## JAY THORNTON, FORMER LELAND RESIDENT, DROWNED

Orofino — The body of a 45-year-old Peck man was recovered from the Clearwater river early Sunday morning, after his pickup truck plunged down a 57-foot embankment and overturned.

The victim, Jay L. Thornton, apparently went to sleep while driving from Orofino to Peck late Saturday night, State Policeman Bert McGinnis said.

McGinnis said the pickup truck Thornton was driving left the Lewis-Clark Highway on a slight curve about 6 1/2 miles west of Orofino. It traveled along the shoulder about 200 feet before plunging into the river.

William Gilbert, Clearwater county coroner, said death was caused by drowning. There were no marks on the body to indicate Thornton was injured, McGinnis stated.

He said the Rev. Ira Osborne of Orofino, who was driving east, told him he saw the Thornton truck move off onto the shoulder of the road. The truck plunged down the bank just about abreast of the Osborne car.

Rev. Osborne flagged down Alvin Deyo of Peck, who was driving west, a short distance behind the Thornton car. Deyo drove to Ray's place at the Peck turnoff and called the Clearwater county sheriff's office.

McGinnis said the truck was resting on its right side about 10 feet out from the bank in water 12 to 14 feet deep.

Officers called Tom Kiskila of Orofino who took his boat to the scene. The boat was used to lower a hook which caught on the door of the pickup. The truck was then towed to the bank, where it was set back on its wheels and pulled up the back to the highway by a wrecker. The truck itself was a total loss.

Officer McGinnis said the doors were closed when he arrived on the scene and that neither the windows or windshield were broken. Thornton was definitely alone.

Mr. Thornton was born Jan. 10, 1911, at Leland. He spent his boyhood in the Leland-Southwick area where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Thornton had a farm. He farmed near Southwick for several years. Since then he had been a woods and sawmill worker.

Mr. Thornton was married to the former Mae Davis of Cavendish. They later were divorced. He moved to Orofino where he was employed by the Forest Service, about four years ago, and to Peck a year ago. He was employed at the White Pine O-Mill at Orofino at the time of his death.

Survivors include four sons, Roy Thornton, serving in the navy at San Diego, and Ray, Richard and Randy Thornton of Orofino; two daughters, Beverly and Barbara Thornton of Orofino; his mother, Mrs. Cora Thornton of Southwick; three sisters, Mrs. Howard Southwick of Lewiston Orchards, Mrs. Bertha Clayton of Redmond, Ore., and Mrs. G. C. Danforth of Southwick; two brothers, Henry Thornton of Madras, Ore., and L. C. Thornton of Redmond, Ore.

Funeral arrangements are pending.

## P-T. A. FACT FINDING COMMITTEE NOW IN OPERATION

The P-T. A. appointed "Fact Finding Committee" met at the High School Wednesday evening, with the following members present: Chairman, Harry Newman, Ed. Mielke, Dick Blewett, Alva Craig, Jack Browning and Gordon Peters.

This committee was appointed through the Joint District P-T. A. at the request of the School Board of Directors. The assigned purpose of this present committee is to make a survey of the wishes and ideas of ALL the people of the School District concerning our present school facilities. This committee has drawn up a questionnaire to be sent to all persons in their school district, in about four weeks. In the meantime it was the wishes of this committee that some information concerning our schools be presented to the public. The following report is the first of this series. The inspection was made by the State Board of Education last spring and delivered to the School Board last fall.

This report was prepared after a one-day inspection and tour of our three plants. It gives a general picture of the adequacy of our schools, but in some respects does not cover everything completely, and should be read with this fact in mind. It has in no way been approved or disapproved by the P-T. A. Fact-Finding committee, but is being published for your information.

## Foreword

This report is the findings of the survey committee requested by the School Board of Jt. "B" School District No. 283, Kendrick, Idaho. The request was made for a building survey only, but there are circumstances other than the actual building conditions that also help determine if school construction is necessary. This report has tried to point out some of these circumstances, and also report on the condition of the buildings as observed by the committee.

In preparation for the survey Alton B. Jones, state superintendent of public instruction, set up a committee consisting of representatives of the State Department of Education at Boise, and the University of Idaho, Moscow. Representatives were Lawrence Fish and Harold Farley, and Dr. John Green, the latter of the University of Idaho.

## Report of Survey Committee

In a building survey we attempt to find the answer to three questions. First: What are the immediate and probable future needs of the district? Second: How effectively are these needs being met at the present time, and if it appears from the fact that there are important educational needs that are not being met. Third: What practical courses of action should the district take to meet these needs?

