CLOUDBURST SUNDAY HITS POTLATCH RIVER AREA

The fury of a cloudburst, accompanied by a terrific thunder and lightning storm hit the area along the Potlatch river late Sunday afternoon and evening.

First indications of the storm came in a "muggy-like heat," and stillness, with hardly a breath of air moving. Then came a short, sharp windstorm, which brought with it rain, descending in torrents all along the Potlatch river valley.

At the George Groseclose home between Arrow Junction and Juliaetta, the rain quickly filled the drainage ditches along the highway and carried mud and small debris across the road, making travel slow and hazardous.

Moving further along the canyon it apparently did but little more damage until it struck the farm of Mrs. M. A. Deobald on American ridge, where it washed out (for the second time) spring seedings, Walter Benschoter having just completed this work following the storm of ten days ago.

In Kendrick itself the torrential downpour turned the streets into lakes, carried mud and gravel down the schoolhouse hill and onto Main Street. The sewer system was unable to carry the flow of water, so formed a "fountain" at the manhole near the E. A. Deobald home in the west part of town, and before a basement drain could be plugged, had put water three feet deep in the basement of the Eva Perryman home.

It also backed up into several other homes, coming in through toilets and floor drains, creating one of the worst "messes" ever seen.

The accompanying lightning storm knocked out the TV cable system of Broeke & Sons and at a late hour Tuesday it had still not been determined how much equipment would have to be replaced and how much could be repaired, to resume service. The damage to the system alone could well run into hundreds of dollars.

During the height of the storm one lightning bolt struck on the hillside near the K. H. S. in the east part of town, the fire and smoke of the strike being plainly visible — not to mention the accompanying report. Another bolt struck in a ravine just back of the John DeHaven home a little further east in the canyon. This strike was visible, but the canyon walls hid the exact spot.

As the storm moved east and north it carried down tons of rock and mud onto the Big Bear ridge grade, near the "watering trough" turn, effectively blocking the highway.

A "repeat performance" was given in the gully near the Chas. Fey home on the Cedar Creek road — also blocking this route.

At the same time the water carried mud, debris and rocks onto the highway near the top of the Wauncher Gulch grade, closing it for a time. However, probably the most awesome aspect of the storm was the "gully washer" that came down the side of the canyon paralleling the old Lewiston Grain Growers tramway, back of their present grain warehouse. Here mud and boulders, some of the latter as big as stoves, cascaded down a "waterfall" to dam Potlatch creek about half way across and fill the stream with a thick, chocolate color made from the best soils on Potlatch ridge.

Early Monday morning the local state highway crew had the Wauncher Gulch grade open. Other state equipment, working on a big slide near the Werner Brammer home between Kendrick and Juliaetta, was taken up on the Bear Ridge grade to open that, and later used to help clean filled ditches, culverts, etc., along the highway in this section.

It is impossible to estimate the damage done in dollars and cents by the downpour — but the loss is terrific — not to mention the irreplaceable top soil — hundreds of tons of which were carried away!

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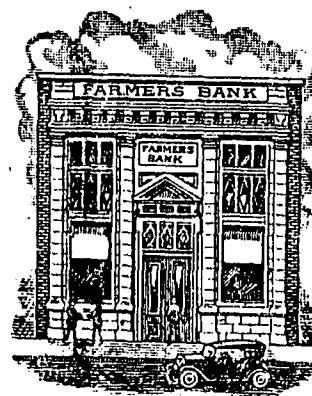

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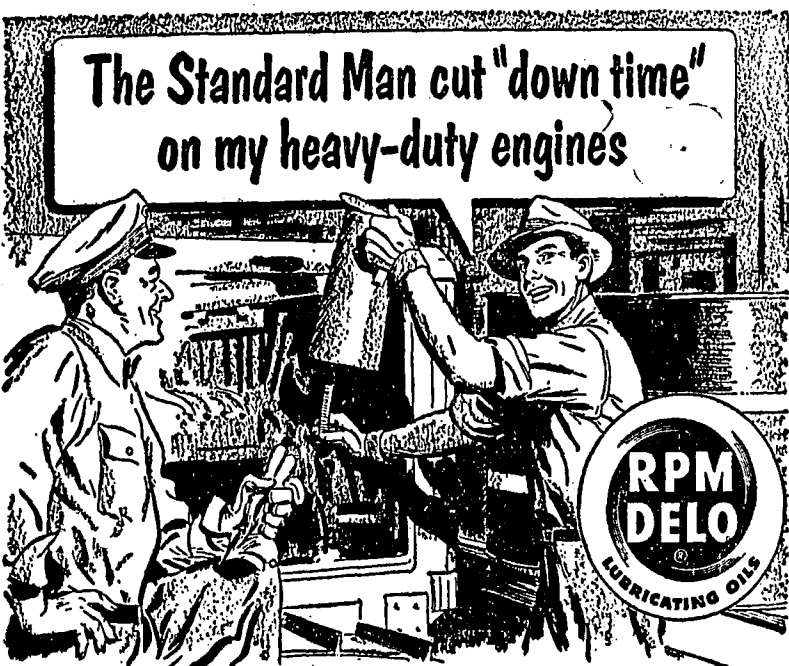

