Elwood L. Pearson, 61, retired since 1952, died Monday night at 10:10 at the St. Joseph's hospital, Lewiston. Death was attributed to a heart condition.

Mr. Pearson had been a Lewiston resident since 1942. A resident of six different towns during his lifetime, he held occupations from farming to assistant postmaster. He resided with his wife at 220 6th Ave., Lewiston.

Mr. Pearson was born July 26, 1896, at Leland. He lived there until 1911 when he moved to Asotin where he engaged in farming. Mr. Pearson was united in marriage to Mrs. Nova Hund, at Asotin, on Jan. 1, 1922.

In 1923 they moved to Cavendish where he farmed until 1929. They then moved to Southwick. In 1931 they moved to Kendrick where he was assistant postmaster for four years. In 1942 Mr. and Mrs. Pearson moved to Lewiston, where he was employed in the parts department at Gray-Webb Buick Co. He retired five years ago.

Mr. Pearson was a member of the Methodist Church. He also belonged to the American Legion and the 40 and 8.

Survivors include his wife, Nova, at the family home, Lewiston; four step children, Mrs. Walter Silflow, Kendrick; Mrs. Cecil Choate, Southwick; Clarence Hund, Renton, Wash.; and Earl Hund, Lewiston; two sisters, Mrs. Nellie Coe, Lewiston, and Mrs. Addie Wisdom, Asotin; a half sister, Mrs. Bett Sitkus, Palouse, and a half brother, Orva Hileman, Clarkston. Also surviving are 10 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Members of the family say Mr. Pearson's personal request was that those who might wish to send flowers make a gift to the Heart Fund instead.

Funeral services are scheduled for Thursday afternoon, Aug. 22, at 2:00 o'clock at the Brower-Wann Chapel in Lewiston. The American Legion will have charge of the graveside rites.

SHORT NEWS ITEMS FROM OUR LOCAL SCHOOLS

Board Meeting Wednesday

The Trustees of School District No. 283 held their regular meeting at the High school, Wednesday evening, Aug. 14. Bids were opened for the year's supply of coal for Kendrick and Juliaetta. Ed. Nelson submitted the only bid and was awarded the contract for three cars.

Bids for the year's supply of gasoline, approximately 10,000 gallons, were opened and carefully studied. There were only two bids this year, and based on last year's amount of gasoline used, which will be very close to the amount needed this coming year, there was only \$686. for the year's supply, difference between the two bids. The Board awarded the contract to the lowest bidder, Union Oil.

Fact Finding Report

The Board discussed the Fact Finding Committee's request that an architect be asked to draw up estimates for a new High school building adjacent to the present football field. It was agreed to postpone this action until a later meeting.

The Board looked over the High School building particularly the third floor, which has been completely redecorated this summer by Art. Foster, custodian. It was agreed to have a heating engineer inspect the present heating system as to safety and advise for repairs if needed.

School On Sept. 3rd

School will reopen for all students on September 3rd. The school Hot Lunch program will be operating the first day, and the charge will be the same as that of last year — 25 cents. Buses will operate on the same schedule as last spring, but if in doubt as to what time the bus will come by your place, contact the driver on your route.

Registration First Day

We will not have registration before school starts. Last year's experiment of registering the first day of school proved satisfactory and will again be used. It was felt that those working in the harvest would probably appreciate not having to disrupt their work to come in and register, ahead of the actual start of school.

About First Graders

First Graders need to be six years old on or before the 15th of October to be eligible to start to school. This is a State Law — not a local ruling.

Flood Project For Kendrick

An allocation of \$62,000 for flood protection at Kendrick has been sent to President Eisenhower for signature, according to Rep. Gracie Post, (D. Idaho).

The grant is included in the 1958 Public Works appropriation bill, Mrs. Post explained. She said it had passed both the House and Senate.

The allocation specifically calls for a small flood protection project on the Potlatch river at Kendrick. Such small projects generally are constructed by the Corps of Army Engineers.

It was considered likely that the project was similar to the reported \$20,700 grant authorized for a watershed hydrology project in Moscow. Details of both are expected to be forthcoming from the Agricultural Research Service headquarters in Boise.

Frank Abrams, mayor, and E. E. Magnuson, village clerk, said there had been considerable correspondence with Mrs. Post and others regarding the matter before receiving word that the allocation had been made.

