DENNIS POETER, AREA OLDTIMER, PASSES; CLARKSTON

Dennis Porter, 83, retired farmer, died at 12:35 Friday morning at the Tri-State Memorial Hospital in Clarkston. Though he had been a hospital patient for only two weeks, he had been in poor health for ten years.

Mr. Porter was born at Seemore, Wis., March 2, 1874. He came west with his parents when he was 14. The family first settled at Garfield County, near Pomeroy.

He married Hulda Nelson at Pomeroy on July 1, 1907. Mr. and Mrs. Porter spent most of their adult lives on farms in the Leland and Kendrick districts. He retired in 1945 and they came to Clarkston to live. Their home was at 1246 8th Street. Mr. Porter died in 1954.

Surviving are six daughters and four sons. They are: Mrs. Eleanor Kime of Clarkston; Mrs. Anna Thornton of Leland; Mrs. Velma Davis of Roseburg, Ore.; Mrs. Zelma Daniels of Lenore; Mrs. Charlotte Kennedy of Elgin, Ore.; and Mrs. Marcella Emmett of Kendrick. The sons are Lewis Porter of Orofino; George Porter of Deary; and Chester Porter, whose address is unknown, and Lloyd Schaeffer of Deary. Other survivors are two brothers, Lewis Porter of Pomeroy and Henry Porter of Troy, Oregon; also 38 grandchildren and 22 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon at 2:00 at Merchants Funeral Home, Clarkston, with the Rev. R. S. Daugherty of the First Methodist Church, Clarkston, officiating.

Pallbearers were old-time friends, Bob Clemehagen, Floyd McGraw, Arthur Foster, John Galloway Dick Blewett and Melvin Garner. Mrs. De Voie Miller, organist, sang "The Lord's Prayer" and "Beyond the Sunset."

Tigers' Athletic Record
The Kendrick Tigers have compiled an athletic record this spring in baseball and track, of which any school might well be proud — and here is a brief resume:

On Friday, May 3rd, the Tigers met Lapwai on their home grounds, and drubbed the Lapwai Wildcats by a score of 7 to 6 — in ten innings. Meskie drove in the winning run, a single, with Wegner on third base. It was the first baseball win from Lapwai in seven years. Batteries were Clemehagen and Armitage.

On Monday, May 6th, the baseball team tangled with Clearwater, and emerged victorious by a score of 5 to 3. Batteries were Clemehagen and Armitage.

In the District playoffs at Kamiah on May 8th Kendrick won from the Greencreek nine by a score of 8 to 2. Batteries were Foster and Armitage, Foster pitching a two-hitter.

On May 10th the Tigers lost to the Kamiah Kings by a score of 6 to 5 — eight innings being required to decide this one. Batteries were Clemehagen and Armitage. This game gave them third place in the District with a season's record of 4 wins and 2 losses, both of the latter being to Kamiah.

In batting average Jerry Armitage led with .353, closely followed by Leonard Eldridge with .350.

Regional Track Meet
In the Regional track meet held at Moscow Kendrick won fourth place. School standings were: Nezperce, Clearwater, Priest River and Kendrick.

Wegner won fourth place in the high hurdles and third in the low hurdles.

Magnuson won second place in the 440-yard dash, qualifying for the state meet to be held in Boise.

Parks won second place in the pole vault, also qualifying for the state meet.

Browning won fourth in the 100-yard dash and third in the 220-yard dash.

In the mile relay Kendrick won a second place, qualifying for the state meet.

In the medley relay the Tigers also won second place, again qualifying for the state meet.

