4-H Club Program Growing
 The Latah County 4-H Club program is the largest ever, reports John L. Moore, assistant county agent. There are 30 active 4-H Clubs in the county with a total enrollment of 401 4-H'ers and 69 local leaders and assistant leaders to guide them. These 4-H'ers carry a wide range of

projects including all but four of the subject items offered. The total number of projects carried by these 401 members is 1,058. The largest number enrolled in any one project is 225 in Food Preparation, with Clothing also running high at 164. Others and the number enrolled are: Rural Electrification,

124; Rural Arts and Crafts, 81; Livestock, 104; Gardening, 43; Poultry and Rabbits, 39; Safety, 35; Forestry and Wildlife, 36; Dairy, 36; Frozen Foods, 31; Junior Leadership, 23; Tractor Maintenance, 21; Health, 20; Child Care, 17; Canning, 15, and several other projects with 5 to 15 enrolled.

Many of the clubs also carry on community projects. Some of these include "Keep Idaho Green," Fair Jingles, road signs, community parks and many others. The county 4-H Clubs raise money every year to help sponsor International Farm Youth Exchange delegates and this year have helped to sponsor two delegates, Tom Trull and Dave Youmans, past 4-H'ers and University of Idaho students.

The big time of the year for the 4-H'ers is the County Fair, which is the time to exhibit their year's work. All of these 4-H projects comprise a sizeable show and the members work hard to make their exhibits look "tops" for the viewers and judges. The time to look over this fine work is at the Latah County Fair, Sept. 20, 21 and 22, at Moscow. All are urged to come to the fair and see what the 401 Latah County 4-H'ers have been doing.

Bottles To Go To Sea

Vancouver, B. C. — The Canadian Meteorological station at Departure Bay, Vancouver Island, will soon launch 15,000 bottles on the Pacific Ocean. They will be used for a survey of ocean currents, and the launching will be done by about 30 ships at various points, the most distant one being 1,500 miles from shore. It is said to be the most important bottle-releasing project in history.

Dr. J. Tully, in charge of this experiment, has been collecting old bottles for more than a year. New bottles are somewhat more fragile.

The number of these that return to Departure Bay is not expected to exceed 2 per cent, or 300 bottles. Some will be picked up a few days after launching. Most of the others are expected to be found in six months or more. A few more will remain floating in the ocean for as much as 10 years. The remainder will have gone to the bottom. Cards inside the bottles request the finder to forward these to Departure Bay, with details as to where and when the bottle was found. For this information he will receive a dollar bill.

The bottles are tightly corked and heavily coated with wax. Five men were kept busy for three weeks preparing the material for this test, the results of which will not be known for at least two years.

