EXTENDED BIG GAME SEASON BRINGS LOCAL PROTEST

The announced intention of the State Fish and Game department to extend the season for the North Fork from November 1st to December 15th has evoked a storm of protest — not only from the property owners, but from local sportsmen, who remember well the senseless slaughter of last fall, when many so-called sportsmen bragged of killing as high as six deer!

Roy Glenn, who as a property owner, sportsman, Granger, and chairman of the Kendrick Commercial Club, is leading the fight against the extended season says that Tom Felton of Moscow, a member of the State Fish and Game Commission, says that the extended season was recommended by the Wildlife Biologists at the University of Idaho, due to overstocked and over-grazed conditions in the area, and that he sees no reason to ask that the extra 15 days be cut from the season.

Mr. Glenn and all the other property owners in the area contacted, as well as the real sportsmen, know that this is not the case. There is ample feed for many times as many deer as ever populate the area — and today (following last fall's slaughter) there is not one deer where there was four!

A resolution was forwarded by the Pomona Grange last week to the Game Department asking that the extra 15 days be cut off, and this week it is expected others will go in from the local Grange, Commercial Club, Lions Club and others.

Mr. Glenn says that should these fall of the desired result there is but one course open to the property owners — posting of their places with "No Trespassing" signs, and will be done. He goes on to say: "All realize it will cause hard feelings and doubtless arrests will have to be made to enforce it — but that too will be done!"

Be Careful With Gasoline

It's spring, and to you who are about to dust off your power mower or outboard motor, this clean-up advice comes from the local firemen:

Remember that as little as half a pint of gasoline, spilled on the floor, vaporized and ignited, can and too frequently does, cause fatal results.

Always store gasoline in a standard safety can (look for UL label), never in glass jugs or jars or old oil cans that could easily break, spill or leak.

Put your cigarette out before pouring gasoline — and always stop the motor and wait until it cools before refilling a gas tank.

Do your fueling outdoors — never fill or operate motors in closed garages, indoors, and especially in below-grade basements.

Pouring gasoline can create static electricity — so keep metal spots in direct contact with fill openings to avoid sparks.

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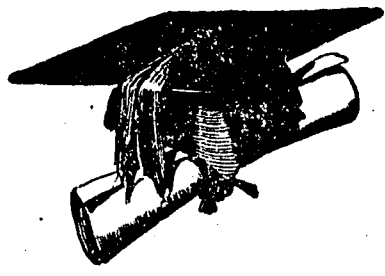

Stork Deliveries To Hospitals Are On Great Upswing

New York—If you're a prospective parent, you'll welcome the news that more and more children are being born in hospitals.

In the past few years the number has exceeded 3,500,000 annually; in 1952, the last year for which official data are available, about 3,530,000 or better than 9 out of every 10 births were delivered in hospitals, and there is definite evidence that the proportion has risen appreciably since then. The proportion of hospitalized births in the white population increased from 59.9 to 95.7 per cent between 1940 and 1952, and among the non-whites from 28.7 to 68.4 per cent.

A percentage-wise gain in hospitalized confinements is evident throughout the country, and is especially noteworthy in areas which in the past had the lowest proportion of hospital deliveries. Thus, in the white population of Kentucky the proportion rose from 18.7 to 80.4 per cent between 1940 and 1952; in West Virginia the rise was from 20.2 to 83.2 per cent; and in Arkansas from 21.5 to 88.1 per cent.

Geographic differences in the proportion of hospitalized births have narrowed a great deal, but there is still appreciable variation from one state to another, particularly for the nonwhite population.

Mistletoe, Traps Catch Wild Deer

HOPLAND, Calif.—Mistletoe and rat traps are helping University of California researchers study deer-sheep relationships at the range research station in Mendocino County.

Mistletoe is used to bait traps to catch deer for two studies. Rat traps are part of the trapping mechanism devised to catch the deer.

Some of the deer are turned into pastures with sheep to study grazing competition and parasites common to both groups of animals. Other deer are earmarked—a few are also belled—to trace their movements on the natural range for more information on how far they wander for food and how long they live.

New types of traps are used. One is a small individual trap made of a pipe frame covered with a netting. The other is a larger, corral type made of a series of 8x8 board panels.

During July, August, and early September 78 deer were caught. Fifteen of them were retraps. One doe was caught five times, another three times. Two marked bucks have been taken by hunters.

Like All Else—Price Of Brides Higher

WASHINGTON—The rising price of brides in the far corners of the world is turning young men's fancy into financial complications.

In Eastern Nigeria, says the National Geographic Society, buying a bride has become so expensive that a government committee proposes price control and rationing. Fifty years ago a tall comely Ibo girl might cost \$50, and an ugly maid only three goats. Now a \$300 bride is a bargain.

