**Lewiston Committee Visits**

Thursday afternoon a delegation from the Lewiston Chamber of Commerce consisting of James McMonigle, chm.; E. V. Lorenz, vice chm.; Elbert S. Rawls, Steve Spengler, Harry Hughes and Loyd Harris, the "Railroad Train Protest Committee" who were accompanied by Graydon Smith, state attorney general, visited in Kendrick. Their business was as the named implied, gathering help to protest the removal of the train from Lewiston to Ayer Junction, which provides direct connections with Portland from this area, as well as Lewiston.

They asked for support, and they are receiving it, a resolution of protest from the Kendrick Commercial Club having already been forwarded, and similar resolutions are in the process of formulation from the Kendrick Grange and the Kendrick Community Lions Club.

Local residents quite frequently use the train from Lewiston to Portland not only for passenger service, but for express, and the feeling locally is that it is our business as well as that of Lewiston — so the time to act is now — not later.

Protests have gone in resolution and petition form from the Village of Kendrick, from the Orofino Chamber of Commerce, and from many other sources — and more will go in.

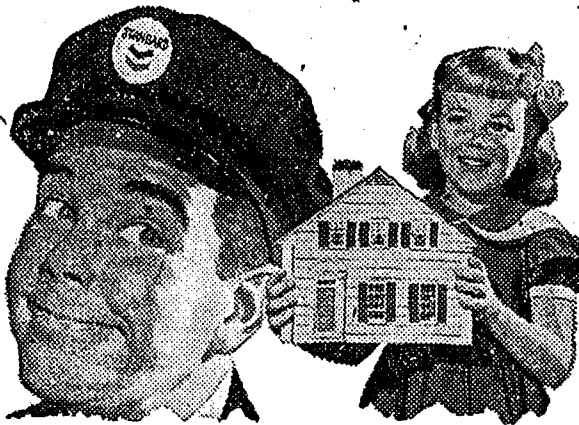

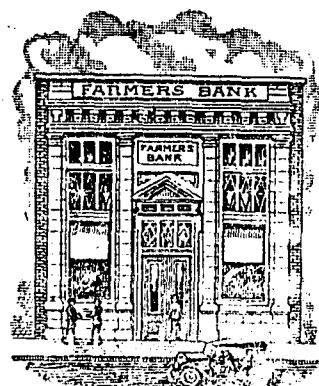

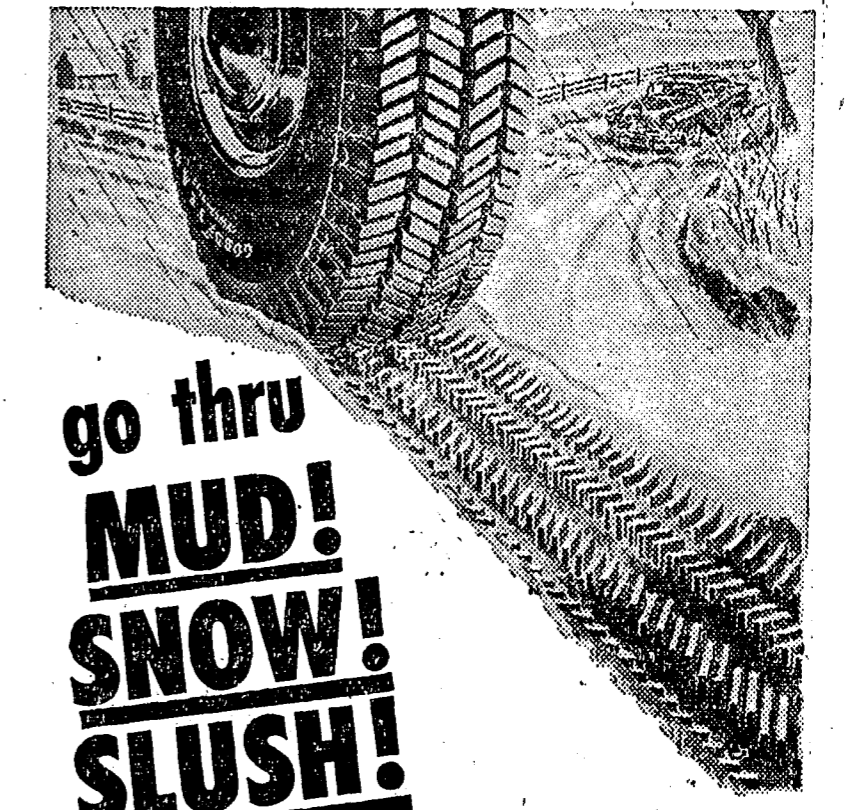