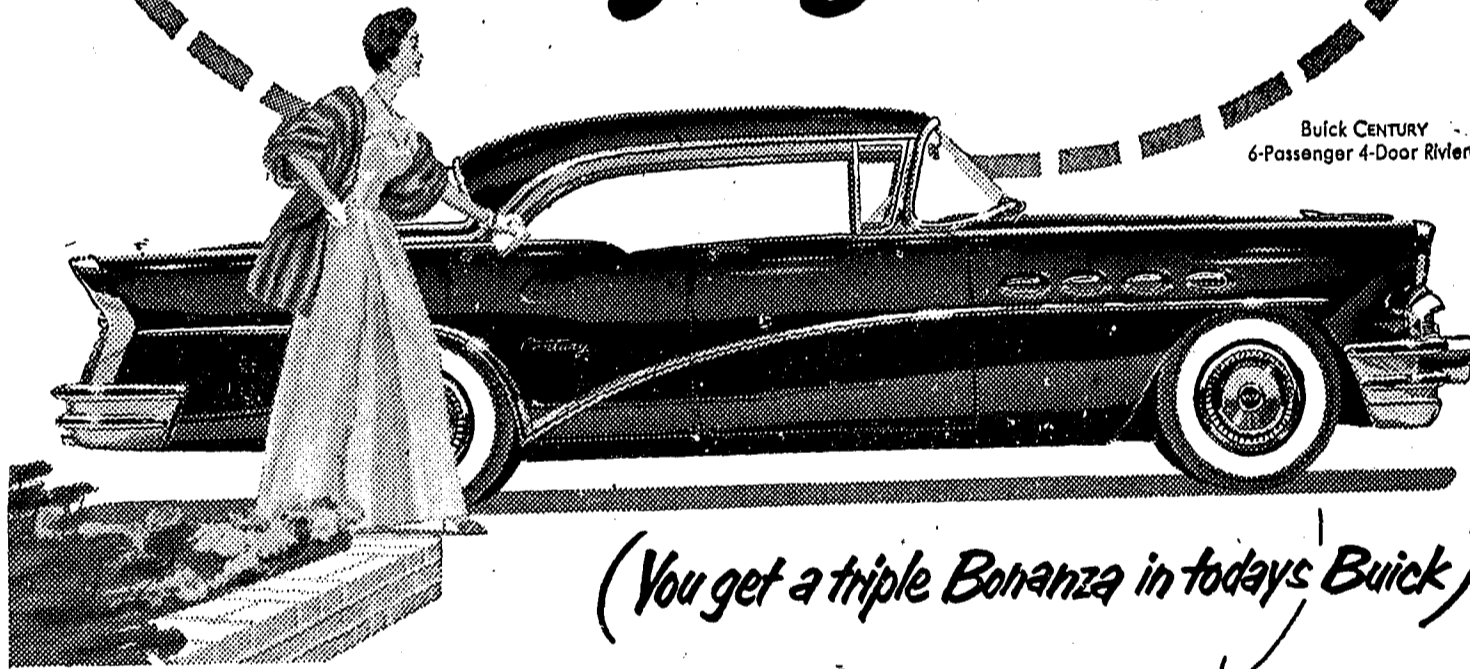

New Area Shown On Mars Bolsters Living Planet Idea

WASHINGTON—A new blue-green area on the red face of Mars, almost the size of Texas and believed to be living vegetation, has produced the greatest change in Martian geography since the planet was first mapped 125 years ago.

The discovery was announced by Dr. E. C. Slipher, a distinguished astronomer and leader of the 1954 National Geographic-Lowell Observatory Mars Expedition to photograph the planet from South Africa.

Last summer, as it will again in 1956, Mars set off a world-wide study by spinning closer to the earth than at any time since 1941. Results of its near approach are gradually being revealed by scientific scrutiny of thousands of photographs collected by an International Mars Committee. Twenty thousand photographs were made by Dr. Slipher alone.

The new dark marking, covering approximately 200,000 square miles near the great Thoth Canal, was totally unexpected. Never before has such a new dark splotch appeared except as an increase of an existing dark area.

The remarkable transformation, Dr. Slipher reports, indicates that the division between Martian desert and dark areas is not necessarily fixed or permanent; one may change to the other at any time. It helps support the conclusion that Mars is not a dead world, that the darkening is due to the growth of plant life.

Sunburn Remedies May Cause Reaction

CHICAGO—Preparations to protect the skin from sunburn may actually cause inflammation, a Florida dermatologist says.

Dr. Wiley M. Sams, Miami, says that the preparations themselves are harmless to the skin, but in the presence of direct sunlight sometimes cause redness and eruptions of the skin.

Lime oil, bergamot oil, some perfumes and toilet waters, and some derivatives of tannic acids have caused reactions among Dr. Sams' patients. Other southern dermatologists also are seeing cases of "contact-photodermatitis" with increasing frequency, he said.

What apparently happens is that the preparations, while protecting the skin from the "sunburning"

light rays, produce a chemical reaction in the skin which sensitizes it to other light rays. Routine "patch" tests with the same preparations but without exposure to sunlight fail to produce any reactions in most cases, he said.

Dr. Sams pointed out that the eruptions are short-lived and do not cause too much discomfort.

Accidental Deaths Up By 2,000 in 1955

NEW YORK—Accidental deaths in the United States increased by about 2,000 during 1955, bringing the year's total to approximately 92,000, according to insurance company statisticians.

This increase is due principally to motor vehicle accidents, with the number of fatalities from such mishaps probably reaching 38,500—or 2,500 more than in 1954. Thus motor vehicle mishaps accounted for more than two fifths of all accidental deaths, a far greater toll than from any other single type of accident.