Thermometer Goes "Boing"

The "official thermometer" in Kendrick hit a high reading of 96 degrees last Sunday, to record the hottest weather of the summer to date. In Lewiston the official reading was 94 degrees, but the downtown reading was said to be well over that.

Monday was quite a bit cooler; the high being 90 degrees, and Tuesday it was a mere 88.

It is, however, the most wonderful harvest weather that anyone could wish, as there is very little dew, so operations can begin early in the morning and run well — how late?

Warehousemen say that the peak rush of harvest is now past — but the traffic is still heavy.

ELDERLY WOMAN LOST IN FOREST NEAR ELK RIVER

Elk River — An air and ground search Monday failed to find any trace of Mrs. Rose Jewett, 95-year-old Juliaetta resident who has been missing nearly 36 hours in mountainous, timbered country 8 miles north of here.

A bloodhound was flown to the search area from Grangeville shortly after noon Monday. Forty-five are combing the region and Emory Hall of Elk River checked the region in an airplane.

The blood hound was withdrawn from the effort after it several times followed a circular path which ended at a nearby road. Some felt this indicated Mrs. Jewett had been given a ride by a passing motorist.

Mrs. Jewett, who had recently suffered a stroke, had been near here since Thursday on a camping and huckleberry picking trip. She was with her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. George Johnson of Juliaetta.

Johnson told authorities his mother-in-law had been missing since 5:00 p. m. Sunday. Forty-five minutes earlier he and his wife had returned from picking huckleberries to check on her. She was then asleep in a pickup truck.

The Johnsons returned to the woods and shortly after discovered Mrs. Jewett missing. Deputy Sheriff Robt. Gopch of Elk River was notified and formed a search party. Clearwater County Sheriff Fred Pomeroy of Orofino joined the group Monday.

Twenty-five employees of the Potlatch Timber Protective Assn. under Fire Warden Emil Keck of the association were among the searchers. Also aiding is Edwin Pierson, former Lewiston police officer.

Johnson said Mrs. Jewett had left her coat at the pickup truck and had changed there to another pair of shoes. A bucket was missing from the camping equipment and Johnson surmised Mrs. Jewett had gone into the woods in search of berries.

One shift of searchers was quickly organized. They were relieved Monday morning about 3:30 by another group of volunteers.

Mrs. Jewett is a comparatively frail woman, weighing 95 pounds, and fear was expressed for her physical condition because of the cold nights in this area. — Lewiston Tribune, Tuesday, Aug. 13.

Our note: We understand that Lesse Groselose of Juliaetta was with the Johnsons and Mrs. Jewett, although the paper does not mention him. To date, so far as we know, no trace has yet been found of Mrs. Jewett, and the search is still continuing, with a number of volunteers from Juliaetta aiding.

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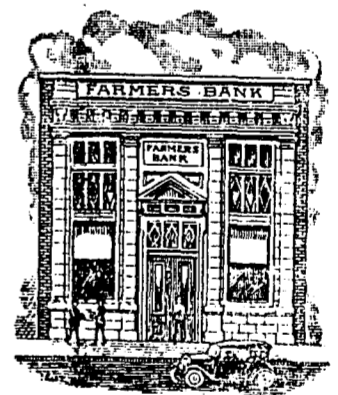

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Giants To Scrap Heap
The last of Northern Pacific Railway's fleet of 12 giant "Yellowstone" steam locomotives went to the scrap heap this past week.

Dismantling of these giant locomotives — largest in the world when they were built in 1929 and 1930, was carried out at the railway's Brainerd, Minn., shops.

Victims of NP's dieselization program which will bring an end to steam motive power in 1959, they were retired after less than 25 years of service — a short life for a steam locomotive.

The massive engines, known as the Z-5's, when loaded and with tender, weighed 1,125,400 pounds, or 562 ton. Combined length of locomotive and tender was 125 feet. The locomotive was 17 feet 2 inches tall and could carry 27 tons of coal and 21,000 gallons of water in its tender. Instead of the customary six or eight, each Z-5 had 16 driving wheels.

As mammoth as its proportions was its appetite. When necessary a Z-5 firebox could accommodate 22,000 lbs. of coal an hour. The firebox was 22 feet long, 9 feet and six inches wide — almost as big as a single-car gar-

age. One of them did the work of two ordinary locomotives. They were originally used on NP's Yellowstone division, for which they were named, in the hilly "Bad Lands" of western North Dakota and eastern Montana, between Mandan, N. D., and Glendive, Mont.

