COMMITTEE MULLS PROBLEM OF NEW LATAH COURTHOUSE

At the last meeting of the Latah County Chambers of Commerce, held in Moscow, a committee consisting of Wade Patterson, (chm.), Moscow; E. T. Long, Kendrick; Fritz Brinken of Potlatch; Willis Bohman, Troy; Ed. Morken, Genesee and Joe Holland of Bovill, were named to meet with the Latah County Commissioners on Friday, Jan. 4, and consider the problem of what to do about the Latah County Courthouse, with appears to be on the verge (literally) of falling down.

Newspapermen of the county, Moscow, Genesee and Kendrick, were asked to attend.

At the meeting itself only representatives from Kendrick and Juliaetta, and the newspapermen from Moscow and Kendrick were present. They were taken on a tour "of the old brick pile," including an examination of the so-called fire-proof vaults and jail cellar, where the county records are kept.

Tentative plans for the new courthouse, which is estimated to cost \$400,000 include:

A modern one-story and basement building, incorporating the present jail building, which is excellent in construction and design. The new building would also include office space for the ACS and SCS, which would pay a portion of building costs.

The present county assessed valuation is \$17,300,000, and which would, with a 2-mill levy, pay off the new building in 15 years. This 2-mill levy is not as bad as it might seem, for the county home and fair grounds are now paid off, so actually the levy would amount to only about 1 mill over the past assessments.

Taken on a \$50.00 per assessed valuation basis, the cost at Juliaetta would amount to about \$1.22 per year and at Kendrick \$1.12 per year.

In addition, \$4,200 per year now being paid out by the county for office rent down town would be applied toward the cost of the new structure.

It was brought out that a 3-mill sinking fund levy would build the desired unit in approximately 10 years, but in the meantime costly repairs to the present building would "eat up" all advantages of the sinking fund (interest, etc.).

There is no doubt but what this matter will come more and more to the front in coming months — so we present all available facts and figures now for the consideration of our readers.

Troy and Kendrick high school basketball teams battled into an overtime period Tuesday night before Kendrick won 47-45.

Bruce Clemenhagen's field goal in the overtime period gave Kendrick the victory margin. The score was tied at 41-41 at the end of four quarters.

Kendrick led 25-19 at half-time and held a 10-point margin with four minutes to play. Three baskets by Jack Hilliard brought Troy within range. Leroy Brocke stole a pass with about four seconds to go, made a basket, was fouled and made the free shot to knot the score.

It was Kendrick's fourth straight victory after losing its first three games, Lyle Parks led Kendrick scoring with 23. Hilliard potted 16 and Brocke 15 for Troy.

Kendrick won the B game 46-33.

Below, from the columns of the Kendrick Gazette, under date of Dec. 25, 1916, is the original account of Mr. and Mrs. Clark's wedding.

The ceremony took place under decorations of holly and evergreen. The wedding march was played by Mrs. Lydia Richardson.

The bride is the second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed. Hassler and the groom is second eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Clark, both being well and favorably known to our people. The ceremony was witnessed by a large assemblage of relatives and friends of the contracting parties.

After the couple had been pronounced man and wife, with their guests, sat down to a sumptuous wedding dinner, during which the bride cut the wedding cake.

In the evening a dance was held in honor of the newlyweds, about 75 taking part and which continued until midnight, when all partook of supper. This paper joins with their many friends in wishing the lately married young people a life full of happiness and prosperity.

ANNUAL MARCH OF DIMES

Boise — The 1957 March of Dimes Drive is now underway, and will run through January 31. J. W. Heckman, Idaho State March of Dimes chairman announced this week. He called upon Idahoans to generously support the campaign.

"I'm sure the people of Idaho are aware of the tremendous importance of the March of Dimes to Idaho," Mr. Heckman said, citing the fact that more than \$2,500,000 March of Dimes dollars have been spent just since 1947 in caring for Idaho polio patients.

"Since then each year polio incidence has added to our chapters rolls" he said, adding: "As of today there has been approximately one case of polio for every 273 people in our state — or an average of one case for every 68 families.

"During 1956 alone, eight Idaho chapters exhausted their funds and had to call upon headquarters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis for nearly \$50,000 to care for patients in their counties. During this same period the National Foundation supplied more than \$56,000 worth of lifesaving equipment within the state of Idaho."

Citing the tremendous cost of caring for polio patients, Heckman continued: "Obviously the least expensive way to deal with polio is to prevent it by using Salk vaccine. More than \$90,000 in federal funds is available to health officials to provide free vaccine to Idaho children in the 0 to 19-year-old age group. Of the 107 cases reported as of November, 1956, 76 were among children in that age group, for whom all the equipment necessary to administer the shots was available free of charge."

"I know," he said, "that the people of Idaho are eager to put an end to polio epidemics here, and that they will generously support the 1957 March of Dimes in order to assure that no past or future polio victim will go without proper medical care for lack of funds."

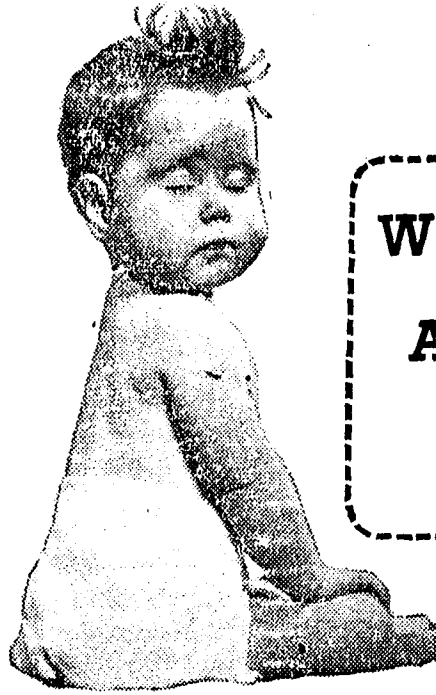

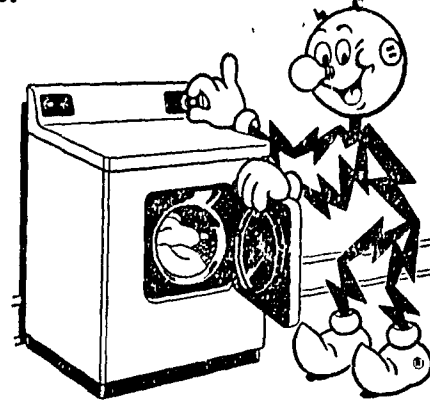