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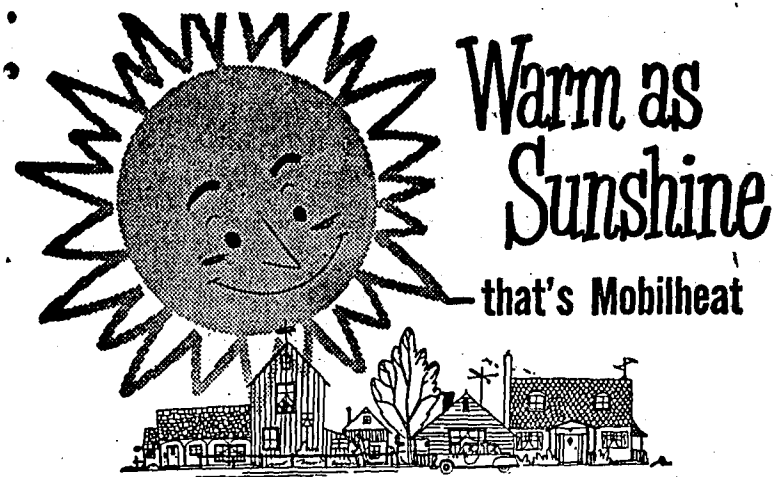
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WVP CO. OUTLINES PROGRESS IN EXPANSION PROGRAM

Details of progress made in the biggest expansion program in the history of the Washington Water Power Co. were among the highlights of the firm's 67th Annual Report distributed to 19,000 company stockholders.

More than \$22,300,000 was spent last year for new and improved system facilities, including \$14,830,000 for work on the company's mammoth Noxon Rapids dam now under construction in western Montana.

Approximately \$1,829,000 was spent in 1956 to complete the first unit of the company's new Spokane Central Service Facility. Contracts for the second phase of construction, involving a five-story office building and adjacent cafeteria-auditorium building, were let in November, with work expected to be finished in the summer of 1958.

On the financial side WVP announced that revenues from the sale of electricity increased \$1,758,273, or 7.7 percent over the previous year for an all-time record total of \$24,599,412.

Average residential consumption of electricity on the company's system jumped 358 kilowatt-hours for the year to 7,845 kwh. The combined rural-residential average was 8,100 kwh for 1956, compared to an estimated national average of 3,105 kwh.

Earnings for the common stock of the company amounted to \$2.29 per share compared with \$2.11 in 1955. Total dividends paid were \$4,262,911, an amount equivalent to approximately 16 cents per revenue dollar. Wages, salaries and employee benefits amounted to \$5,039,110.

Direct taxes and provisions for deferred income taxes took a total of 24 cents of the company's revenue dollar, or \$6,250,368.

The report also pointed out that 1956 is the first full year in which the company has provided electric service to 2,300 former customers of the Stevens County Public Utility District. Following the November, 1955, election, 71 percent of the voters in Stevens county elected to have service provided to them by the W. P. Co., rather than by a PUD. "In no other instance in the state's history," the report noted, "has a private utility purchased PUD properties."

In addition to recording the numerous improvements to the former PUD system, W. W. P. said that the first month's billing in the Stevens county area showed that former PUD customers were billed a total of \$7,582 less on company rates than they would have been under PUD operation. Only 61 customers, large users whose kilowatt hour consumption, was over 2,150 per month, showed a very slight increase in their monthly bill. All others averaged a 53 percent decrease. Appliance sales in the area increased 62.4 percent during the first five months of 1956, while average residential use of electricity by former PUD customers showed an increase of 1,200 kilowatt hours, compared with 358 kilowatt hours for the company as a whole.

Approximately 5,000 new customers were also added during the year as a result of the purchase of properties formerly owned by the Citizens Utilities Company of Deer Park, Wash., and the Bunker Hill Co. of Kellogg, Idaho.

