Mr. and Mrs. Neale Hoisington expect to leave today (Wednesday, Aug. 28) for Alaska with 17 head of cattle specially selected to withstand the rigors of that cold northern land.

The cattle, owned by Neale Hois-ington, Juliaetta, and Horace Woodthe East Lewiston stockpens of the Twin City Sales Yard Sunday.

Sixteen of them are Scottish Highlanders, a breed originating in Scotland and developed in the high plains of Montana and Canada. They have long horns and thick, coarse hair, which grows to a foot in length in the winter. The 17th animal is a cross between a Hereford and a Highlander. Mr. Hoisington said this is a promising animal which should produce more beef than the others and

still survive the Alaska cold. The animals are being taken by truck to Seattle and by barge from there to the island of Sanak, where the cattle ranch will be esablished. Mr. Hoisington, 25, is a native of Juliaetta. His wife, Eunice, is a
