Game Violation Arrests

Fish and game arrests continued high during November, though the report does reflect the beginning of the seasonal decline from October's high total. There was 184 cases processed during November, as compared with 265 during the previous month. Arrests are up this fall over last, there being 140 cases processed during November of 1955.
As might be expected, hunting violations accounted for most of the list, but there also were 25 cases for wrong class of license, and nine for fishing law violations. Of the hunting cases, 81 involved big game, including 16 for failure to stop at checking stations - 46 involved birds, including nine for violation of laws protecting swan, and 18 miscellaneous.
Fines totaled \$6,527.00. The largest was one for \$300 levied on a northern Idaho man for hunting deer after hours with the aid of artificial light, and without a license. Several fines ranging from \$100 to \$200 were set for moose, elk, swan and wrong class of license cases.

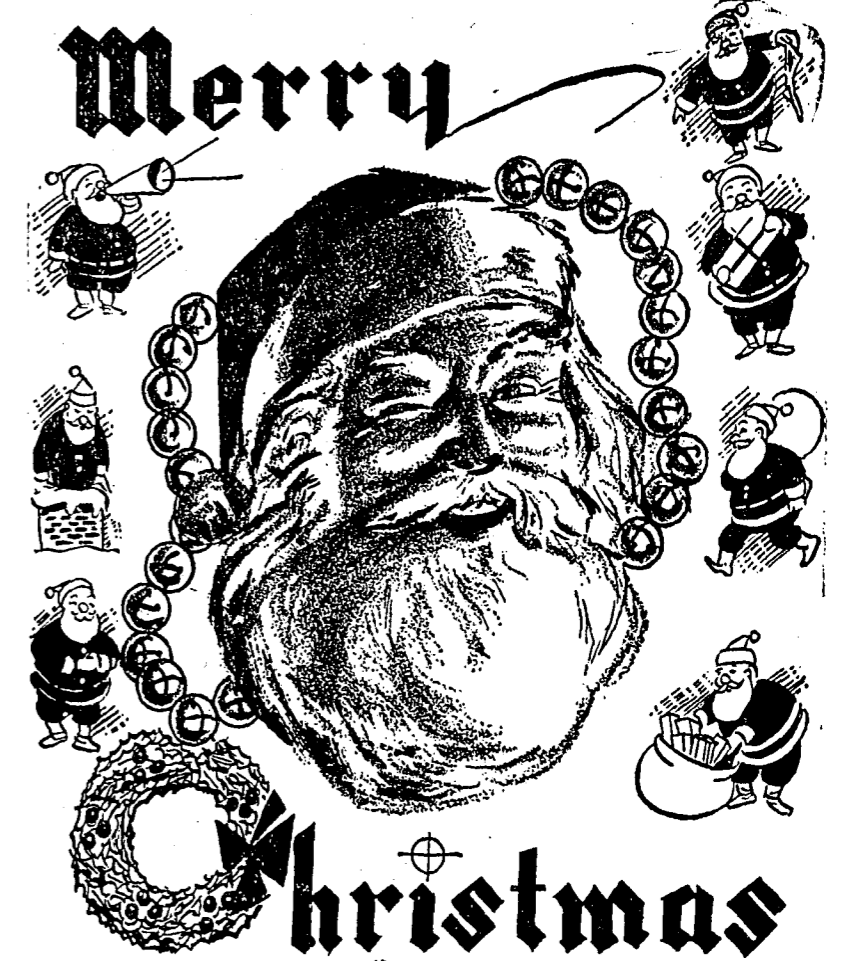

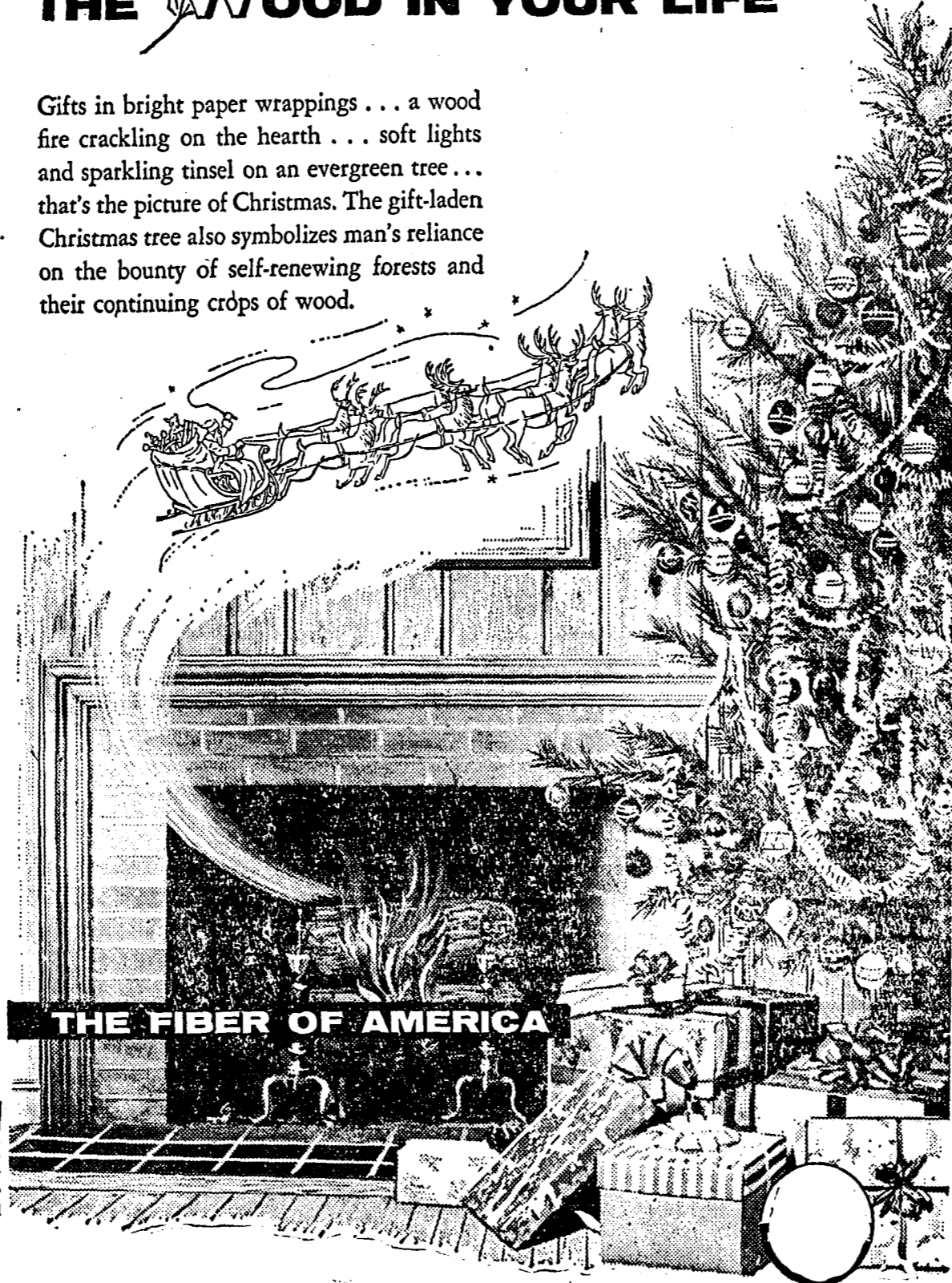

New Type Auto Insurance
Motorists in many states will soon be able to buy insurance coverage that will pay them the damages they are entitled to recover if they or members of their families are injured by uninsured automobiles, the National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters announced this week.

The bureau has filed this new coverage with insurance supervisory authorities in many states on behalf of its member and subscriber companies, William Leslie, general manager of the bureau, stated. In states where approval of insurance supervisory authorities is required it has been filed for approval.

Under the new coverage the company agrees to pay all sums which insured shall be legally entitled to recover as damages from the owner or operator of an uninsured automobile because of bodily injury caused by accident. Coverage will apply even when the injury occurs while the insured is not occupying an automobile, as, for example, if struck by an uninsured car while walking or bicycling. A "hit and run" car will be regarded as an uninsured car, and coverage will apply where neither the owner nor the operator of the "hit and run" car can be ascertained.


Our note: This type of insurance should be quite popular in Idaho, as this state has been notoriously lax in its enforcement of automotive insurance laws.