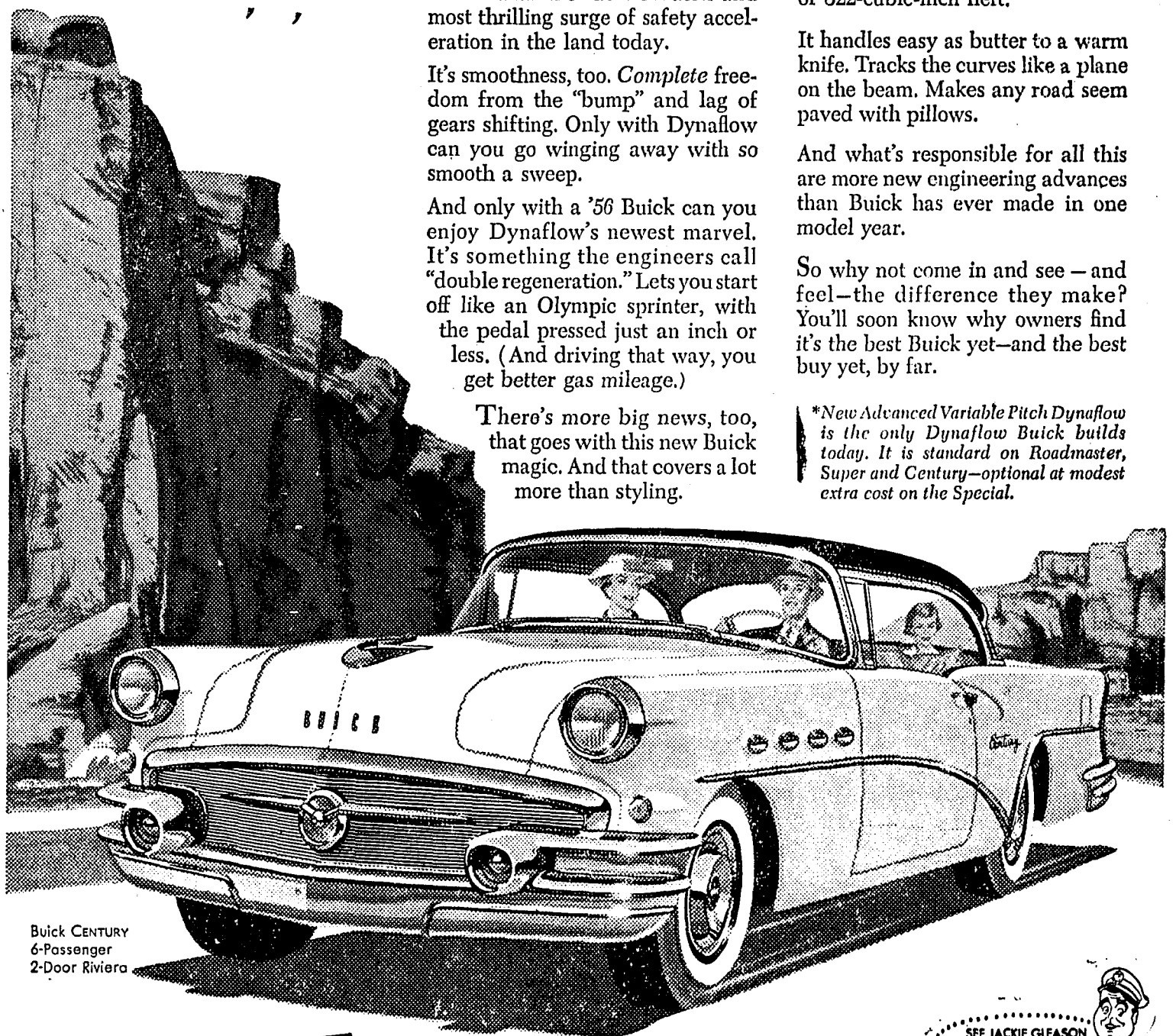

Cattle Grub Control

There's a new development in the control of cattle grubs, those pests that cost the livestock industry millions every year.

The county agent had word this week that the department of agriculture is enthusiastic over results of a chemical added to cattle feed. It moves through the body to destroy grubs wherever they may occur in the animal's flesh.

The chemical is known as ET-57. Further research on its use is in progress. The particular phases under study are its effect on the animals and the chemical residues in milk or meat.

Best means of keeping the grubs in check until the new treatment is perfected, the county agent said, is to use rotenone when grubs come out of the hide.

You can apply rotenone as a wash, spray or dust. The treatment reduces the population of heel flies that would grow into grubs.

For the wash, University of Idaho insect specialists recommend a paste of 12 ounces of derris powder in one gallon of water. Brush it in thoroughly with stiff bristles. The spray is made of 7½ pounds derris root powder (5 percent rotenone) to 100 gallons of water. Apply it with a sprayer with pressure of 400 pounds.

