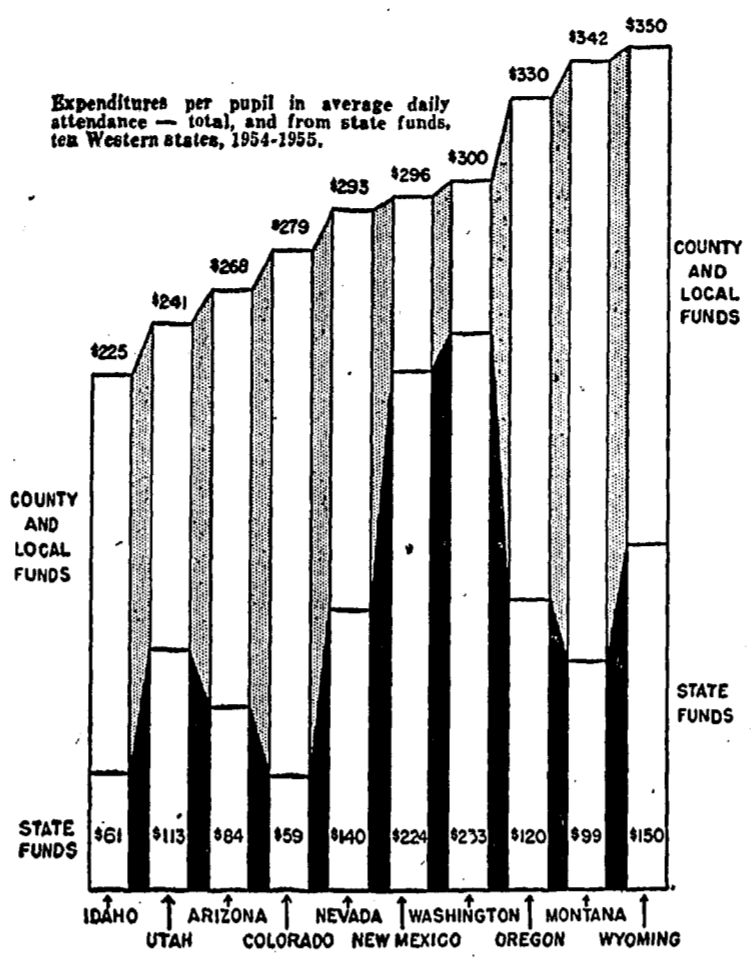

Idaho State Support Low, Per Capita Lowest



Decision In School Financing
This is the year of decision in Idaho educational support. The people of Idaho, through their legislative representatives, must decide in the 1957 session how Idaho schools are to be financed through state support.

Idaho must face the problem of public school support realistically and forthrightly with full knowledge of the facts. Idaho schools need fair, adequate and permanent support at the state level. Here are the reasons:

First: Idaho teacher salaries are the lowest in the western states. Our neighbors pay average salaries exceeding ours by a minimum of \$150 per year and a maximum of \$1,350.00 per year. The states which compete with us for our own teachers pay average salaries exceeding ours by \$800 a year and more.

Second: Our annual expenditures

per pupil per year are the lowest among the eleven western states, and in one western state, only, is the amount per pupil from state sources lower than in Idaho. Two western states provide as much in state funds per year per pupil as the total per-pupil per-year cost in Idaho.

The above chart will illustrate the second reason, stated above, for the need for greater school support in Idaho.

This situation must be studied and corrected if Idaho is to keep her fine teachers and educate her boys and girls and they deserve. The decisions of the people of Idaho, expressed through the Idaho Legislature which will meet in January, 1957, will determine Idaho's educational future. Adequate financial support must be the decision. — Gerald Wallace, Supt. of Schools, Pocatello, Idaho.

New Course Of Studies

U. of I. Moscow — Theodore Bjorn, Moscow, graduate student in forestry at the University of Idaho, will be adding a new course to his studies — multiple baby care. His wife last week gave birth to triplets, all girls, averaging more than six pounds each.

