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


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

Melium Effect on Living Organism Reported at U.C.

Helium, argon and possibly other mert gases—gases which do not combine chemically with other elements—are far from inert in their affect on living organisms.

This is reported by Dr. S. F. Cook professor of physiology in the Uni-versity of California school for medicine.

Dr. Cook has completed experiments in which he studied the reactions of small animals living in an artificial atmosphere consisting of oxygen and helium or of oxygen and argon.

The artificial atmosphere contained the same amount of oxygen sound in the normal earth's atmosphere-about 20 per cent. But nitrogen, which forms nearly all of the remaining 80 per cent of the earth's atmosphere, was removed and the inert gas substituted in this same proportion. The ordinary atmos-pheric pressure of sea level was maintained.

When helium was used in such an stmosphere, the physiological processes of mealworms, lizards and mice were markedly changed. Simi-Mr. but less marked, changes were observed when argon was used. The principle effects of the two

gases were retardation of growth in the animals and an increase in the metabolic rate-a stepping up of the pace of work done by the body in the living process.

The research indicates that it may be useful to substitute helium for nitrogen in air used by men working in some tunnels, underwater construction projects, and some other conditions of high pressure.

Mard Pad Canine Disease Gives Dog Owners Scare

A serious distemper-like infection that leads to hardening of the foot gads and nose is being seen in American dogs, but there is no evidence that it is a new disease or that it is becoming more prevalent.

Alarming reports from England, where the so-called hard pad condition is reported to be widespread, have made many United States dog **lovers** overly fearful of the disease.

Thickening, hardening, and peeling of the foot pads and nose sometimes occur in advanced stages of distemper or distemper-like illness, But this condition always is seen in company with other symptomsmever alone.

Among theories as to the cause are:

(1) The canine distemper virus may undergo a change, under cer-Main conditions, that causes it to produce symptoms that differ from those seen in typical distemper "Hard pad" may be one of cases

Medina Mosque Is Younger **Building than White House**

According to tradition, Mohammed journeyed north from Mecca to the region of Yathrib's oasis. where he loosed his camel to wander unguided until it stopped and knelt. There the mosque was built. Disciples renamed Yathrib Madinat al-Nabi, meaning City of the Prophet, now varied to Medina.

The original house of worship has been rebuilt several times. No existing relics of previous structures bear proof of use earlier than 1306. The present Great Mosque is actually newer than the White House in Washington and replaces an earlier mosque which was destroyed by fire only a century ago.

Though somewhat crowded by other buildings on its south side, the mosque stands out gracefully from most angles of approach. Its minarets are shapely, its dome a restful, dull green. Dominant construction material is a locally quarried crystalline rock of pinkish hue, with occasional elaborate inlay and faience decoration.

Pilgrim trade is easily the chief business of Mecca, Medina, and Jidda, the Red Sea port by way of which nine-tenths of the worshiping tourists now travel. The two shrine cities each have sacred areas where unbelievers are not welcome and subject to trespassing fines or jail terms.

Date growing is the second industry around Medina's oasis, which is larger than Mecca's and can support more population. Under Turkish rule prior to World War I, Medina counted 80,000 people and was the southern terminus of a railroad from the cities of present Jordan, Syria, Turkey, and Iraq to the north.


Not until Mohammed moved from Mecca to Medina, did his creed begin the expansion that now encompasses 250,000,000 followers.

Drug Given By Mouth Said To Relieve Pain in Cancer

A chemical compound which can be given by mouth is reported by seven New York doctors to be useful in bringing temporary relief to patients suffering from fatal cancer-like diseases of the white blood cells and tissues.

The oral use of triethylene melamine on 58 patients is described by Drs. David A. Karnofsky, J. H. Burchenal, George C. Armistead, Jr., Chester M. Southam, J. L. Bernstein, L. F. Craver, and Cornelius P. Rhoads. The doctors are all associated with the Memorial Center for Cancer and Allied Diseases, New York.

Triethylene melamine is a valuable addition to the small group of drugs now known to be effective in relieving pain in these types of disease, according to the doctors. This is due primarily to the fact that it can be given by mouth, releasing the patient from his dependence on a doctor for administration of the drug. All the other drugs, they point out, have to be injected intravenously, which almost always makes hospitalization necessary. Clinical trials with the drug are now being widened to include a greater variety of tumerous conditions, they said.

Cleaning Up

New Course in Science

A revolutionary approach to the teaching of science which combines all the sciences in a single course emphazing their relationship to man was described to the 118th national meeting of the American chemical society held in Chicago, by Dr. John Xan, head of the department of chemistry of Howard college, in Birningham, Ala. Taught without a. text, the course is designed to give students a broad acquaintance with the modern scientific world and an effort is made to stimulate wheir interest in scientific discoveries and periodicals by basing examinations mainly on knowledge acquired outside the classroom, Dr. Xan reported. Ninety to 95 per cent of students finishing the com-Bined general science course have voted for it in preference to the conventional type of science course.

Candling is used on practically all eggs before they reach the stores. An electric light is placed inside a box with a hole about the size of an egg, in which the egg is placed. In a darkened room, with some practice, it is possible to detect cracks, blood spots, developing germ and the size of the air cell. The latter is the most important criterion of freshness because it gets larger as moisture escapes and is replaced by air. By comparing a few eggs known to be fresh with others that are older, one may learn how to judge the size of the air cell and the age.