In West Pakistan, soaring abductions of 13- to 16-year-old girls are blamed on high parental price tags. Suitors unable to pay resort to kidnapping.

Among many remote tribes, the bride price can be the biggest outlay of a man's life. Through the Bismarck Archipelago it may come to 15 to 200 strings of shell money. In Samoa it includes canoes and pigs.

A Baskuma swain, in the territory southeast of Lake Victoria, pays a first installment of 60 sheep. Then he must work for his bride's father for two years. A Banyoro pays with cattle as fast as he can, but any children born in the meantime belong to the father-in-law until each is paid for separately with a cow.

Wrong Beam Almost Brings Air Visitor

KNOXVILLE—An Air Force pilot's complaint that he almost landed on the apron of a filling station brought city police to the grand opening of a new North Broadway service station.

The pilot complained that he mistook the searchlight's beam for a ceiling light at McGhee Tyson Air Force Base.

Ordered to put out the light, the station owner quickly obliged. "That's OK," he said. "I had more business than I could take care of anyway."

RICHMOND, Va.—George A. Nash, Jr., has had two auto accidents in recent years. Both times Nash sold insurance policies to drivers of cars in collisions with him.

SALVATION ARMY SALUTE

Famous also for its war and disaster work, its service units—more than 3,000 of them—accompanied our armed forces in every part of the world in World War II. Salvation Army rescue teams—an important part of the national Civil Defense organization—operated 99 rolling canteens, aided 103,971 victims of storms, floods, fires, explosions and wrecks in 1955.

During 1955 the Salvation Army visited 129,888 prison inmates, expanded the work of its "Lifers' Club" and the "Brighter Day League" which helps those returning to society. Hundreds of prisoners, paroled to the Salvation Army, are helped to find jobs and adjust to family life and

freedom. Elders, lonesome and frustrated, deprived of family life, are given companionship and opportunities for work and play and earning through the Army's "Golden Age Clubs", and help is given those needing institutional care.

Last year, in the crowded neighborhoods of our big cities, 327 Salvation Army youth centers provided

spiritual guidance and recreation to 3,930,131 boys and girls and almost 33,000 spent healthy and happy vacations at the Salvation Army Camps. The Salvation Army locates missing persons, aids unmarried mothers and performs many other humane and spiritual offices—most often for those who have no other place to turn. But why say more of this Army whose only command to all comers is: "Ask,

and ye shall receive."

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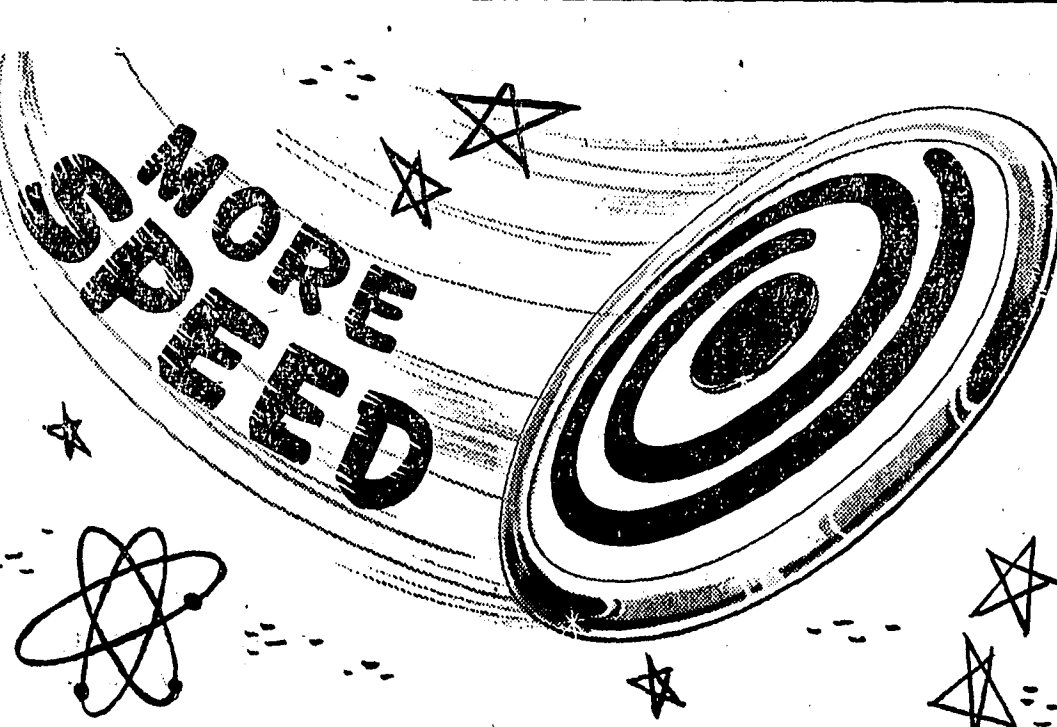