You can make a dust by mixing one pound of derris powder with two pounds of pyrophyllite. Apply it from a shaker and rub it in lightly by hand. Treat animals at least twice at 30-day intervals, starting about a month after grubs appear in the

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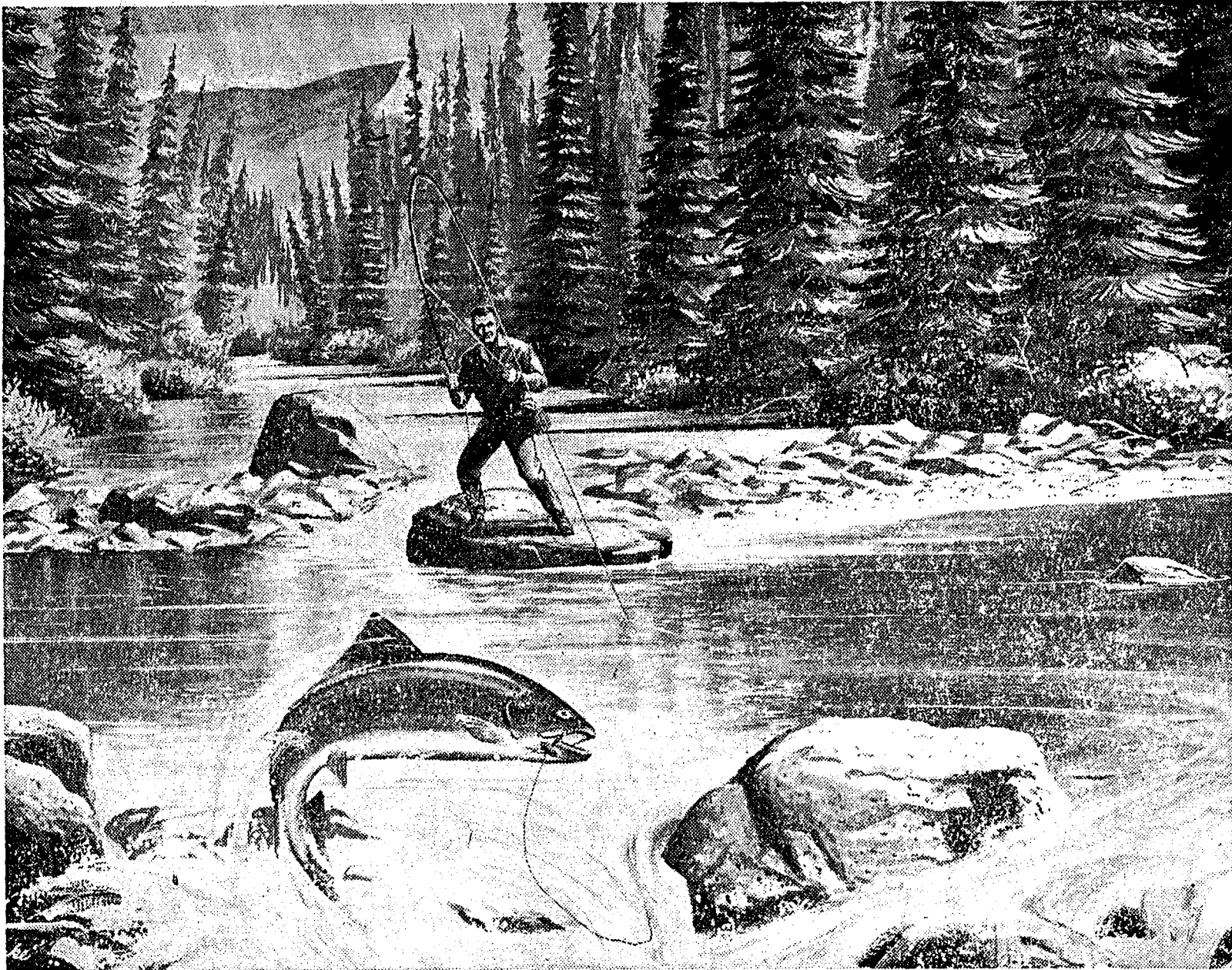

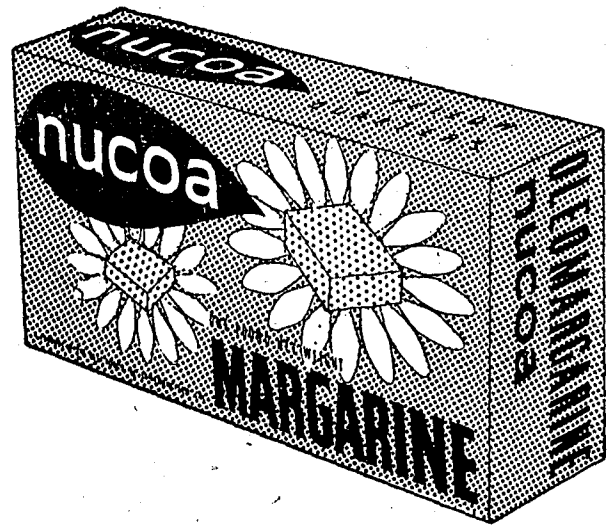