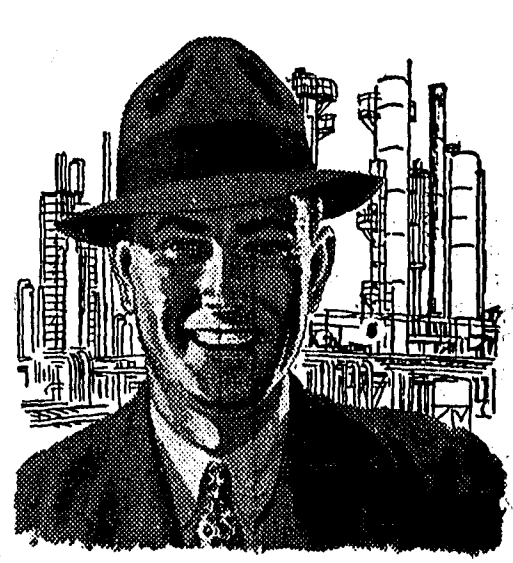

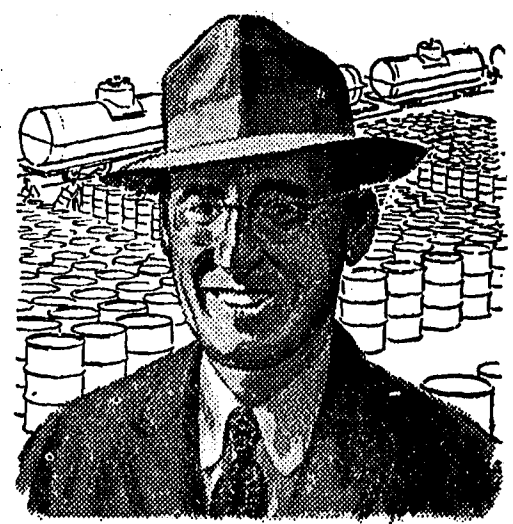

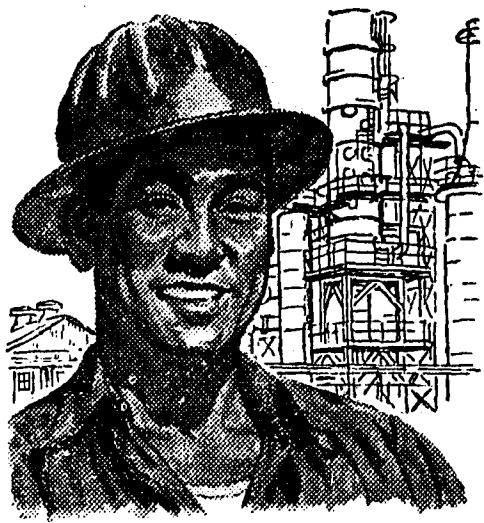

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Pheasant Count Going On
 Boise — With most of the state's better pheasant ranges still relatively free of deep snow, the birds continue to feed freely in fields and weed patches, but are beginning to gather in flocks, the Idaho Fish and Game department says.
 Robert L. Salter, game bird supervisor, said the annual sex ratio counts have started so as to take advantage of the birds' habit of concentrating in flocks during the winter. He said the counts will be intensified during periods when snow covers increase the concentration of birds and make them easier to see.
 He explained that the purpose of the count is to furnish a basic ratio to be used later with the crowing-count index in figuring the relative

level of brood stock numbers. "We don't make these counts to find out if we have enough roosters," Salter said. "We know we have more than we need. But we need the sex ratio, that is, how many hens per rooster, each year, so we can compute the new brood stock index each spring." He added that the "index" number shows whether the stock is up or down in comparison with previous years.

Conservation officers and biologists conduct the counts in connection with other duties, Salter said.

"Trained observers are needed because the hens have a habit of flocking more closely together than roosters, and are more easily noticed than the more scattered groups of roosters," he explained. "This often gives the casual observer a false impression that roosters are scarce, but officers use binoculars in a systematic examination of the area around each flock sighted, and usually come up with a ratio of about two or three hens per rooster."

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





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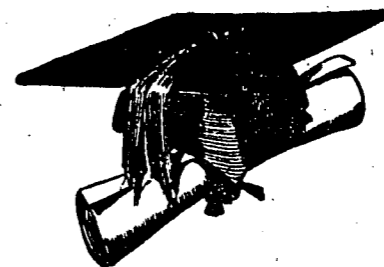
