**To Maintain Fishing In Area**  
 Washington (Special) — Senator Henry C Dworshak has secured the approval of the Senate Public Works Appropriations committee for the expenditure of up to \$200,000 in Idaho during the next fiscal year to institute a program to maintain the salmon and sports fishing in areas which would be affected by proposed dams, as well as those already constructed.

Senator Dworshak, "that if these funds are approved by Congress, survey and planning to determine the need for hatcheries, fishway diversion protection, stream improvement and other facilities would be undertaken." Farley added that additional funds to continue this work will be included in the Fish and Wildlife budget request for 1956.

Idaho has not previously been a participant in the Columbia river fish sanctuary program, which was initiated in 1949. About 12 million dollars have been spent on this program to date. The Idaho Fish and Game commission will cooperate in the new venture.

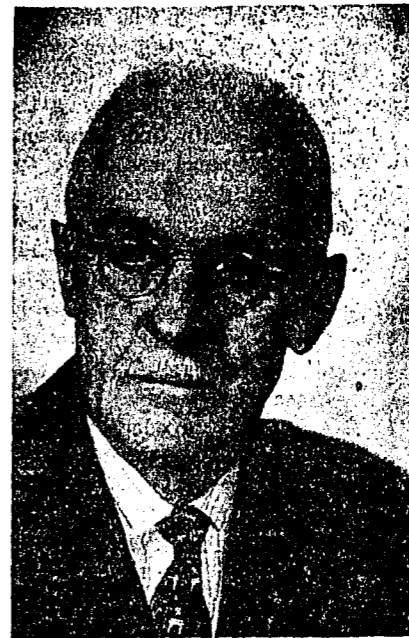

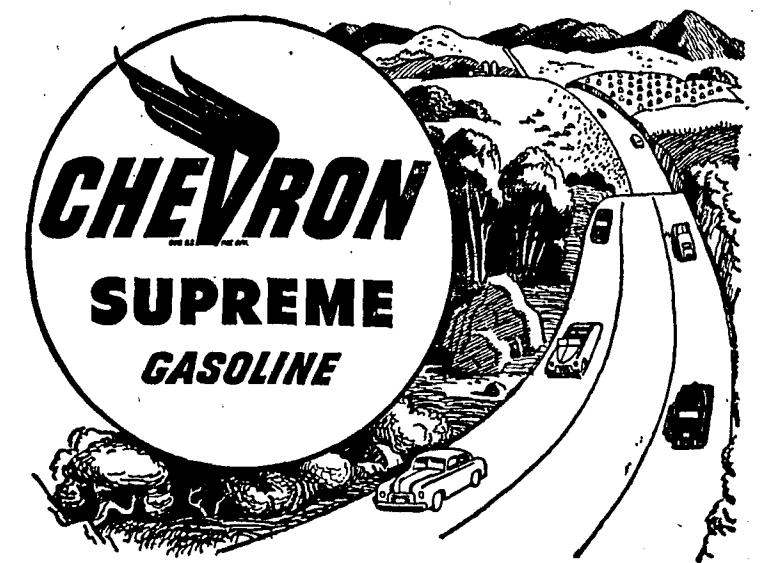
