New Gasoline Forms Required

Boise — Farmers claiming the new 3-cent per gallon federal gas tax refund must file for them between July 1 and September 30 this year.

The old 2-cent per gallon forms cannot be used, and new ones are being mailed direct to all farmers who received refunds last year.

Extra forms and new instruction booklets will be available at all internal revenue and county agricultural agent's offices.

The refund claim now cover a full year period, July 1, 1956, to June 30, 1957, for all gasoline purchases made for strictly farm operations, not highway use.

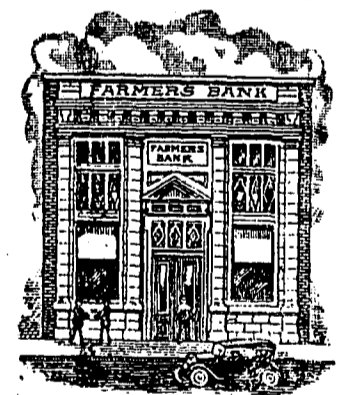

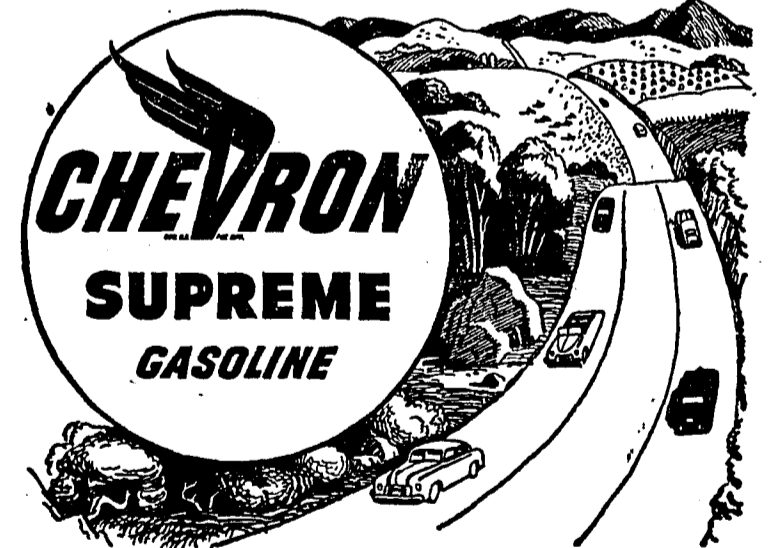