Although the pleased parents, Bjorn, 24, and his wife Kathleen, 23, were expecting triplets, Bjorn said the actual arrival had all the stunning effects of a complete surprise.

An X-ray taken last month forecast triplets, with a month to spare the Bjorns moved into a three-bedroom home among a group of prefabricated university houses.

Kent, the Bjorn's two-year-old son, is going to be surprised when his mother comes home from the hospital with three babies, Bjorn said. The youngster is merely looking for his mother — not a whole house full of potential playmates.

A Moscow store, however, quickly rose to the occasion. The Bjorns had purchased a layette there some time ago, so when the triplets arrived the store simply added two more — at no charge.

Twins are common to both Bjorn's and his wife's side of the family, but this is the first time triplets have been born on either side.

Although Bjorn eventually wants to work for the State Fish and Game department, he will first spend two years in the army after finishing his graduate studies.

Bjorn, who already schedules his study time when his young son is asleep, expects to do further study — and sleeping time — juggling. He hopes the three babies will awaken at the same time for their nightly feedings.

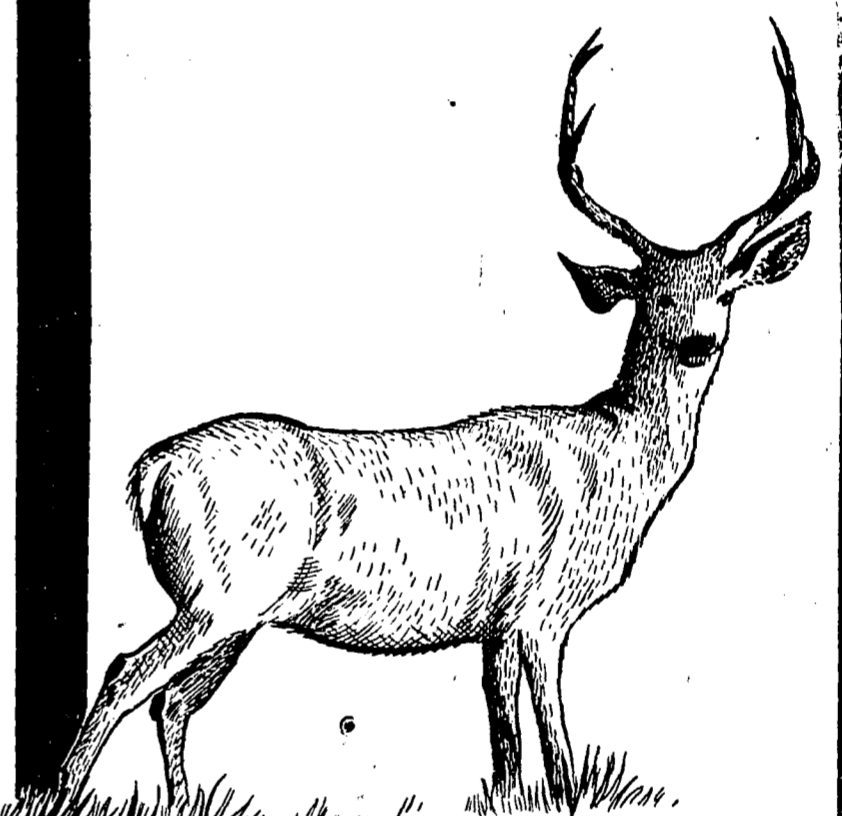
Daniels, a driver in the regiment's Company A, entered the army in December of 1954, and arrived overseas last November.

He was graduated from Orofino High school in 1953, and was a truck driver for Dammarell & McKeever Construction Co., Kendrick, before entering the service.

