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"The Socialists want a Federal Power Monopoly . . . No one else does"

The main point of the Public-vs.-Private electric power development is basically as simple as two-and-two. Secretary of Commerce Weeks covered it with admirable brevity when he said: "The socialists want a Federal power monopoly. The thought of private capital venturing into this field is anathema to them. That's what is back of the Dixon-Yates power controversy—that's all there is to the struggle for Federal development on the Snake River where private capital after authorization by this Administration has moved in to do the job."

For those of us who aren't socialists and don't follow this phase of the socialist line, private power development is as logical and desirable as private farming, private retail stores, private enterprise in all the thousand-and-one fields. Private power pays taxes, big ones—about 25 per cent of all its revenues. The socialized systems either pay no taxes at all, or small sums in lieu of local taxes. Private power development is financed by the assets and savings of individuals and institutions, provided voluntarily. Public power is subsidized—involuntarily—by all the taxpayers. Private power rates are governed and established by public service commissions, and usually allow a return of about six per cent on the investment. Public power rates, more often than not, are affected by political influences — which means that more taxpayer subsidies are needed to keep the government in business in competition with its own citizens.

Can private power swing the biggest jobs? Well, a group of private power companies is now completing a \$400,000,000 project in Ohio to service an Atomic Energy Commission plant. Another group has been trying for years to get the go-ahead on a \$400,000,000 development on the Niagara in New York. The Snake River project is in the \$200,000,000 bracket.

As Secretary Weeks said, "The socialists want a federal power monopoly." No one else does.

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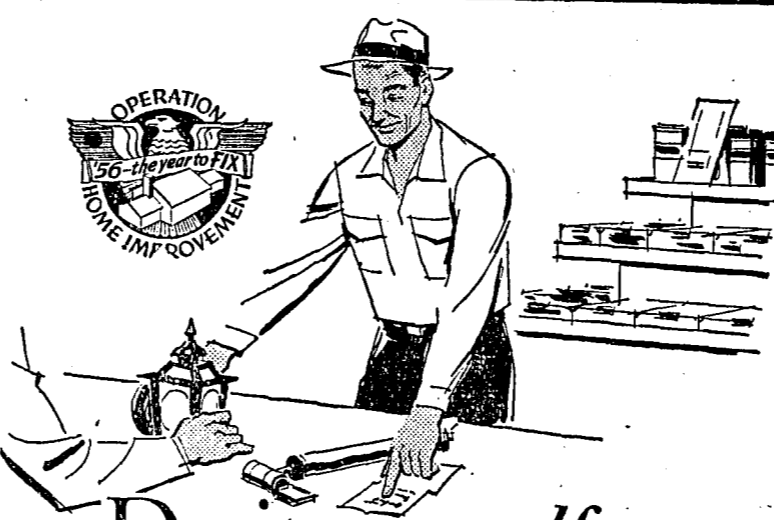

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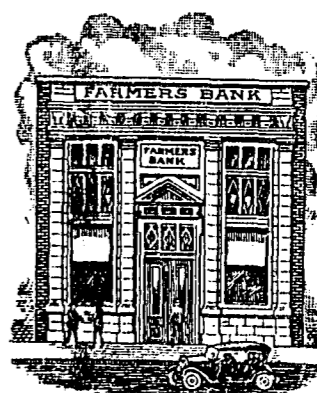

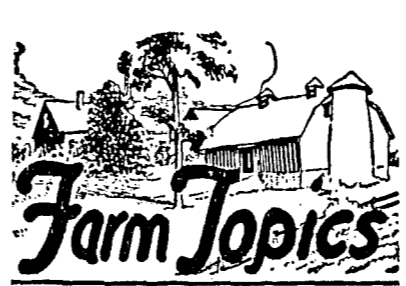

Healthy Pullets Require Attention Poultryman Must Aid Broody Hen

The farmer and his modern poultry equipment have replaced the broody hen; but it takes a certain amount of broody-hen-like devotion by poultrymen to brood and rear healthy pullets, says Don Bray, University of Illinois poultry Specialist. To raise healthy chicks, poultrymen need dependable brooder units and houses equipped with chick guards. They also need one fruit jar water fountain and 3 feet of feeding space for each 75 chicks. The poultryman has to take the place of the broody hen in balancing the starting ration too. Chicks need a 20 per cent protein starting ration for the first 6 weeks, says Bray. Poultrymen then can switch the birds to an 18 per cent growing ration fed with home-grown grain to cut feed costs. The specialist says this provides an adequate and economical feeding program for "growing out" the pullets. A clean range with ample forage and shade helps birds develop

rugged bodies at a minimum cost, Bray points out. Clipping the range frequently encourages tender growth later in the season and makes it more valuable for the birds. To control disease, use the same range only one year in three. The modern poultryman takes water to the birds rather than let a broody hen take the birds to water. Bray says a pipe or hose laid one furrow deep in the ground will assure an ample supply of cool water in the range area. It will save the farmer a lot of hauling or carrying, he adds.

Dental Care of Cattle Important to Health

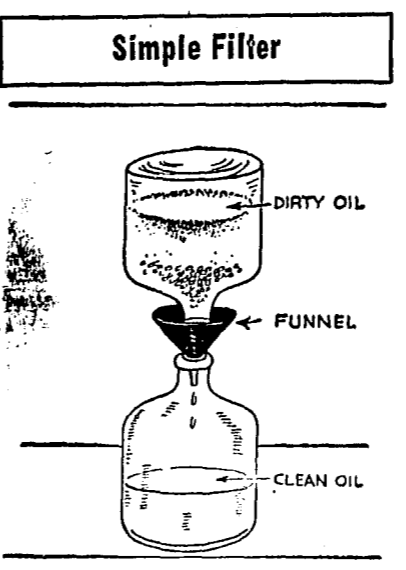
Cattlemen are being urged to give more attention to the dental care of cattle that fail to eat properly or that fail to produce a normal supply of milk or meat.

The American Foundation for Animal Health says that many cattle owners apparently overlook the fact that defective teeth may be the cause of digestive upsets and general unthriftiness in otherwise healthy cattle.

Specific cases illustrate the problem that can be caused by faulty teeth.

In one of these cases, a cow had exhibited a poor appetite for several days and refused to eat any feed. A digestive disturbance of some kind was suspected, but examination by a veterinarian failed to confirm this suspicion.

However, when the veterinarian checked for a possible throat obstruction, he cut his finger on an extremely sharp back tooth. The cow had two such sharp teeth, so sharp in fact, that they caused severe pain when she chewed. After the teeth were clipped and other teeth dressed down to normal chewing level, the cow started eating again.