Changing "Hand-Me-Downs"

Giving "hand-me-downs" a new and different color via the dye-bath is one sure way of getting little sister or brother to wear them withaut resentment. Adding a hem, col-Ear or belt will still further accentuate the "new look." Wash and thoroughly rinse all articles before dyeing, and also remove buttons, Buckles and trimmings. Use color remover first, the bureau counsels. when the article is unevenly faded er spotted and when changing to a different color.

In the Smithsonian Institution's laboratory of vertebrate paleontology, six tons of fossil bones belonging to the extinct gigantic ground sloth, Megatherium, are being cleaned and repaired. The skeletal remains of this grotesque animal were collected in western Panama by Dr. C. Lewis Gazin, curator of vertebrate paleontology of the U. S. National Museum, assisted by Dr. Theodore E. White, paleontologist of the Smithsonian's River Basin Surveys. The Smith-sonian Institution paleontologists will attempt to reconstruct for exhibition in Washington a complete skeleton of the giant sloth. A large part of the collection will be returned to Panama for exhibition there.

Forming Pearls

Although some pearls are formed in fresh-water clams and oysters, the most valuable come from the marine pearl oysters of eastern Asia. They occur when some foreign object-perhaps a tiny grain of sand -gets between the shell and the body. The animal then secretes around the object successive layers of a material called nacre, which consists of calcium carbonate. This is the same material as the "moth-er of pearl" lining of the shell. The Japanese make "culture" pearls by deliberately introducing small particles of graphite into the oys-ter and keeping it for several years as the pearl is formed.

Infrared Rays

Infrared rays are similar to rays of visible light, except that the length of their waves is greater than those of red light, which are about 1/40,000th of an inch and are the longest that the eye can detect. The longest infrared waves are about 1/65th of an inch long. Any hot object-the Sun, an open fire, a red hot poker, a warm radiator, an electric lamp, etc. - sends out infrared radiation, often with visible rays as well. Special electric lamps to generate these rays, used for applying heat, have a filament which operates at a lower temperature than is used in one designed mainly for purposes of illumination.

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

Timing is the first thing to con-ider in spraying weeds. They are nost vulnerable to 2,4-D at a certain ime. The weeds should be growing igorously and should not be past the oud stage. Soil moisture should be good. For selective spraying be sure the grain is past the stooling stage but

Timing Important In Spraying

ias not reached the boot. It may be necessary to take a little crop damage to get the best weed control. Jenerally, though, weeds are at their nost delicate condition when the grain crop is least likely to be damaged,

The kind of spray material makes a difference. If recommendations call for 2,4-D then you can expect best results from that. Don't use some other chemical. Selective spraying in cereals calls for 2,4-D.

The rate of application has a bearing on results. Selective spraying requires one pound of actual 2,4-D per acre for control of annual weeds and weeds. Lower rates will get the plant two pounds for control of perennial that is easy to kill and allow the more resistant types to increase. If you apply higher rates than those recommended for the job it will cost

more and may cause crop damage. The amount of water influences the weed kill and crop damage. Thirty gallons per acre is recommended for of said Emeline Ingle, deceased, and application in irrigated areas and 20 gallons on dry farms.

Formulation is another ingredient of successful weed spraying. The recommended formulation is four pounds of amine salt of 2,4-D. The amine salt is generally a combination of different amine forms. Amines are not as spectacular as ester, but they are just as effective and generally cost less.

Use esters with caution. They are likely to drift and cause damage to nearby vegetation.

Sit-Down Dentist's Career **Is Longer, Professor Says**

Several years of service will be added to the life of the average dentist if he sits down part of the time while he works.

This is the belief of Edgar W. Swanson, D.D.S., M.S.D., professor of operative dentistry at Northwestern university dental school, who recommends that dentists use operative stools at least 50 per cent of the time.

Dr. Swanson said students in the operative technique laboratory at the Northwestern dental school use operative stools about 60 per cent of the time. Students in the clinics use the stools from 10 to 90 per cent per operation.

Northwestern, convinced that operative stools will be used more widely by dentists to eliminate fatigue and extend their years of service, trains students in the use of the stools.

To obtain more accurate information on the reaction of students to the stools, the school recently sent a questionnaire to every member of its senior class.

The first question was: "Do you feel as tired at the end of the day when you have used an operating stool as you do when you have operated from the conventional standing position?" All but three answered "no." Two of those answering "yes" said it may have been due to their limited experience with the use of a stool.

The second question was: "Do you like the idea of sitting while operating?" All answered "yes." To the question, "Would you do more operating from a sitting position if more stools were available?" All senior students answered 'yes."

Dr. Swanson points out that the operative stool enables a dentist to change his position during the day, which is extremely important in preventing fatigue.

Sugar-Graving Animals Lured by Poison Plants

There may be danger ahead when livestock pass up lush pastures in favor of weeds and tough plants.

The attraction may be a poisonous spray or other chemical that gives ordinary unpalatable weeds and plants a special taste-appeal.

A bulletin issued by the American Veterinary medical association explains it this way: Certain chemicals used in farming, such as sodium chlorate, turn plant starches to sugar, and animals with a "sweet tooth" readily eat the converse readily eat the sprayed plants.