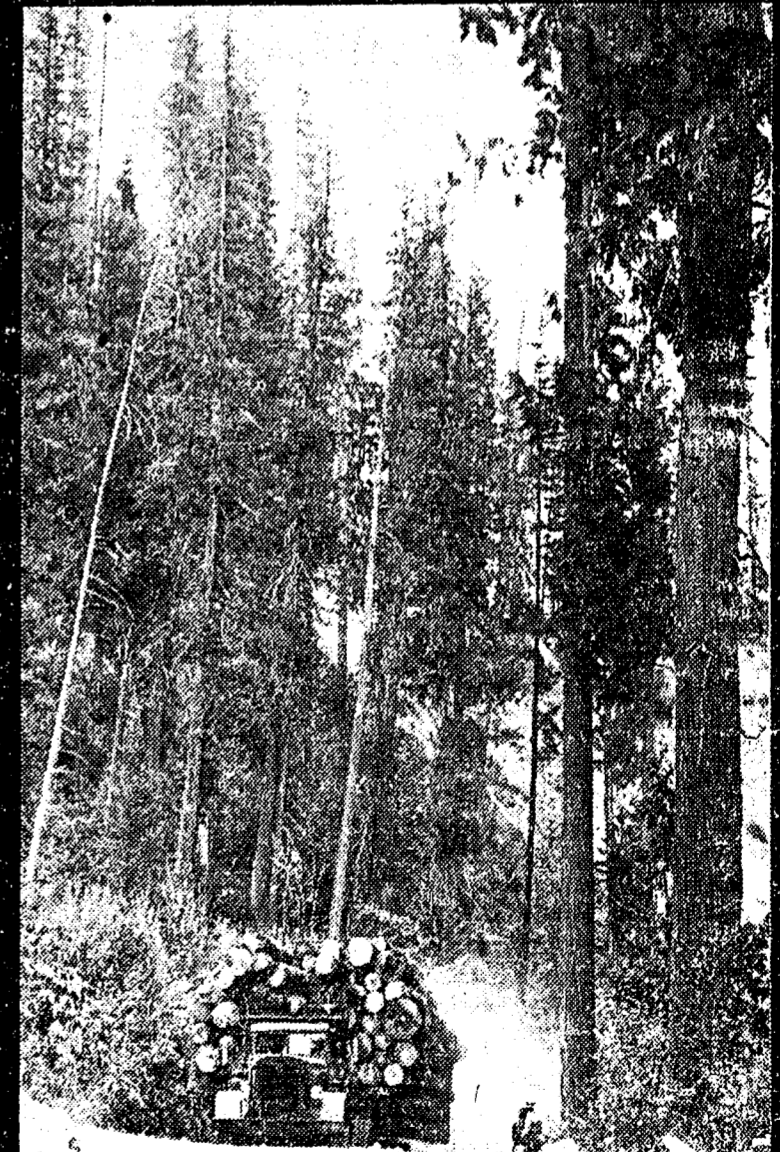

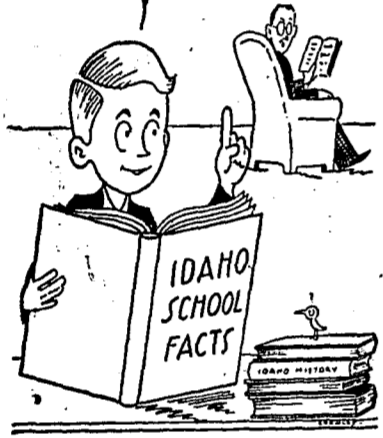
Better Ask Permission
 "Ask each time you hunt" is the key to hunting on private lands, the Idaho Fish and Game department reminded hunters this week.
 Ross Leonard, director, said the question of hunting on private lands is important mainly in connection with bird seasons. "We hunt most other types of game primarily on public lands, and when pheasant seasons come along some are inclined to forget that this species lives mainly on cultivated farm land when public safety and protection of private property are necessarily of primary consideration," he said. He added that most Idaho farmers have expressed their willingness to permit hunting on their lands if the hunters will ask permission each time they come to hunt, and respect the farmer's rights and safety while they are on the place.
 Leonard also reminded hunters that the state of Idaho protects the rights of farmers in this connection through rather firm laws of trespass in regard to hunting, and provides penalties for their violation.

