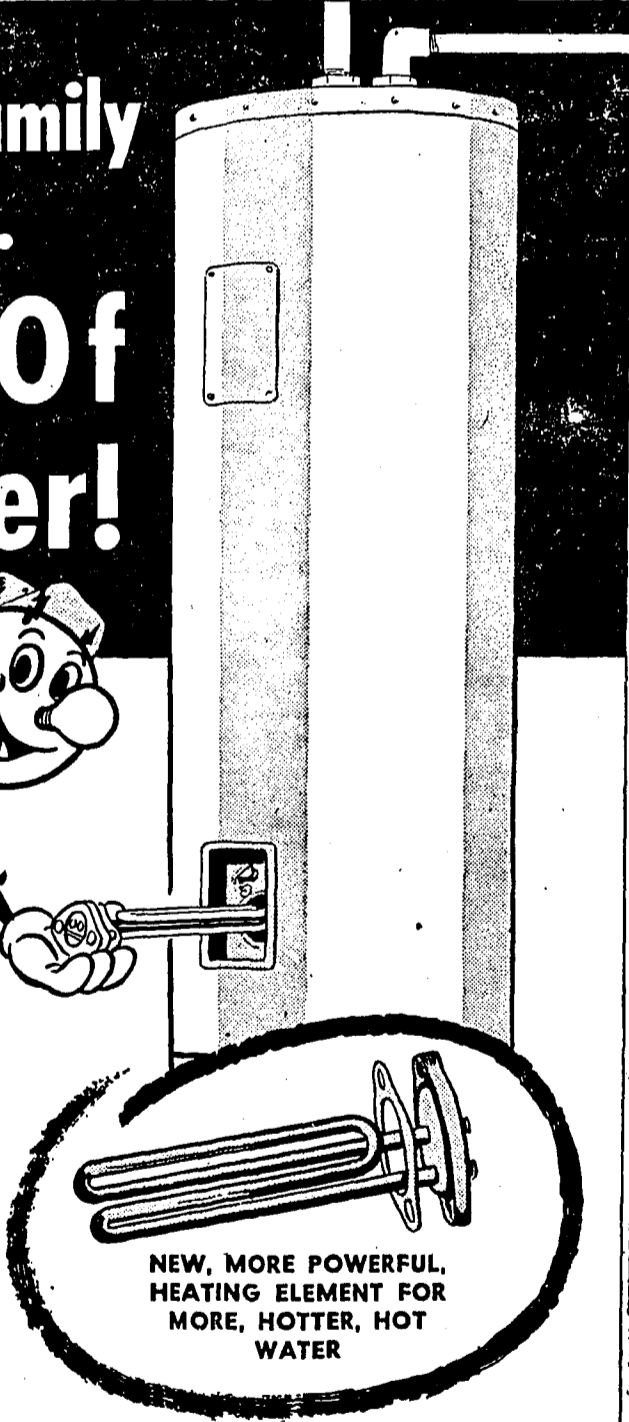
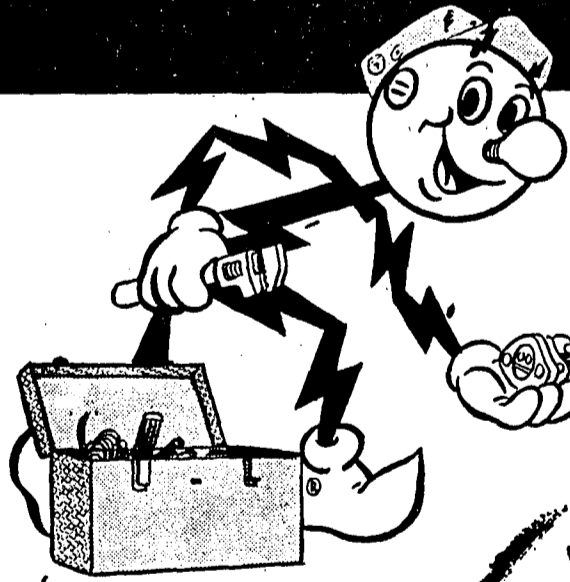

Many Trucks Registered Wrong

It seems that many truck owners are registering their trucks under the wrong categories, and can and probably will find themselves in difficulty later. Below we list a partial explanation of the new law as given us by Sgt. Shoemaker of the Idaho State Police:

"All trucks, common, contract, private carrier come under the 'Commercial Type' class of truck. Which means that all of these trucks, 16,001 lbs. gross weight must register on the ton-mile basis with the Motor Carrier Division at Boise.

"The term common carrier means any person which holds itself out to the general public to engage in the transportation by motor vehicle in commerce in the State of Idaho, of passengers or property in any class or classes thereof for compensation, whether on regular or irregular routes.

"The term 'Contract Carrier' means any person which under individual contracts or agreements, engages in the transportation of motor vehicle or passengers or property in commerce in the state for compensation.

"The term 'Private Carrier' means any person not included in common or contract — in other words, hauling your own products."

If in any doubt on which category your truck may belong, please contact Sgt. Frank Shoemaker, Idaho State Police, Phone 3-5485, Lewiston.

After Jan. 1, contact Officer Ed. Davis, Idaho State Police, at 3-4477, Lewiston.

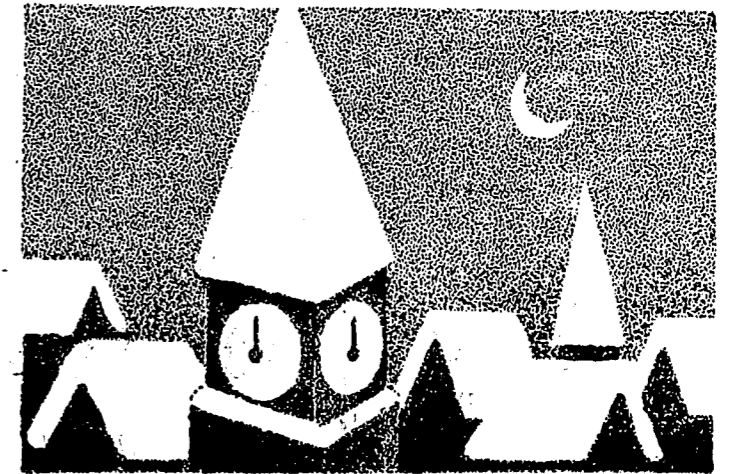