Public accidents other than those involving motor vehicles took a slightly larger number of lives than in 1954, totaling nearly 16,000. Injuries arising out of and in the course of employment caused about 14,000 deaths, the same as in the previous year. Fatal injuries in the home declined to about 27,000, a small improvement over the record for 1954.

Body Tug-of-War At High Altitudes

BERKELEY, Cal.—A tug-of-war between two mechanisms in the body may be the cause of most of the symptoms of altitude sickness—the ailment which affects visitors to high mountain regions.

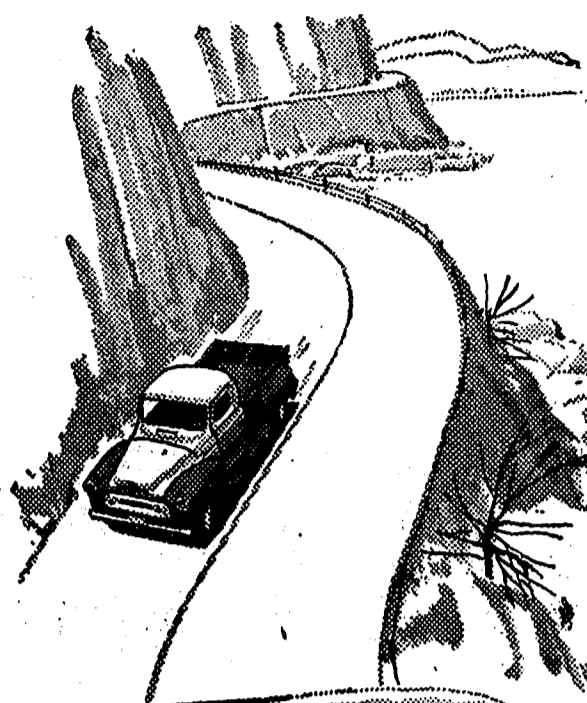
This possibility is being investigated by a University of California research team. Dr. Nello Pace says that a regulating mechanism in the carotid arteries responds to high altitude by calling for increased breathing, while the respiratory center in the brain reacts by calling for less breathing. Several days may be needed before the two mechanisms adjust to altitude and begin to work in harmony, he added.

Fewer Executions

WASHINGTON—The Federal Prisons Bureau has reported that 1955 again spotlighted a trend toward fewer executions, in evidence for a number of years.

Last year's 76 executions were the smallest number since the bureau started keeping such statistics in 1930, except for 1953.