Formerly two smaller engines had been used to handle one freight train in this area. In later years, when replaced by diesels, the "Yellowstones" were put into helper service out of Livingston and Helena, Mont., pushing trains over the Continental divide.

The first Z-5 was built by the American Locomotive Co., Schenectady, N. Y., in 1929, and the remaining 11 by the Baldwin Locomotive Works in Eddystone, Pa., the following year.

Forest Money Allocated

Cash dividends totaling \$97,608.75 have been declared to the counties in which the St. Joe National Forest is located, it was announced this week by George H. Duvendack, supervisor of the St. Joe National Forest.

By law, 25 percent of the receipts from the sale of national forest resources are returned each year to the State of Idaho for distribution to the counties involved to assist in financing school and road systems. The counties receiving benefits from the St. Joe National Forest receipts are Benewah, Clearwater, Latah and Shoshone.

The 1956 amount is an increase of \$13,160.00 over the 1955 figure of \$84,449.00, Mr. Duvendack, said. The \$97,608.75 is being distributed to the counties as follows: Benewah, \$5,368.15; Clearwater, \$5,631.22; Latah, \$12,211.72, and Shoshone \$74,347.66.

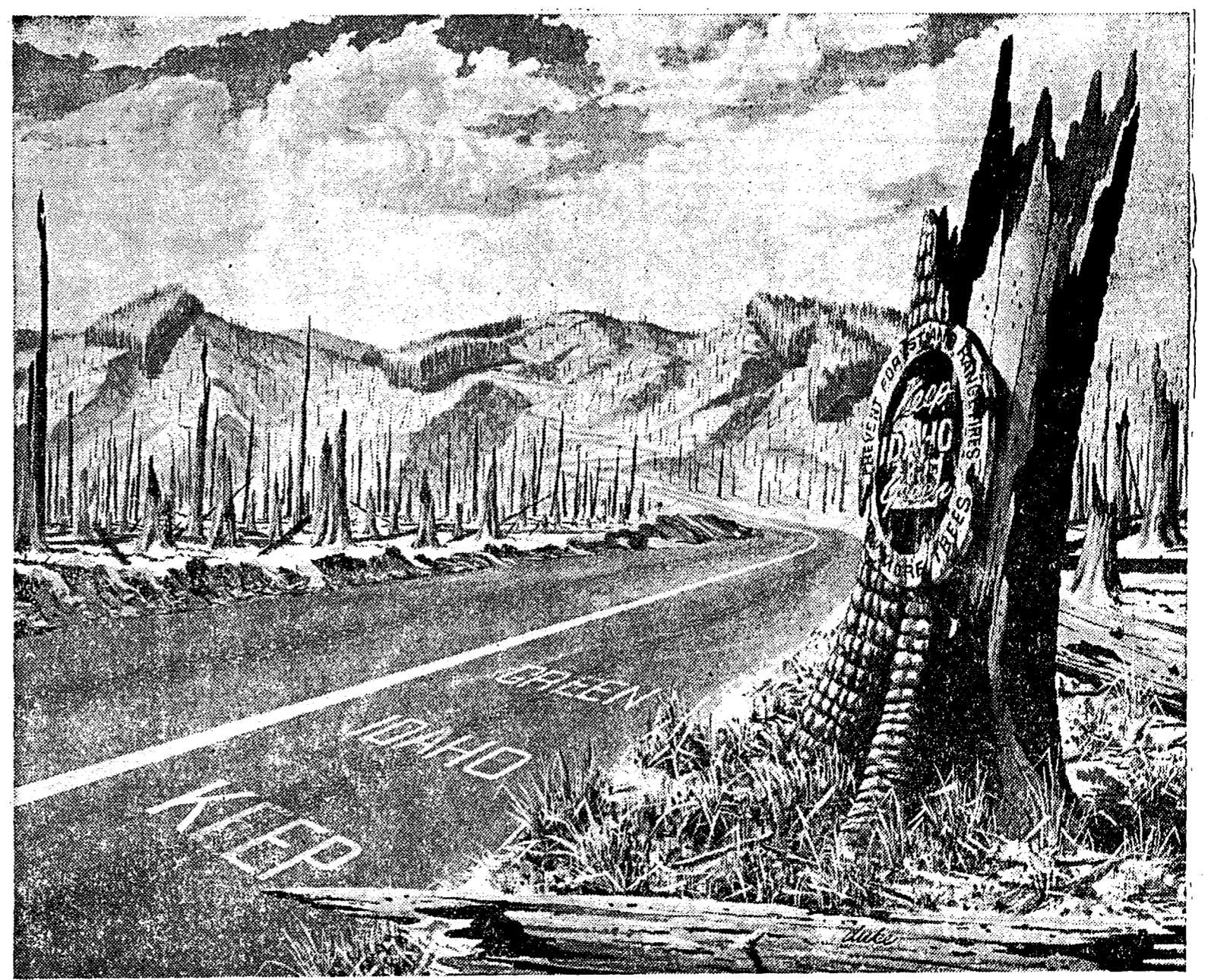
The money is allocated on the basis of total national forest acreage in the respective counties.

