## Five Ton Gross Load Limit

Owing to all frost having left the ground and roadbeds being extremely soft, Lloyd Craig, road supervisor for the Potlatch Ridge area of Nez Perce county, says that a five-ton gross load limit is now in force on all roads throughout Nez Perce county — and that it will be strictly enforced.

He calls particular attention to the fact that the "Five Ton Gross" limit includes vehicle and load!

On State Highway No. 42 (Kendrick to Spalding) the gross weight of vehicles is restricted to 3500 pounds per inch of tire width and speed to 30 miles an hour. The gross rear axle limit in any case is 14,000 lbs., and the front axle 10,000 lbs.

### Game Statistics

From the looks of the Tigers win-loss record in the score books, Kendrick does not have much of a basketball team. Statistically, however, the boys are doing reasonable well, foul shots being the big fall-back.

The team has attempted 440 shots from the floor and made 145 of them for a 32 percent average. From the free-throw line the boys have attempted 234 shots and made 118 for a 50 percent average. The Tigers have accumulated 412 points, with approximately the same number scored by their opponents.

Another factor which should be considered is the fact that the boys are not getting the support they deserve. The remark was made that:

"There were more spectators at the Culesac and Reubens ball games last year than there were at one of our leading crowd-drawing games — with Orofino, this season."

In previous years Reubens and some of the other schools drew about one-third as many spectators as Orofino and the bigger schools.

The following reports were given: Fund Raising: Eugene Taylor announced that the Fund Raising program will be held Monday night, Mar. 26, with a one-act play, music and skits to be produced by local talent.

Mrs. Wm. Cuddy, chairman of the Membership committee, reported only 71 members to date, and welcomed anyone interested in becoming a member of the P-T-A., not necessarily just parents and teachers.

## H. L. (RAY) CHRISTENSEN DROWNS IN CLEARWATER

Two men returning from a cougar hunting expedition were drowned on Sunday, Jan. 15, when their boat capsized in the North Fork of the Clearwater river 13 miles north of Orofino. Clearwater County Sheriff Fred Pomeroy identified the two as H. L. (Ray) Christensen, 36, and John Altmiller, 29, both of the Dent area.

They were drowned as they attempted to swim ashore through fast, rough water at the Big Ripple, 13 miles above Ahsahka and about a mile above the mouth of Elk Creek. The tragedy occurred at about 3:45 p. m.

Two other Dent area men, Harold Laves and Charles Masterfield managed to swim the 30 or 40 feet to shore.

Laves ran down the road to get his own boat, which was tied up downstream, to attempt a rescue. As he ran he reportedly looked over his shoulder and saw the two men sink in the turbulent water.

Neighbors in the sparsely-populated area helped set up a search, but a drenching rain and the approaching darkness hindered operations. Downed telephone lines prevented immediate notification of the sheriff's office. Bob Cole of Orofino, a passerby, reported the drownings to authorities at Orofino at 5:30 p. m.

The search was called off at 8:00 p. m. due to darkness.

The two survivors told this story: The four decided to go on a cougar hunt in the Big Island area and made the trip in a new aluminum boat Laves had purchased. They were returning from the expedition and had passed through the "Big Ripple" when two of the men reportedly tried to change seats in the boat. The craft capsized, hurling all four into the water. They got the boat righted and Christensen had managed to climb back into it, but it overturned again. The four then struck out for shore, but only Laves and Masterfield were able to survive the rough water.

Herman L. (Ray) Christensen was born May 16, 1920, at Southwick, and attended the Southwick schools. He had been a woodworker in the Orofino area all his life.

Survivors include his wife, Zelma, whom he married at Lewiston, July 19, 1941; a step-daughter, Shirley Ann, of Orofino; a brother, Don Christensen of Elk Creek; five sisters; Mrs. Betty Jo Roos of Lewiston; Mrs. Georgine Ware of Troy; Anna Christensen of Lewiston; Mrs. Lois Travis of Grangeville, and Mrs. Margaret Finney of Asotin; and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Christensen of Lewiston.

The bodies of the two men were recovered Tuesday afternoon about 3:00 o'clock, approximately 400 feet from where they went down. Funeral arrangements are pending.
