## New Pump To Be Installed

Well equipment repairmen began work Tuesday morning of this week on the removal of the pump from the big municipal well at Kendrick. The pump will be taken to Spokane, rebuilt, an extra 80 feet of staging added, as well as a 25-h. p. motor, and the whole will then be re-installed in the well. The operation will take about 10 days to two weeks. This added staging (or capacity) together with the bigger motor, is expected to give approximately 120 gallons per minute. It is hoped that this will solve the summer water shortage problem in Kendrick.

**IDAHO POLIO FACTS SHOW TERRIFIC EXPENDITURES**

More than \$2,300,000 in March of Dimes funds have been expended for polio patient care in Idaho since 1947, and eight out of ten polio patients are dependent on these funds.

Polio treatment costs in Idaho hospitals soared to as high as \$150.00 per day in several instances.

The polio treatment centers receiving March of Dimes support are located in Idaho Falls, Pocatello, Twin Falls, Lewiston and Boise.

A chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, manned entirely by volunteers, exists in every county in Idaho — ready to assist all polio patients.

Since 1938, Idaho has contributed less than \$200,000 for research, professional education and the provision of equipment — with \$2,300,000 of the March of Dimes funds remaining in the state for polio patient care.

It is estimated that 1,000 volunteers are active on a year-round basis in Idaho, with this number growing to 50,000 during the March of Dimes drive. Only two people are employed in the entire state of Idaho — a representative and a secretary.

Over \$1,000,000 in March of Dimes funds have been spent at the Elks rehabilitation center for polio patient care since its establishment in 1947. In 1955 over \$41,000 were expended by Idaho chapters for the care of 60 patients in this center.

Since 1947, over \$1,300,000 in March of Dimes funds, raised in other states, have been sent into Idaho for use in caring for Idaho polio patients.

This past year six polio patients were using vital polio equipment in their respective homes in Idaho. This equipment, purchased with March of Dimes funds, cost more than \$20,000.

In 1955, the March of Dimes financed polio training courses for nurses. These were held in Twin Falls, Idaho Falls, Lewiston and Boise.

Two Idaho polio patients from one county in Idaho have cost their local chapter in excess of \$60,000 — a great deal more than that particular county has raised since the inception of the March of Dimes.

Many Idaho polio patients are still hospitalized from the 1949 epidemic, and the cost for several of these individuals is approaching \$25,000.

An average polio patient, when he or she reaches the convalescent stage of the disease, incurs a hospital cost in excess of \$400 per month, and that of patients requiring specialized respiratory treatment averages \$750 per month.

There has not been one polio patient in Idaho, attacked within the last eight years, who has not been aided in some way through the National Foundation's program that provide trained professional personnel, equipment, and improved standards of medical care.

Over 2,000 Idaho residents have been afflicted with polio since 1947 — this is approximately one case for every 300 people in our state — or one case for every 75 families.

**January 20 License Deadline**  
Section 49-116 of the Idaho Code, as amended, requires registration of all vehicles, upon payment of the required fees, to be effective as of January 1 of each year, and further provides that the "commissioner of the department of law enforcement may extend this date as to individuals, counties or the state for not to exceed 45 days for good cause shown."

Therefore, the registration period for all motor vehicles in the state of Idaho, is extended for a period of 20 days; thus, Jan. 20, 1956, is the last day on which 1955 licenses will be valid.

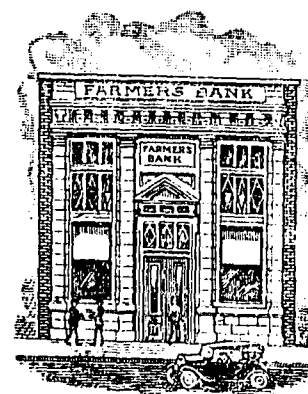

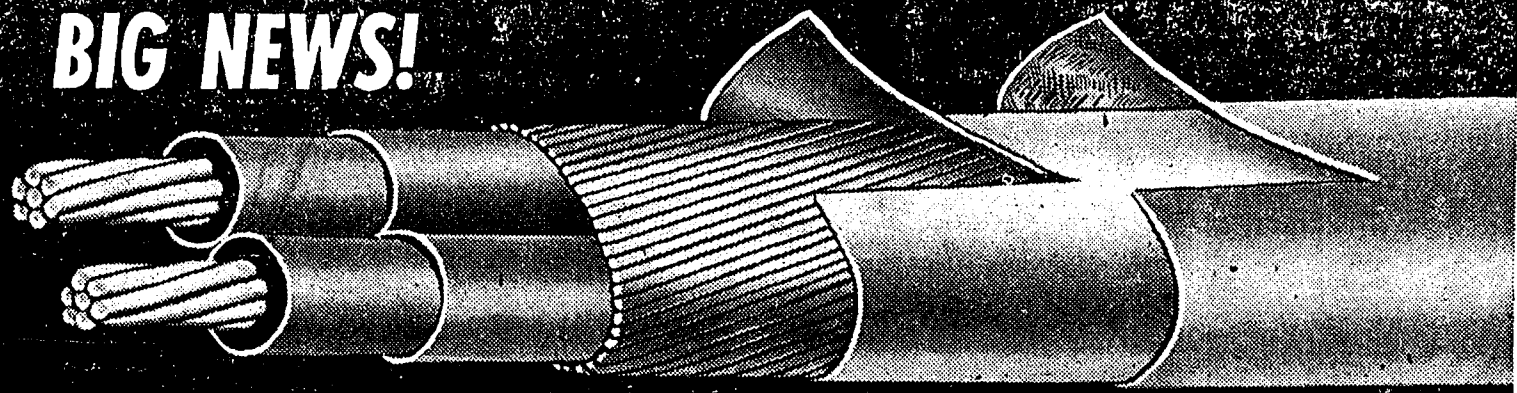
