### Tree Farmers Are Invited

Forestry students of the University of Idaho are conducting a farm woodlot management demonstration on the Western Pine Tree Farm of Gerald Comstock. This demonstration will take place on Saturday, April 27, at 1:00 p. m.

The woodlot belonging to Mr. Comstock is located on the west side of Highway 95, just south of the Palouse river, near Potlatch Junction, Idaho.

The demonstration will include the factors considered on good woodlot management, and will be held in conjunction with "Forestry Week," April 22-27. The purpose of this week is to give special emphasis to the many phases of forestry in the state of Idaho, and to help the people of the state gain an appreciation of the problems and significance of our forest, range and wildlife resources.

All tree farmers in the Kendrick-Deary-Troy area are invited to this demonstration. It is hoped that everyone interested in farm woodlot management will take advantage of this demonstration.

## W. W. (WHIPPLE) ELDRIDGE CALLED BY DEATH SATURDAY

William W. (Whipple) Eldridge, 71, a railroad man for 38 years and a farmer for a decade, died of a heart attack at the home of his son, Elmo Eldridge, Saturday evening at 6:00 o'clock. He and his wife had gone there to spend the evening watching TV, when he collapsed. He had suffered from a heart condition for about two years.

Mr. Eldridge was born April 10, 1886, at Dixie, Wash., and lived there until he was 24.

At that time, in 1910, he went to Alberta, Canada, where he engaged in farming and blacksmithing. He stayed at Alberta until 1936, when he moved to Belmont, Wash. where he became an employee of the Northern Pacific Railway. The family made their home there until 1945. That year they moved to Kendrick and he continued railroad work here for another 10 years, retiring in 1955.

He married Bertha Mae Jones at Dixie, Wash., Jan. 31, 1912.

Mr. Eldridge was a member of the Christian church and of the Kendrick Masonic lodge.

Survivors include his wife, at home; a son, Elmo Eldridge, Kendrick; a brother, Earl Eldridge of Dixie, Wash.; three grandchildren, and one aunt, the latter in California; one niece and one nephew.

Funeral services were conducted at 2:00 p. m. Tuesday at the Brower-Wann Funeral Chapel in Lewiston, with the Rev. H. L. Deweber of the Kendrick Assembly of God officiating. Interment was in Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens, Lewiston. The Kendrick Masonic Lodge was in charge of the graveside services.

Mr. Eldridge was a man who made friends easily and kept them. He was never too busy to lend a helping hand to friend and neighbor. He loved to garden, and the bountiful yield he always had showed that this love was not in vain.

Known as "Whipple" to his friends he will be missed by all.

## LATAH COUNTY VOTERS FAVOR COURTHOUSE BOND ISSUE

By a slim margin — yet wide enough to give it the "Yes" nod, the taxpaying voters of Latah county approved the issuance of bonds for the construction of new courthouse at the special election held last Saturday, April 13.

The unofficial returns show the following:

Bear Creek precinct, 18 in favor; 29 against; Bovill, 50 in favor, 11 against; Cora, 20 in favor, 13 against; Deary, 74 in favor, 59 against; Farmington, 9 in favor, 8 against; Genesee, 104 in favor, 48 against; Harvard, 22 in favor, 9 against; Juliaetta, 39 in favor, 45 against; Kendrick, 52 in favor, 35 against; Linden, 5 in favor, 12 against; Palouse, 37 in favor, 18 against; Potlatch, 83 in favor, 35 against; Princeton, 25 in favor, 38 against; Troy, 70 in favor, 151 against.

All of Moscow's precincts, as was expected, voted in favor of the bonds, as follows: No. 1, 50-15; No. 2, 92-10; No. 3, 70-43; No. 4, 132-42; No. 5, 148-16; No. 6, 131-37; No. 7, 80-25; No. 8, 85-9; No. 9, 189-18 and No. 10, 153 to 31.

For a time the issue seemed clouded in doubt, with Viola and Park precincts unreported, and their votes holding the balance of power. However, they went heavily in favor of the new courthouse.

As we understand it, all affidavits filed with the judges of election must now be checked against the tax rolls in order to weed out any illegal ballots, but the 80-vote margin seems very unlikely to be upset — so the issue may be considered resolved.

