HENRY JONES, KENDRICK, PASSES THURSDAY MORNING

Henry Jones passed away at the family home here Thursday morning, February 7, 1957.

Mr. Jones was born July 12, 1902, at Jonesburg, Kansas, the first son of George W. and Hattie M. Jones. In 1912 he moved with his parents; one sister, Dorothy, and brother Albert, to Idaho, settling at Southwick, where he lived until joining the Air Force in 1919.

On May 1, 1933, he was united in marriage to Allie M. Foster, and to this union were born four children, three sons, Henry L., George I. and Edward A., and one daughter, Jean C.

Following their marriage the young couple lived at Southwick for a year, moving to Weippe, where he was employed for another year. In 1935 they moved to Bend, Oregon, where he worked in sawmills and lumber camps for the next eight years, returning to Kendrick in 1943, where they have since resided.

In 1944 he went to work as Deputy State Fire Warden, under Manning Onstott. That fall, following the resignation of Mr. Onstott, he was appointed as State Fire Warden of the Kendrick district, a position he held at the time of his death.

Mr. Jones saw and helped the equipment grow from a rented office and a 4-foot-square tool house, and in the absence of state equipment, used his own pickup to answer calls — to a three-room office building, large warehouse and three-stall garage, with equipment and hand tools for at least 125 men. It was a work he loved and understood.

Mr. Jones took a very prominent part in Boy Scout work, and was Scoutmaster from 1949 to 1953, and at the time of his passing was chairman of the Boy Scout planning board for Kendrick. He always supervised the annual cutting of Christmas trees and their distribution by the Scouts, locating and often marking suitable trees during brush and fire inspection trips during the spring and summer. When ever possible he accompanied the Scouts on field and camping trips and saw to it that the rules of safety and proper outdoor activities were adhered to.

In his work with the Forestry Department Mr. Jones, whenever possible, gave deserving young men an opportunity for work, instructing them on the job, and looking out after their interests as well as directing them whenever fire fighting was under way. In this latter department he answered many calls that he would not have been required to under rules of his office — but did so in a genuine desire to help.

He leaves to mourn their loss, his wife, Allie, a son, Edward and daughter Jean, at the family home; two sons in the Air Force, Henry at Reno, Nevada, and George at Puntzi Mt., Canada. A brother, Richard at Blaine, Wash., a sister, Dorothy ReCard at San Diego, Calif.; three half sisters, Mrs. A. R. Garlinghouse, Lewiston, Mrs. Joyce Benson, Aloha, Oregon, and Mrs. Edwin Joyce, Dallas, Tex. Also many nieces and nephews.

Funeral services were held Monday, Feb. 11 at 1:30 p. m. in the Kendrick Assembly of God Church, with the Rev. H. L. Deweber in charge. Mrs. D. A. Christensen and Mrs. Jud Lee furnished the music, singing "Safe In The Arms of Jesus," "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere," accompanied by Mrs. Heyman Schupfer.

Lions Hear Safety Talk

State Patrolman Gordon Jones, of Lewiston, was the guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Kendrick Community Lions Club last Wednesday evening, and his talk indeed gave everyone food for thought.

Simple observance of "rules of the road" with emphasis on driver education, courtesy and "defensive driving" was advocated by Mr. Jones, to reduce Idaho's traffic slaughter.

Mr. Jones did not minimize the importance of proper highway engineering and police enforcement, but he said, "Perhaps we have not paid too much attention to the driver — his education is a very important cog in the highway safety program."

Mr. Jones said the nation's 1956 traffic deaths are still in the process of being compiled, but they will be "close to 42,000 killed. This is tremendous," he added, "but we seem to have become immune to figures."

In evaluating the old argument of "courtesy verses the right-of-way," Officer Jones pointed out that courtesy might save an accident, while the driver who legally has the right-of-way, may cause one, if he persists in using it.

He also said it was his belief that a great many of the teen age accidents (they have the highest percentage rate) could be averted if the child had been required to take supervised driver training while in school. He deplored the lack of this instruction in many schools, and its inadequacy in many others.

In addition to his talk a film on Safe Driving, in color and sound was shown — and it is a film that we believe should be seen by every driver, young and old alike. It really "tells the story."

Load Limits Now Applied

Lewiston, Feb. 11—Each spring the frost in and directly below the oil mat on our highways, thaws rather rapidly leaving a layer of wet surfacing under the mat and also leaving the oil mat slightly raised. Load and speed limits must be imposed for this period of thawing of the highway subgrade in order to protect the majority of highway users investment in the road, and prevent serious and costly "break-up." The speed and load limits will be lifted as soon as the frost is out of the ground and the subgrade has dried out sufficiently to restore the load carrying capacity of the highways.

