The Kendrick High School track team left last Friday morning for Boise and state competition — and returned Sunday evening with the championship in the Class B division — truly an outstanding event and honor in the history of this school!

In the rugged competitive scramble Kendrick was on top with 16½ points; Marsing had 16 and Lapwai tallied 15 for third place.

Resuscitator Is Used Sunday

The resuscitator was pressed into use Sunday evening about 9:00 by the First Aid team of the Kendrick Volunteer Firemen, and possibly saved the life of a young man.

Eddie Horton, who is employed by the State Forestry department, and working with Henry Jones, bunks over at the local office, was stricken Sunday evening with an acute attack that literally shut off his breathing. He managed to get word via the short wave call system to Henry Jones at his home before he collapsed. Henry in turn called Ed. Nelson, and he with Chas. Deobald, to man the resuscitator, got to the scene in a matter of minutes and started administering oxygen to Eddie, who was writhing in the floor in pain and gasping for air.

Dr. Christensen, who was attending Baccalaureate Services at the school gym, was called, and he recommended Eddie be taken to the St. Joseph's hospital immediately. Geo. Brocke, Jr., a member of the First Aid squad, helped the team working with the stricken man, before loading him into the Brocke & Sons station wagon and taking off for Lewiston.

Latest report from his bedside says he is resting now. Dr. Christensen says it was an acute attack of indigestion that affected his breathing — and it is possible Eddie would not be alive today had it not been for the resuscitator and local first aid team.

Mrs. Henry Jones called on him at the hospital Tuesday, where he is still confined for observation.

This local team is composed of Bill Rogers, Chas. Deobald, Elmo Eldridge, Geo. Brocke, Jr., and Bob Magnuson. If there is reason to believe that someone needs the resuscitator — call immediately — don't wait!

DOUGLAS COUNTY FARMER LOSES BATTLE WITH PUD

Is a public utility district required to service every customer, even in remote areas, where such service would be at a loss to the District? This often asked question was answered this week in the Douglas County Superior Court where the Court held in the case brought by Forrest Hart, Bridgeport Bar against the Douglas County PUD No. 1 Commissioners that there are specific limits of service.
 The Court held for the Douglas County PUD.
 Forrest E. Hart leased 30 acres of land on Bridgeport Bar for fruit raising. He requested service of July 18, 1955 and PUD engineers estimated, after survey, that net cost of service after allowance for salvage value was \$962.52. The estimated revenue from operation of 7 1/4 h.p. pump sought by Hart would be \$562.50 over five year period.
 The PUD demanded \$400.02 from Hart, the difference in cost of construction and the anticipated revenue. Hart refused to pay this sum or any other sum. The PUD served Hart during 1947 season, thereafter, the property leased by Hart was abandoned and no electric service was requested until June, 1955. The line in meantime had been disconnected. Hart contended the PUD changing line from 2300 volt to a 13,800 volt system gave him a right to ask for extension of service. The PUD offered service on same basis as all others in such circumstances.
 The Court held the PUD rules and regulations for extensions for irrigation service are "fair and reasonable and fulfilled their duty to furnish service to public. It held the PUD had not discriminated against Hart. The Court denied Hart's application for an alternate writ of mandate, and Hart must pay costs and disbursements.
 This was the first case of its kind in the state and may set the pattern for other similar cases involving PUD service and extension policies.

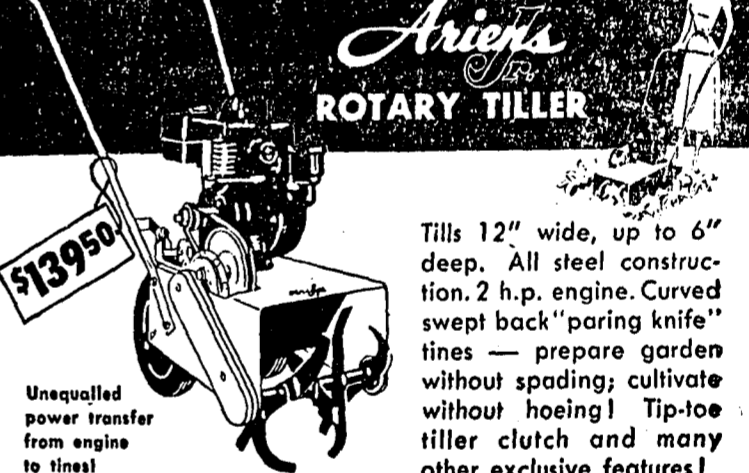