In the previous bond election for a courthouse, held some ten years ago, Kendrick and Juliaetta held the balance of power, their "no" votes proving the decisive issue. Recognizing this fact, the Latah County Commissioners, Mr. Broyles, Mr. Snow and Mr. Ingle inquired into the reason, and finding it to be "roads," got busy cooperating with Kendrick, Juliaetta and Troy in promoting a decent road to Moscow, via Troy, built a great deal of good will in a very short time.

It seems, however, that Juliaetta and Troy were not quite of so "forgiving a nature" as Kendrick, both of these communities going against the issue.

Some say Kendrick made a mistake in voting "Yes" until there was some concrete evidence of a road program that would enable us to get to Moscow and the new courthouse — but these folk should bear in mind that the present County Commissioners have pledged their support — and they will be in office for almost two more years.

We all know that Moscow fought the Troy, Kendrick and Juliaetta communities on their road — but that blame should perhaps be laid to a Moscow clique, rather than on the entire town.

The Moscow Chamber of Commerce could go still further to heal the breach by acting to secure a real road from Juliaetta and Kendrick to Troy and thence on to Moscow — but whether they will or not remains to be seen.

## Heavy Rain Storm Sunday

Following some beautiful weather the latter part of last week, Sunday dawned rather chill and cloudy, and about 8:00 o'clock rain began to fall. It was not until around 11:00 a. m., however, that the real downpour took place. So heavy was the rain that gutters about town ran curb-full.

From on the schoolhouse hill the rushing torrents brought down a considerable quantity of gravel, that was distributed over Main street, which had just been cleaned by members of the Volunteer Fire department and E. M. White, village custodian.

The downpour seeped into the main telephone cable of the Potlatch Telephone Co., and put some 14 lines out of commission. Monday work was still going on, draining the cable and drying the wires.



**APRIL PROCLAIMED AS  
"CANCER CONTROL MONTH"**

**Research On Precipitation**

U. of I., Moscow — University of Idaho research seeking a high-altitude precipitation gage that will operate throughout the winter without attention, now has five active cooperators. Additional grants of \$1,500, plus special equipment and labor, have been announced by Dean Allen S. Jenssen of the engineering experiment station, following formal acceptance by the university regents. The research is under the immediate supervision of C. C. Warnick, associate director of the station.

The army corps of engineers, concerned with the need for better records of precipitation at the various mountain elevations in Idaho, has made two grants to the university. One is \$500 from the Walla Walla district, the other \$500 from the Seattle district.

Another grant is \$500 from the U. S. bureau of reclamation, through the regional office at Boise. Through its snow survey section, the U. S.

Soil Conservation Service is assisting in making snow measurements both at Bogus Basin near Boise and on Moscow mountain.

Cooperative assistance also comes from the U. S. weather bureau and the city of Moscow. Through its Boise office and the office of the western area engineer at Sacramento, Calif., the weather bureau has provided on a loan basis, special equipment for recording temperature, humidity and wind velocity at the new Moscow mountain test stations.

Five test sites have been established on Moscow mountain. In addition to being part of the gage research project, they will provide informa-

tion essential in a study of Moscow's water supply. The city of Moscow is assisting by furnishing labor and transportation installing the mountain gages.

### Old Guns Tell The Story

Boise — Old guns of the Northwest are being made to tell their story in new displays opened in the state museum in Boise this week.

The development of shoulder arms is shown in one case, beginning with the flintlock muskets carried by the mountain men, and ending with the breech-loading rifles of the days when Idaho became a state. The story of Colt revolvers, which may have had more influence on the winning of the west than any other fire arm, is shown in a fan-shaped display in the second case devoted to guns.

"These two displays are part of our efforts to tell a story throughout the museum instead of merely exhibiting objects," said H. J. Swinney, director of the Idaho Historical Society. "Whether or not our visitors are interested in old fire arms, they find it fascinating to see these reminders of the days when a fire arm was sometimes more important to a man than his trousers."

In order to complete the displays, the College of Idaho in Caldwell loaned several pieces from its extensive collection to the Historical Society. In preparing the display, unusual difficulties were experienced since two of the revolvers were stolen while the cases were open. Quick work by the Boise Detective Bureau resulted in the return of the weapons within 24 hours.