Attends Historical Meeting
 Boise — H. J. Swinney, new director of the Idaho Historical Society, left Monday to attend the annual conference of the Mountain-Plains Museum association at Lincoln, Neb. The group, consisting of museum directors and staff members, will meet Thursday, Friday and Saturday under the auspices of the Nebraska Historical Society and other museums in Lincoln. The conference will concern itself primarily with the practical details of modern museum and historical society operation.

"Idaho can learn much from Nebraska's very successful historical program, which operates both on a state-wide and local level," Swinney said. He went on to say that the expansion of Idaho's historical program, now underway, can be guided by the practical experiences of neighboring states.

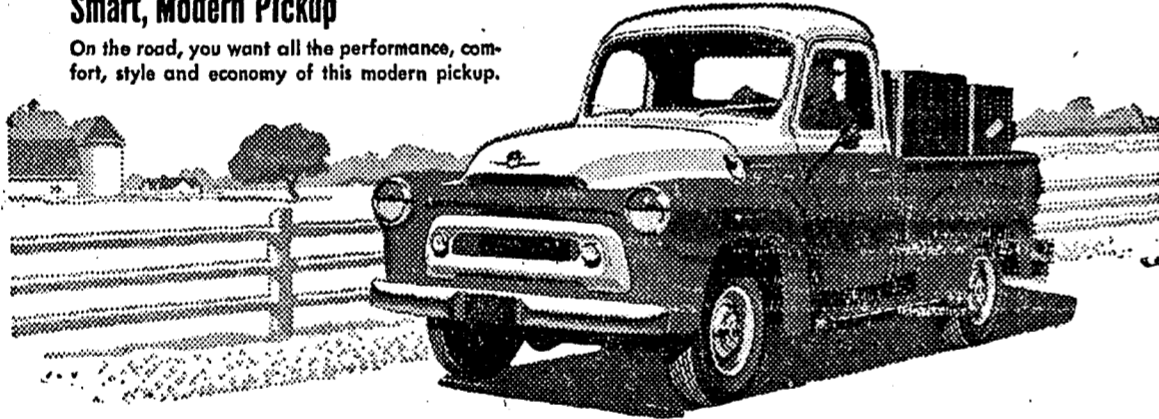

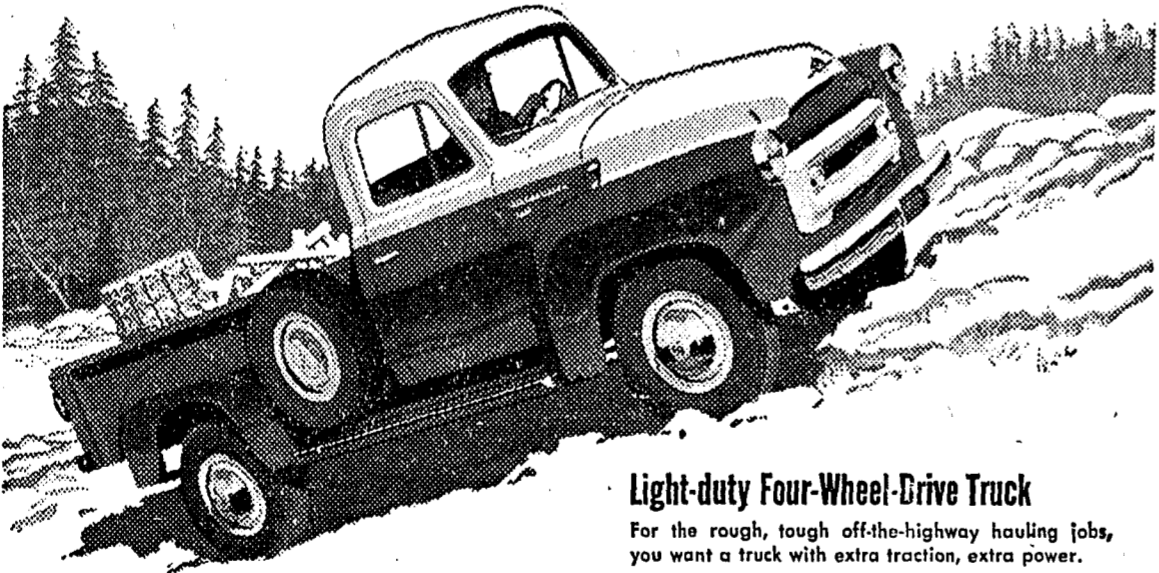

New Device Aids Study of Ultra Low Temperatures

DURHAM, N. C. — A four-inch length of spaghetti-size tubing filled with liquid helium is helping Duke University scientists explore the strange world of ultra low temperatures.
 Dr. William M. Fairbank, of the Duke physics department, and two colleagues invented and developed this device, called a "heat rectifier," to produce extremely low temperatures more easily and quickly than ever has been possible before.
 Their work marks another step in an eight-year-world-wide search for the best kind of "heat switch" to be used in getting down to temperatures only a few hundredths of one degree above absolute zero or minus 459.69 degrees Fahrenheit.
 Long sought, but not yet attained, absolute zero is the temperature at which molecules stop moving around. Low temperature studies, now being conducted throughout the world, are valuable in uncovering more facts about the fundamental nature of matter.
 The Duke heat rectifier lets heat travel in only one direction. It consists of a tube filled with a mixture of ordinary liquid helium and a rare form of helium produced by radioactive decay.
 This mixture, a thin colorless liquid, will conduct heat from the top to the bottom of the tube but not in the reverse direction.

Increased Income For Next 25 Years

Los Angeles—There is good reason to expect that the average American family's income will increase by 70 per cent within the next 25 years.