The exact duration of the load limit postings is difficult to predict since it is entirely dependent on the type of weather we have during the next six or eight weeks.

Effective midnight, Wednesday, Feb. 13th, the following sections of State highways in District Four will be posted for load and speed restrictions as follows:

400 lbs. per inch width of tire or a maximum of 14,000 lbs. for any one axle, with a maximum of 10,000 lbs. for front axle, and a speed limit of

30 miles per hour for all trucks and busses — U. S. 95, top of Whitebird Hill to the Adams county line. State Route 42, Spalding to Jct. of State 7 at Kendrick. — Phillip A. Marsh, District Engineer.

Dates For Cancer School Set

Philip A. Dufford, Boise, president of the Idaho Division, American Cancer Society, this week announced the twelfth annual series of area cancer training schools to bring county and district commanders and their key workers up to date on cancer control work.

The schools are scheduled for February 15-16, Lewis-Clark Hotel, Lewiston; Feb. 22-23, Hotel Boise, Boise; and March 1-2, Hotel Bannock, Pocatello. The afternoon before each training school the commanders will gather for a planning session.

In 1955 the Idaho Division was presented a National Cancer Crusade Citation for its training of volunteers, giving them the knowledge and skill necessary to carry on the Society's life-saving work. Records show that since 1946 the volunteer cancer workers in Idaho have increased from 700 to more than 7,500. Reason for the concentrated effort of public education, explained Dufford, is that it has been demonstrated to be the most effective weapon in saving lives from cancer.

The program of the American Cancer Society is designed to provide "living insurance" for every person in this country by acquainting them with cancer's seven danger signals and the necessity for prompt medical attention whenever danger is suspected. The county commanders will each take home to her own area new knowledge and inspiration to share at local training schools.

"A well rounded program, including clinical histories of persons saved from cancer, has been arranged for each of the schools, and I feel confident that members of the army of volunteers of the Idaho Division will receive the kind of training that will make them more effective than ever before in the fight against cancer," Dufford said.

Idaho Gains Tree Farmers
Seventeen Latah county area timber property owners are new members of the Tree Farm organization.

Members of the Idaho Forest Practices Committee of the Western Pine Association certified tree farms recently at Spokane to bring the total acres of privately owned forest lands in the program to more than one million.

Twenty-four new Idaho tree farms were voted into the program which is sponsored by private industry.

Among the new members are John Darby and Estella Moser of Kendrick; Ray and Elmer Cuddy of Southwick.

Addition of the new units gives Idaho a total of 617 tree farms, making it the leading tree farm state in the 12-state Western Pine Association region.

Purpose of the tree farm program is to promote conservation and wise management of timber. The national sponsor is the American Forest Products Industries, Inc., made up of private industries.

Heavy Penalty For False Alarm
U. of I. Moscow — Any student at the University of Idaho found guilty of turning in a false fire alarm is to be expelled forthwith, according to a ruling of the Board of Regents, it was announced last week by President D. R. Theophilus.

The announcement followed the turning in of a false alarm early Feb. 5, which called, in 10-below zero weather, more than 25 firemen, four trucks and the emergency first-aid ambulance to the Gamma Phi Beta sorority house.

The following statement was issued by President Theophilus: "The Regents have instructed me to take drastic action in the matter of turning in false alarms if these originate on the university campus. The Regents have declared that in no way is a false alarm an excusable prank. It is sabotage of the efforts of volunteers dedicated to safeguard persons and property, and such sabotage might possibly lead to tragic losses such as occurred in the Gault Hall fire."

"The cooperation of all concerned is urgently requested."

New High For Enrollment
U. of I. Moscow — The University of Idaho today announced a new all-time high record for second semester enrollment with 3,491 registered, it was announced by D. D. DuSault, registrar. He added that late registrations should put the enrollment past the 3,500 mark.

The previous high for second-semester enrollment occurred in 1948-49, when 3,475 registered. That was the year of the big "G I Bulge" when more than 2,000 veterans of World War II were enrolled.

The current enrollment numbers 242 more students than the enrollment for the same period a year ago. This represents a 7 percent increase.

Full enrollment for this academic year also went up 7 percent to set an all-time record at 3,725. Second semester enrollment always drops below that of the first semester, with many students finishing their work for degrees.

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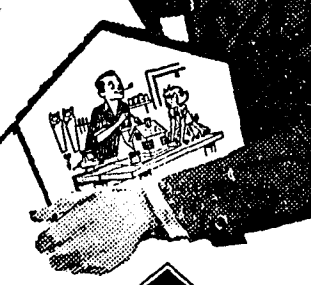
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