Total U. S. Forest Service contribution to all counties in Idaho containing national forest lands amounted to \$1,636,032.00, an increase of \$573,828.00 over the 1955 total figure.

By law, also, ten percent of the national forest receipts are returned to the forest each year for the maintenance and construction of roads and trails on or adjacent to the forest. Thus, \$136,652.25 will be returned to the benefit of the local area this year.

Courtesy Brings Safety

If you are planning a vacation trip of any kind, or perhaps just a fishing trip, a special caution has been issued by Harold Davis, Traffic Safety Division director. Davis states that increased travel, plus harvesting hauling by trucks, means greater danger to the motorist and pedestrian on our streets and highways.

The Idaho State Police are making an all-out effort to see that traffic accidents do not occur. "However, make courtesy your code of the road," Davis urges. "A driver who insists on taking more than his share of the road is inviting trouble. If you exercise courtesy and caution you will be surprised to find that other drivers will return your courtesy almost every time."

Davis also strongly warns against trying to cover too many miles in too short a time; driving at speeds too fast for conditions; driving while drinking, and while tired. If you are tired, but must go on, stop for a few minutes and drink a cup of coffee or a glass of milk, stretch your legs and arms. Don't become a traffic statistic!

Hints About This And That

Livestock standing near fences during lightning storms can be protected, engineers say, by driving a heavy wire down alongside every third or fourth post and stapling it to the intersecting line wires.

Growth cracks in tomatoes can be reduced, says Tony Horn, University of Idaho extension horticulturist, by withholding irrigation just before harvesting.

A small electric light in a closet helps prevent mildew on stored clothing, according to Esther Nystrom, clothing specialist of the University of Idaho extension service.

When fruit juice and milk are combined the milk may curdle. If you add the juice to the milk slowly, stirring briskly, curdling is not so likely.

Keeping stored grain free from roach, bird and insect damage is essential to good grain prices, say marketing specialists.