Set New Trade Mark

Bonn, Germany — West German exports to the United States will hit a post-war record of \$500 million this year.

West German purchases from the United States are expected to total \$900 million for the year, making America this nation's "most important" trade partner.

Dr. Georg Schaller, director of the German-American Trade Promotion Association, released these figures, saying:

"Both as regards West German sales to the United States and German purchases of American goods, an absolute post-war record will be established this year."

In an interview Dr. Schaller said: "During the first half of 1955, the United States was West Germany's sixth best customer. During the second half of this year the United States moved up to fourth place. I consider it possible that by the end of this year the United States will have become the second greatest purchaser of West German goods. The Netherlands is West Germany's biggest customer."

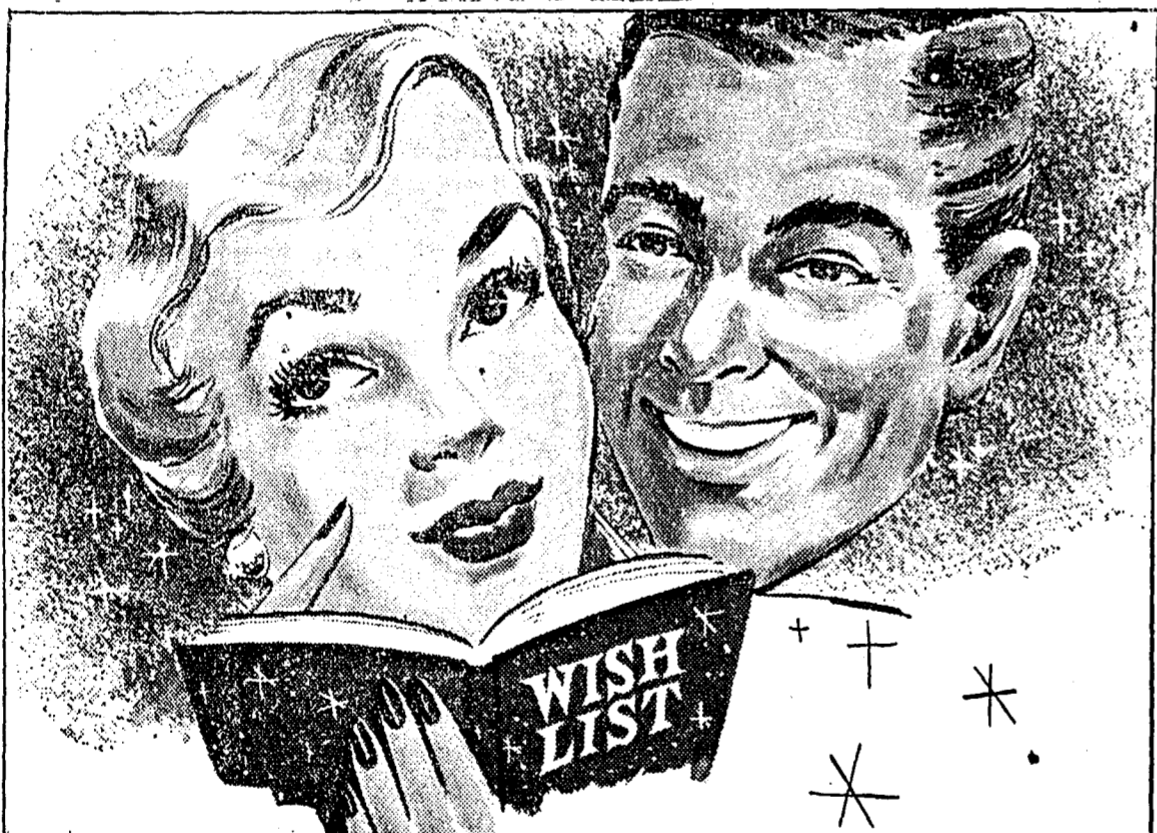

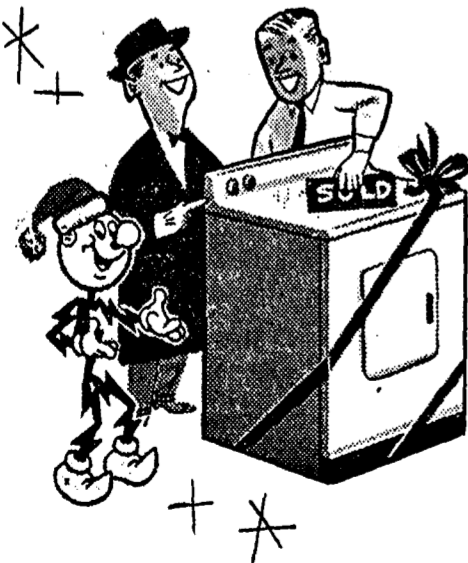

Tax Return Higher

An increase of more than \$55,000