 This is the prediction of Dr. Neil H. Jacoby, dean of the Graduate School of Business Administration on the Los Angeles campus of the University of California. The forecast is contained in a new book, "Can Prosperity be Sustained?"
 A former economic adviser to President Eisenhower, Dean Jacoby shows how Federal machinery for managing the economy is now flexible and powerful enough to prevent severe booms or depressions, if used skillfully by the President and the Congress.
 "But, he warns, 'he would be a foolish man who managed his affairs on the assumption that business fluctuations are a thing of the past. We cannot assume that future recessions will be as mild as those following World War II and we still do not know how far business fluctuations—up and down—can go before they will be checked.'"

New Use Found for Grandpa's Flannels

CHICAGO — The pattern of grandpa's red flannels has been altered slightly and used to make a pressure suit for people with a serious type of low blood pressure.
 The light-fitting suit, made of elastic cotton-rayon knit material, applies pressure over the lower half of the body and helps prevent a patient with orthostatic hypotension from fainting when he stands up.
 Orthostatic hypotension — sometimes called postural hypotension — results from inability of peripheral arteries to constrict and maintain enough pressure to force the blood back to heart. The condition may be associated with diabetes mellitus or may follow a sympathectomy, an operation to relieve excessively high blood pressure. A person with the disorder is all right as long as he is lying down, but when he stands, there is a sudden drop in blood pressure and he becomes faint—unless he's wearing a pressure suit.

We're Healthier, We Live Longest

BERKELEY, Cal. — University of California physiologists, after analyzing disease and mortality tables in Europe and America, reports that Americans are not only living longer and in better health, but that those in the middle years are physiologically four years younger than their predecessors living at the beginning of the century.
 More individuals today live to reach adult life, they contract heart disease and cancer later in life, and it now appears that 5 to 20 years have been added to the productive early middle life.

