Saturday, at 10:30 a. m. will be held the 4-H Style Reviews and the 4-H Demonstrations, at the new Armory building.

Saturday, at 1:30 p. m. in Neale Stadium Oregon will meet Idaho in a football game — which is also Dad's Day at the University.

At 1:00 p. m. Saturday there will be a "Gymkhana; at 4:00 p. m. a barbeque, and that night a dance at the Eagles Hall.

Through the courtesy of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Ingle a Fair Premium List and Program was obtained.

Thursday, at 10:00 a. m. the 4-H and F. F. A. Livestock Judging Contests begin. That afternoon at 1:00 the various other 4-H and F. F. A. divisions in Beef, sheep, swine; field crops, etc., begin and various sections are held throughout the day.

Friday morning at 9:30 judging begins on 4-H and F. F. A. livestock, dairy, poultry, horses, etc. Also in the women's departments, clothing and needlework — and other 4-H projects.

In the afternoon at 1:30 begins the 4-H and F. F. A. Fitting and Showing contests on Beef, swine, sheep, dairy and horses. That evening the Junior Fat Stock Sale will be held.

Saturday morning beginning at 9:00 will be the 4-H Style Review, to be followed by 4-H demonstrations in Agriculture and Home Economics. At 11:00 the Junior Rodeo parade.

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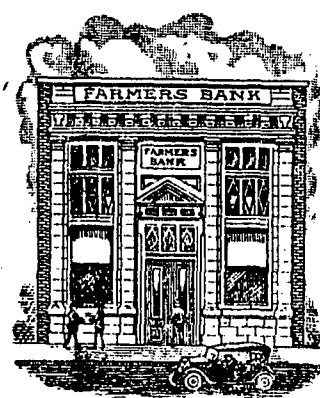