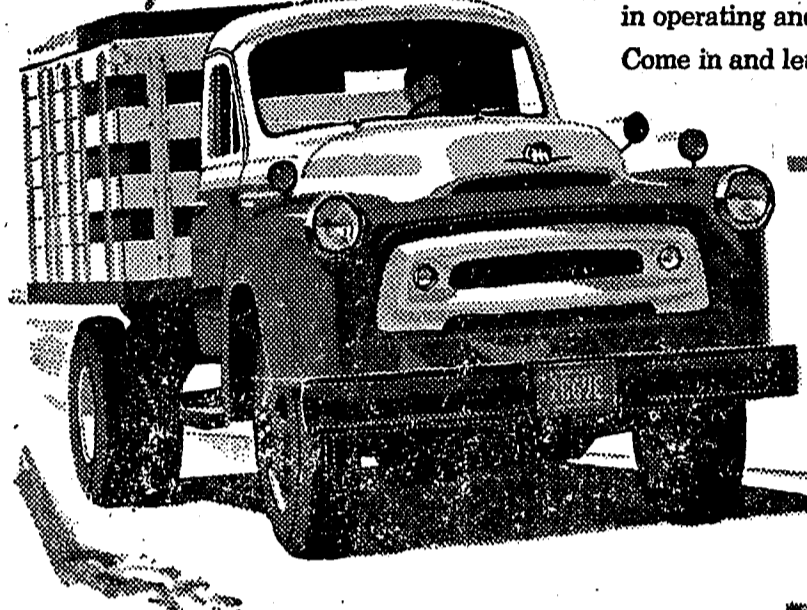

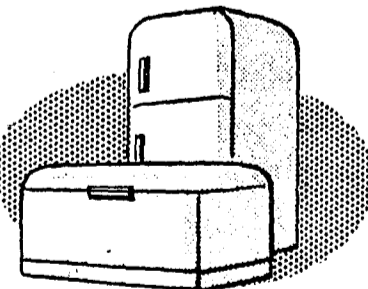

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

S. J. R. No. 4 "Shall Section 21 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho relating to the jurisdiction of probate courts, be amended to eliminate the provisions thereof which define said courts' jurisdiction in civil cases and which limit the same to cases wherein the debt or damage claimed does not exceed the sum of \$500, exclusive of interest, and to eliminate the provision relating to the concurrent jurisdiction with justices of the peace in criminal cases and in lieu thereof providing that the jurisdiction of the probate courts in civil and criminal cases shall be such as may be conferred by law?"

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The proposed amendment is designed to give the legislature more control in fixing the jurisdiction of probate courts. Under Article 5, Section 21, of the Idaho Constitution, as presently written, probate courts cannot determine civil cases involving more than \$500, and are limited to the same jurisdiction as justices of the peace in criminal cases.

S. J. R. No. 5

"Shall Section 22 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho relating to the jurisdiction of justices of the peace be amended to provide for the selection of justices of the peace and to eliminate the limitation of jurisdiction with respect to cases wherein the value of the property or the amount in controversy is not in excess of the sum of \$300, exclusive of interest, and in lieu thereof to provide that justices of the peace shall have such jurisdiction in civil and criminal cases as may be conferred by law?"

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The proposed amendment is designed to give the legislature more control in the manner of selecting justices of the peace and in fixing their jurisdiction. Under Article 5, Section 22, of the Idaho Constitution, as presently written, justices of the peace must be "elected" and they cannot determine civil cases involving more than \$300.

S. J. R. No. 6

"Shall Section 1 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended so as to permit the Governor to succeed himself in office?"

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The proposed amendment is designed to permit a governor to succeed himself in office. At present a governor is not permitted to serve two consecutive terms. After serving one term a governor is ineligible to hold such office again until after the lapse of one full term.

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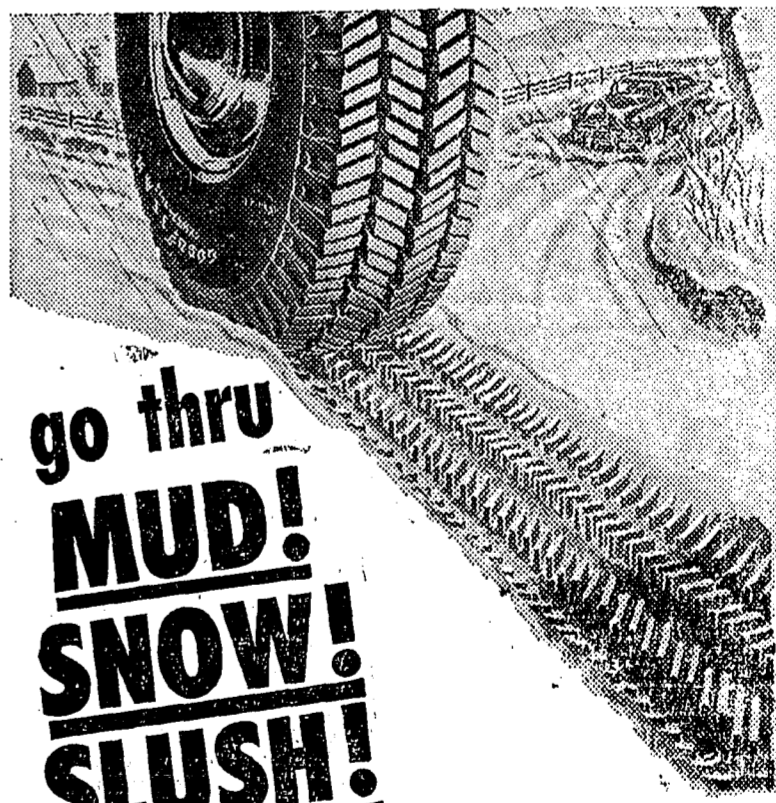
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