In attempting to find the answer to these questions, it is, of course, necessary to answer many others which concern the number of children to be educated, the kind of an education program the district desires, the conditions and possibilities of the present school plants, and the financial ability of the district to provide better facilities.

This report will consider each of these items briefly. An attempt has been made to substantiate discussion by tables and pertinent data gathered from the files of the Superintendent. Time did not permit extensive research.

Appreciation is expressed for the help provided by the school administration. Without their help the amount of work covered in a day could not have been near what it was.

## The Housing Needs

In attempting to determine the need for housing, it is essential to consider not only the past and present enrollments, but also the probable further enrollments of the district. For a number of years it appears the district has been operating at approximately maximum capacity at its present school plants. The district has now reached a point where the present enrollment demands increased classroom space. If this were a temporary situation, it might be solved by the simple expedient of moving in a temporary building or renting some temporary space in the community. However, the enrollment in the lower grades would indicate that the situation is not temporary, but one you are going to have with you for quite a while.

Coupled with the problem of housing pupils adequately is also the problem of what is desired and necessary for a good school program. In this day of science, it becomes a duty of the district to provide adequate facilities for teaching courses in the field of science. This appears to be one of the greatest needs at the Kendrick High school. Recent improvements still do not bring the facilities up to where they should be.

We also realize that for many students high school is terminal education. Adequate provisions should be provided to allow students to have class work in art and crafts, speech, journalism, music, commercial and business, home economics and physical education.

## Room and Space Utilization

Utilization studies are made to determine how effectively the present school plant is being used and if there is space not used that can be used. First, room utilization which is concerned with finding the percent of time rooms are used during the day and second, space utilization, which is designed to determine whether the rooms are capable of accommodating more pupils than are now provided by the present arrangement.

## Room Utilization

The room utilization at Kendrick school and Juliaetta school is shown on the accompanying graphs. National standards suggest that a total building utilization of 75 percent is about all that can be expected in a high school, since so many of the special rooms are not suitable for other use. In elementary schools the expected use is 90 percent, which allows for use of some special rooms. A rating of a school above these percents would indicate they are lacking in those desirable facilities.

We found no vacant classroom space at either building. The utilization of the shop for only one period at Kendrick is self-explanatory. However, craft classes could use this area. (There is neither faculty nor equipment to teach woodworking shop more than one period per day).

## Space Utilization

The following tables show the use of space in the two buildings. Standards have some variance as to the number of square feet per student. Twenty-five square feet was used as a standard for the elementary school. The square feet was varied for the high school, depending on the classroom use.

We also visited the school at Southwick. Here students have ample room in the classrooms and do have a play area inside away from the weather. The superintendent and board are to be congratulated on the way the gymnasium has been made so usable for classroom space after the burning of the old building.

The abandoned schoolhouse in the district should be sold. In its present condition it presents an eyesore and would reflect on the Board's operation of the business of the district, in the eyes of the people in that area.

The tables printed in this report on space and utilization tend to show the following ratings:

The rooms in the Kendrick school are used very well, with the exception of the shop. The use of the school lunch kitchen and a classroom for Home Economics for the girls, limits the offering of the class. Work space for pupils and teachers is limited. The stage in the gymnasium is inadequate as to size and dressing room facilities. There is evidence that the gym is not too sound structurally and better facilities should be provided for dressing, if a well-rounded physical education program is to be conducted.

Space utilization tends to show the over-crowded conditions at Kendrick. The science room definitely is not large enough to provide the necessary space for a good program of class work and laboratory work. The band room is small, the ceiling is too low, and storage space for valuable instruments and equipment is not adequate. The office area is not large enough, does not provide space for interviews and counseling, and there is no vault to take care of all the important and necessary files concerning the business of a school district and the student records. There is little storage space for school and board supplies.

The school at Juliaetta is not over-crowded, except in the second grade. Here something must be done to provide adequate space to conduct a good primary education program. The building needs improvement in lighting and plaster is nearing the stage of repair on the ceilings. The building is sound structurally and could be built onto in two or three directions to provide the necessary space for classrooms, sickroom, nurse room, and adequate play room.

Toilet facilities are poor at both schools and not located conveniently for student use.

Heating facilities at Kendrick appear to be inadequate for cold weather. There is not adequate storage at Kendrick for janitor's supplies.