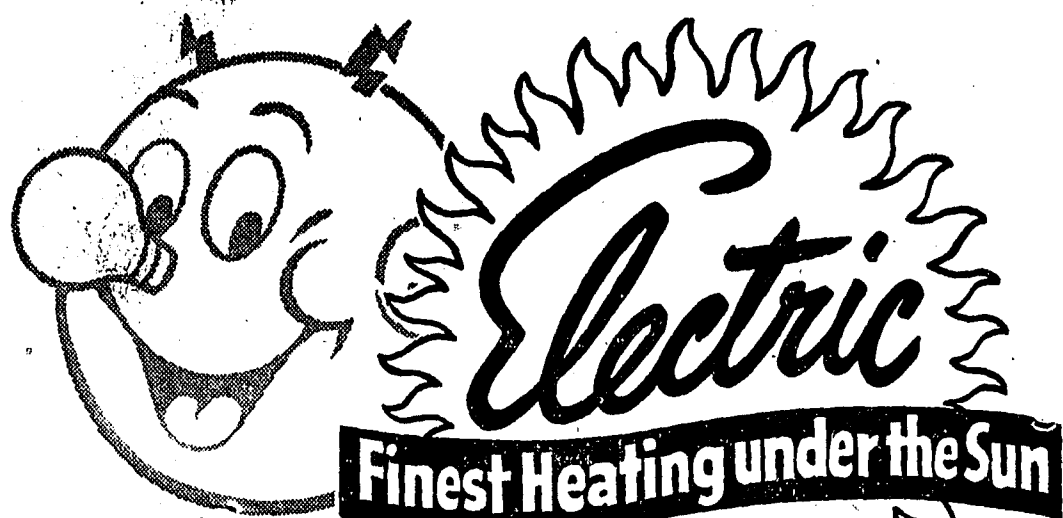

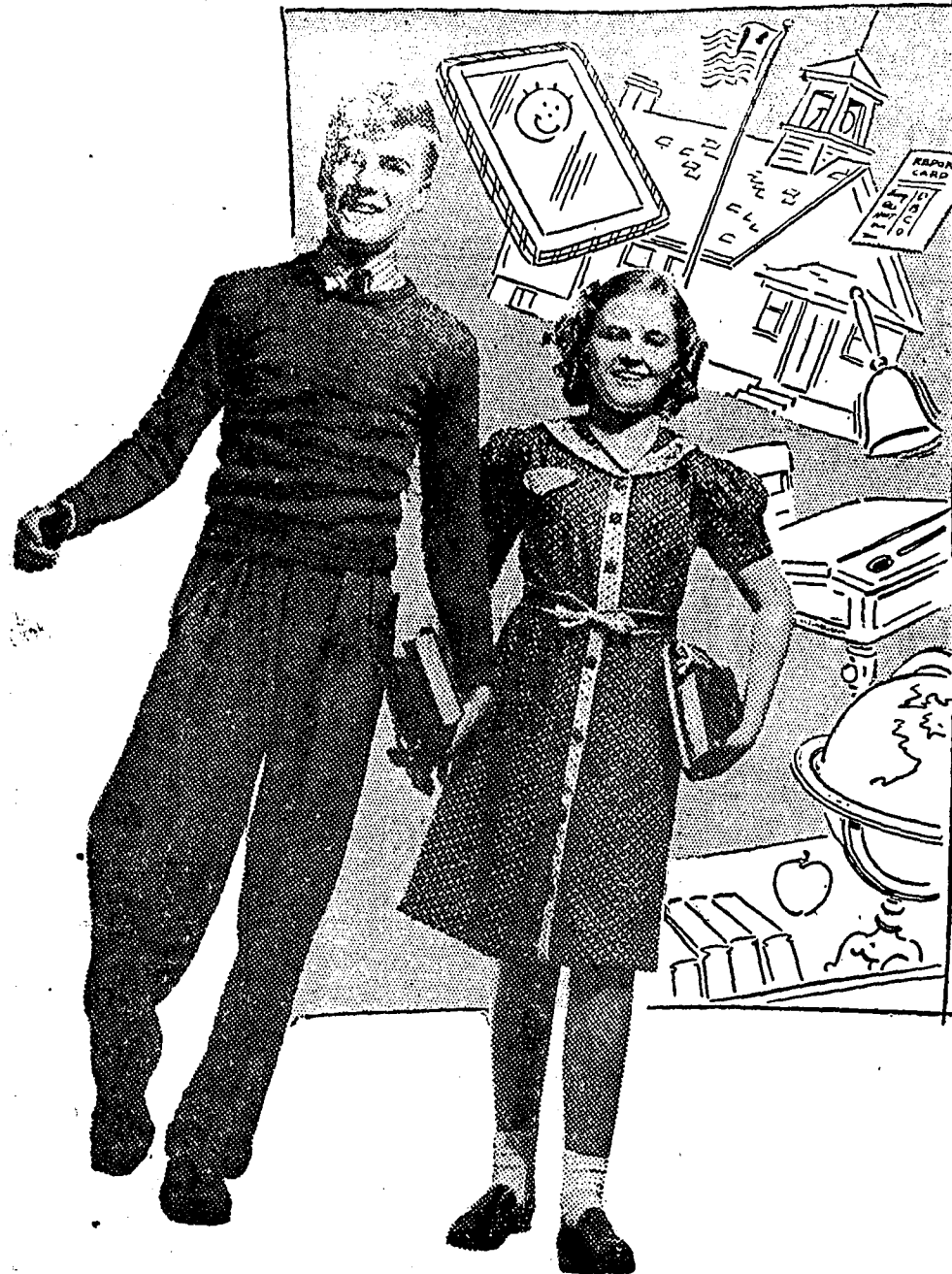
