THE WAY WE SEE IT

We feel sure that everyone has read with a great deal of interest the recent offer of the labor unions to "consider contract negotiations on a different level" providing the Big-Three of automotive manufacture, G-M, Ford and Chrysler, would agree to reduce the prices of their cars by \$100.00 — which has been refused.

This brings up a most interesting point — why was the offer refused? They did not say that they could not afford to reduce the prices of the cars. Apparently, so long as the public will continue to buy at the present prices or higher — they will remain there.

Another point that intrigues us is the so-called "Coupon Deal." Soap companies, coffee companies, breakfast food manufacturers and many others have been exploiting coupons worth "so much" on the purchase of another pound, or package, or redeemable in merchandise of "this, that or the other" kind — not to mention added "cash" for some items.

To us, this doesn't make sense. It calls for a considerable outlay of time and possible expense to the merchant retailer who must handle the "another pound or package" coupon; to the wholesaler, who must also handle them, not to mention the manufacturer, who in turn must meet the cost of printing, packaging, etc., as well as added labor charges.

Why not just drop all the "additives" and reduce the cost of the item by so much? The customer would be happier to see prices go down, not to mention all the other handlers along the line.

If the price of cars is not to go down, as proposed by the unions, why not "throw in" a better paint job; perhaps better tires; tinted glass, or some of the other "so-called accessories", or "knock off" the extra charge for an automatic transmission or overdrive?

Writes From Iowa

From the Rev. Gustav Meyer at Sioux City, Iowa, comes the following letter, which should be of interest to all:

Dear Friends: Once more, as I renew my subscription to the Gazette, which is a welcome weekly visitor in our home, and without the same we would miss a lot about the happenings out west, of weather, crops and relatives and friends dear to us, something about our area may prove of interest.

I reported last year on the severe drought in this community, but this year it is different. We have very fine crops. It is true we have had it very hot here for about three weeks, the mercury recording 95 to 103 degrees. But the oats had fully ripened and the corn being hybrid, was not affected. Oats went around 50 to 75 bushels per acre and corn should make around 75 bushels to the acre. And this condition is all over the state and beyond. As we traveled through Minnesota and into Wisconsin, and being near Nebraska and South Dakota, fine crops are to be observed everywhere.

Observe from the Gazette that the crops are fine out west again. As far as I can recollect the west, at least in your area, never had a complete failure in crops. Of that the mid-west is not so certain. So I think that nothing compares with the Pacific Northwest in agriculture.

Our thoughts wander westward quite often. Just wonder how often and how many think of us here in the mid-west. We would just enjoy being able to greet all of you personally — but at this time a greeting by means of the Gazette seems all that is possible. All Idaho truckers liable for the Highway Use tax must file their returns and pay the tax by Aug. 31, for the year beginning July 1, 1957.

Otherwise late-filing penalties are compulsory by law. Return forms and instruction booklets are available at all Internal Revenue offices.

The returns are to include all vehicles in use during the month of July. In any following month that additional trucks are put in use, another return must be filed by the end of the month.

The tax was levied by Congress last year, to help pay the cost of the new nation-wide construction program.

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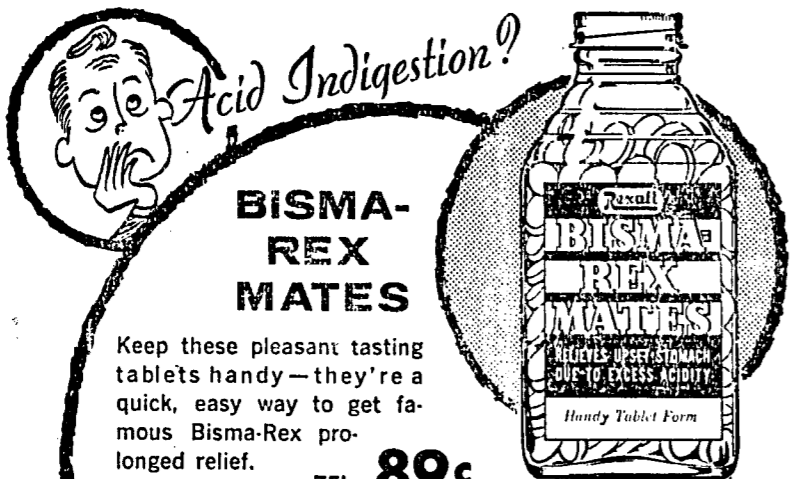
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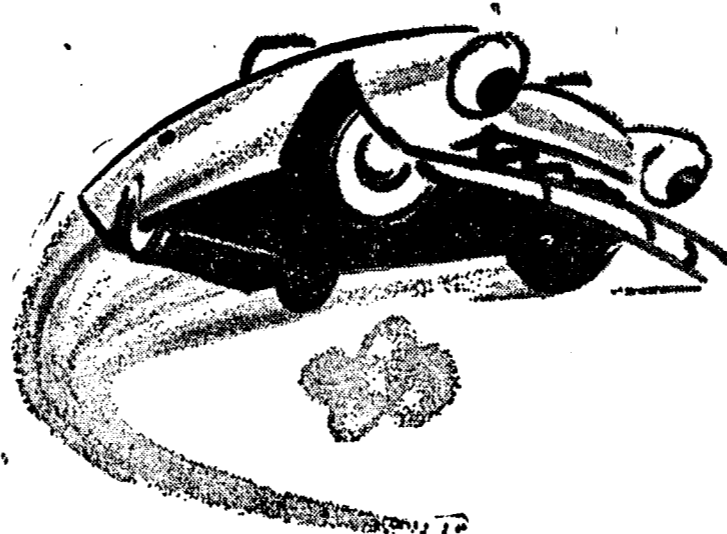