in Idaho property tax payments over
1955 was noted this week by the
Washington Water Power Co., which
delivered checks to the tax collectors
of nine Idaho counties for the first-
half installment on a \$1,122,215.77 tax
bill for 1956 on company properties
in Idaho.

E. W. Hatch, Moscow District man-
ager for WWP, reported that the
company's Latah County tax bill this
year is \$60,868.51, with \$30,484.06 as
the amount of the first installment
delivered to county tax collector Ed-
na M. Theriault.

"WWP's Latah County taxes this
year are almost 2½ times the amount
levied ten years ago," Hatch said.
"It's interesting to note that last
year, the eleven tax-paying, business-
managed utilities operating in the
four Pacific Northwest states paid
the staggering tax total of \$161,000
a day, or \$6,737 an hour. This money
would pay for a new school classroom
every two and one-half hours if all
the money were used for that pur-
pose."

Other WWP property tax payments
in Idaho for the first half of 1956
were: Benewah, \$12,510.67; Clear-

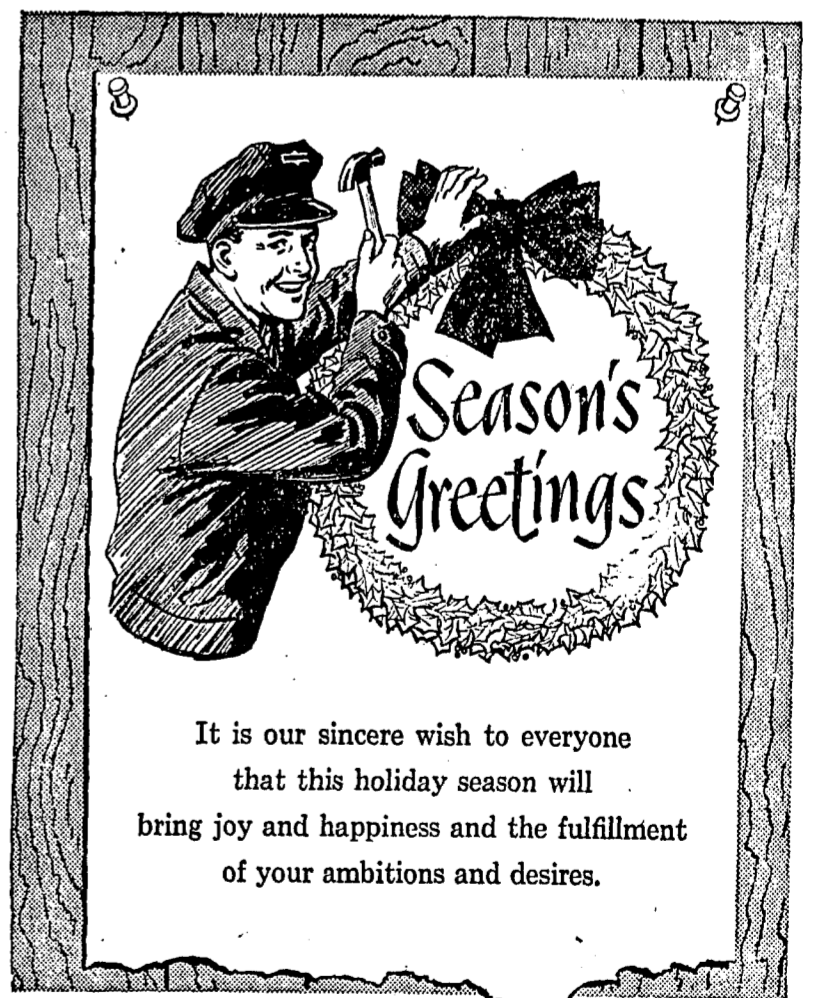
