## Car Goes Into Ditch

Shortly after midnight Friday night the car belonging to Albert Clemenhagen, but driven by Norman Silflow, and containing Albert and Norman, and headed in the direction of Lewiston, left the road between the Leon Brascom home and Juliaetta, and landed on its top in the ditch, a heavy iron pipe in the ditch catching the top, but missing the two young men, neither of whom were injured, other than a shaking up.

We understand the car is considered an almost total loss.

The accident was investigated by State Patrolman Shoemaker.

## CLOUDBURST BRINGS DAMAGE OVER WIDE AREA

A torrential rain (or cloudburst) which apparently had its origin in the Craigmont-Contonwood area last Saturday, and which swung in a northwesterly arc, did untold thousands of dollars worth of damage in this section before finally giving out north of Deary.

Striking along the Clearwater river it washed tons of rock and dirt onto the road near Arrow and also onto the railroad tracks.

As it swung north and west it brought tons of boulders cascading down the gully near the Huse Grose-close home, all but blocking the highway at this point, then on northward to bring rock, mud and debris from a gulley between the old Stesma ranch and Irwin ranch almost onto the highway, the flat ground being strewn with tons of rocks for a distance of almost 100 yards.

On American ridge the fury of the storm seemed centered about the Harry Bencosoter, Edgar Clary and Walter May ranches, where tons of fertile topsoil were sluiced away — running across the road, filling the ditches and spreading out onto pasture lands, where it began to lose its force, but at the same time flattened grass and alfalfa and left it thick with mud.

It cascaded down Brady Gulch, tearing out the culvert across the creek to the Baker home, and also the bridge to the Harvie Shepherd and Sparber Bros. homes. As it continued on down it gathered debris and rock and all but filled the "big canal" at the foot of the gulch near the baseball diamond and behind the state highway maintenance building.

It carried a tremendous amount of mud and small debris into the mill pond of the Mead & Howard Sawmill across the road from the mouth of Brady Gulch creek.

Still further north it rolled tons of rock and mud onto the N. P. Railway tracks near Bovard spur, blocking them very solidly, and stopping all trains until late Sunday afternoon.

For some strange reason the edge of American ridge seems prone to catch this type of storm, there having been many during the past 20 years, and the damage they have wrecked would be all but impossible to estimate.

This is the slogan which will be heard, and seen a great deal in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area as a result of a campaign being conducted by the Kendrick Community Lions Club and the Inland Automobile Ass'n.

Focal point of the program are the barrels which can be found at service stations throughout the two towns and the village park, which display a sign urging motorists to place car litter in the container rather than dump it along the road and streets.

In announcing the campaign, F. C. Schmidt, chairman of the Lions Club committee, said: "Our most valuable tourist asset and point of community pride is the natural beauty of the surrounding countryside. There is little to be proud of, however, if our roadsides and streets have the appearance of virtual dumps because of litter thrown from cars and then left to accumulate more."

The Lion Club committee head expressed the appreciation of the Club and the A.A.A. to the service station operators who have to willingly joined in the program by placing containers on their premises and given other assistance.

He urged all motorists of the area to help in the drive to clean-up roadsides and park areas by carrying trash bags in their cars for litter and then dumping the materials in trash cans or regular dumping areas rather than along roadsides.

Mr. Schmidt said that programs similar to the one here are being conducted in communities throughout the Inland Empire and added that hopes are high that considerably cleaner roadsides will result from the program.

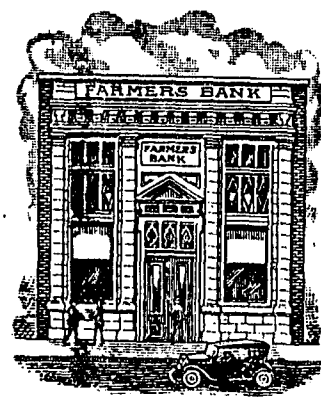

**To Test Pressure Gauges**  
 The county home demonstration agent will again this year test the gauges on your pressure cookers. They should be checked each year. The gauge testing sessions will be held in the following places and times: Deary - June 6, Grange hall, 10:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon. Kendrick - June 8, City hall, 10:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon. Only the gauge can be tested. It must be taken off the lid (they unscrew) and just the gauge brought in. Anyone wishing this test made is welcome.

**Apply For Federal Refunds**  
 Elbert McProud, county agent, this week received a supply of forms on which farmers may apply for refund of federal tax on gasoline used on the farm. C. O. Youngstrom, associate director of the University of Idaho extension service, said county agents are cooperating with Calvin Wright, district director of the Internal Revenue service, in making the forms available. Refund of federal gasoline tax was made possible by recent legislation. The cards now on hand cover gasoline purchased in 1956, and used in farm operations between January 1 and June 30. The claim must be filed with the treasury department at Boise by October 1. Regulations provide that refunds are limited to the federal tax on gasoline used for farming purposes. Refunds are available on gasoline used on your farm by a custom operator or neighbor in agricultural work. No refunds are allowed on gasoline used off the farm, such as in transporting people, livestock or crops. Neither are refunds permitted for tax on gasoline consumed in processing, packaging, freezing or canning. Relief from the federal tax on diesel fuel and special motor fuels used for farming will also be provided, the internal revenue service said. The regulations on these taxes will be announced later.

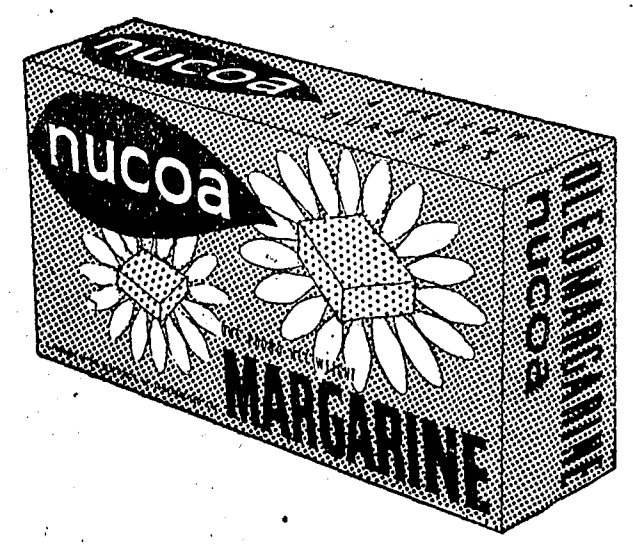