Helping Hand

CHICAGO—A motorist's helping hand to fellow drivers got a court date for him and his mother.

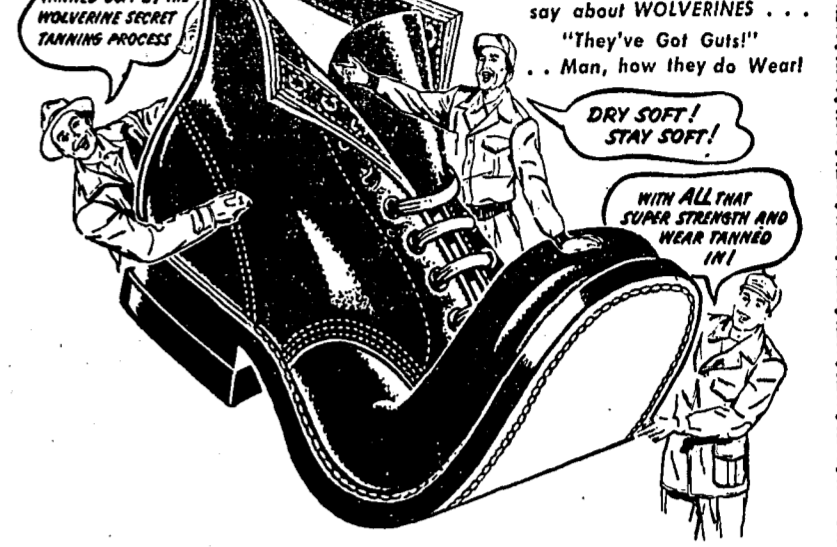

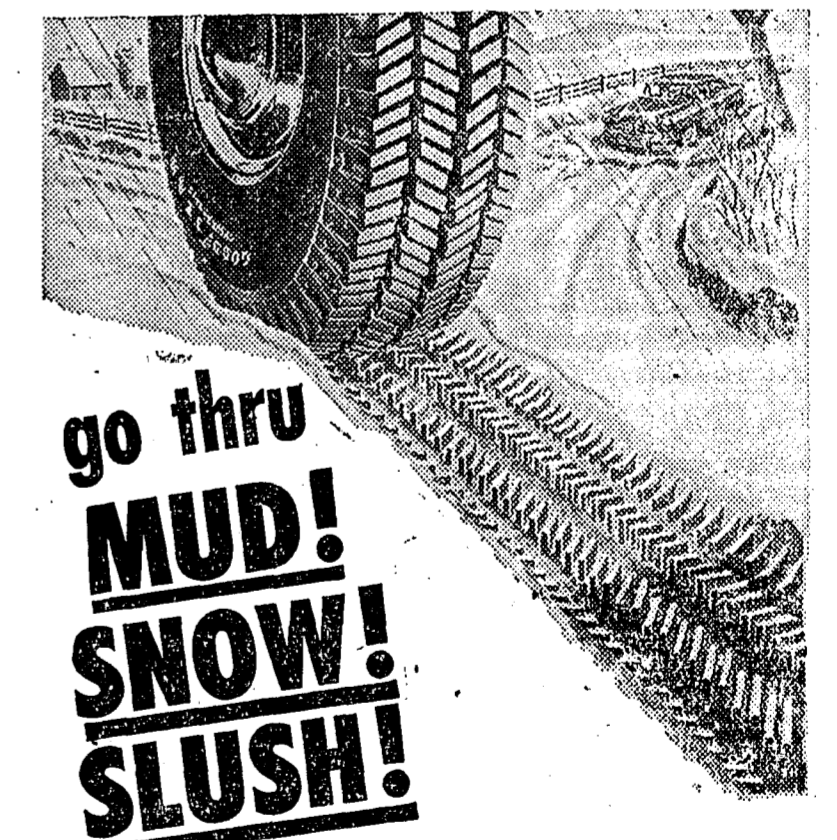
