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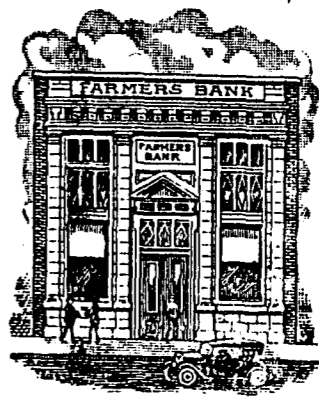

How Long Will They Stay Up?

U. of L. Moscow — The belief that Sputnik II will have a shorter life span than its predecessor was expressed this week by H. Ward Crowley, an assistant professor of mathematics at the University of Idaho, who has frequently linked his mathematical studies with astronomy.

"Sputnik has a fairly even orbit around the earth," Prof. Crowley said.

"The second satellite has an egg-shaped orbit which swings over 1,000 miles away from the earth at the extreme of its orbit to within about 100 miles of the earth on its 102-minute round trip. The satellite, hitting the denser atmosphere about 100 miles high, will gradually slow down and fall to earth."

The Russian scientists did a magnificent job of controlling all the fac-

tors that would make a satellite flight a seemingly impossible fact, he observed.

"An error in velocity of 1 percent below the required speed would doom the orbiting flight as the satellite would fall back to earth. A 2 percent increase in velocity would also end in failure as the satellite could not be observed in its flight."

As little as one and a half degrees off in the direction in which the rocket carrying satellite is fired can also spell either success or failure.

The dog in Sputnik II will certainly come back to earth, Prof. Crowley believes. "But whether it

will be alive and if it will ever be recovered is another question. The process would involve a fired reverse rocket to slow the satellite in its flight causing the gravitational pull of the earth to take effect. To survive, the dog must have protection from the tremendous heat which will be created as the satellite falls into denser atmosphere."

A parachute will have to be used to brake the fall. However, even if the dog falls to the earth unharmed by the flight, the animal will be difficult to locate and will probably land in some ocean. It must be remembered that the satellite circles the globe in its orbit," he explained.

"An even greater degree of accuracy than that needed in aiming Sputnik will be necessary if a successful rocket flight is made to the moon. It will be a study of motion. The earth is spinning, the moon is traveling through its orbit and the rocket will be leaving the earth at approximately 25,000 miles per hour. The rocket must meet the moon and intersect its orbit at the proper time to be successful. The gravities of the earth, moon and sun and the decreasing speed of the rocket in its flight will be important factors in the problem. If the calculations are not accurate, the rocket may circle the moon, and come back to earth, or keep heading into outer space.

The Russian scientists must have the fuel to power a rocket capable of the 25,000 miles per hour velocity necessary for a flight to the moon, Crowley surmised, because of the heavy rocket which carried Sputnik II into its orbit. The speed of Sputnik II is believed to have approached 18,000 miles per hour.

Questioned on the theory that unidentified flying objects sighted throughout the world may carry visitors from outer space checking to see what is happening on earth, Prof. Crowley said that while the incidents could not be explained, he doubted the theory.

"Possibility of life on the other planets other than hardy plant life is extremely dim," Prof. Crowley said. "There is believed to be plant life on Mars due to the changes in color as the seasons progress. More plant life may be found on Venus, which is usually shrouded by clouds. Plant life on the other planets is practically impossible."

To Boost Egg Production
Look out for blue comb in your flock, advises Robert Black, poultry specialist of the University of Idaho extension service.

This disease, which can cause death losses as high as 50 percent, commonly comes on suddenly.


The flock looks all right one day and the next it is hit. Birds go off feed, there is diarrhea, and a severe slump in egg production. Combs

shriveled and turn dark. The blue color gives the disease its name. The course of blue comb is about two weeks.

Good management and sanitation are the best safeguards, Black advises. There is no positive method of prevention. Because the disease strikes hard and fast, it is important to catch it in the early stages. Blue comb responds satisfactorily to several antibiotics. Medication in the drinking water is generally the most efficient.

Doctor Sets Rules For Growing Old In Graceful Style

CHICAGO — Preparation for aging should begin in the "prime of life," a 72-year old North Carolina physician says.

Every doctor should try to train his middle-aged and even younger patients to cultivate habits of eating, sleeping, exercise, recreation, work and mental hygiene.

Dr. Wingate M. Johnson, Winston-Salem, said in the Journal of the American Association. Dr. Johnson, professor at Bowman-Gray School of Medicine, lists seven rules of conduct he divided for himself some years ago.

1. Recognize that the mind be at its best when a person is about 40 years old and should continue to be efficient to the age of 70 or more.

2. Avoid becoming an "old fogey" by frequent association with young people. Prepare for occasional shocks, but try to understand youth's viewpoint.

3. Learn to delegate authority. 4. Cultivate wide interests. Learn new uses for hands and brain.

5. Keep in touch with old friends and make new ones. 6. Cultivate equanimity — the mental poise that keeps one from being unduly elated or depressed.

7. Cultivate the habit of looking forward rather than backward.

Firefly Might Solve Mysteries

WASHINGTON—The little lamp of the firefly may light up some of the mysteries of life.

Life is possible because plants can change sunlight into chemical energy. Fireflies turn this energy back into light—and do a much more efficient job than any electric company.

A light bulb wastes most of its energy as heat. A firefly operates its lamp without heat, at better than 95-per-cent efficiency.

Jealous electric companies report that it would take more than 137,000 lightning bugs to equal a 60-watt bulb. But the companies admit that they might learn something from these light-bearing beetles.

The firefly may also prove a boon to medicine. Already, says the National Geographic Society, chemicals extracted from lightning bugs can be used to measure a compound known as adenosine triphosphate or ATP, which is present in every living thing.

ATP is a storehouse for energy.

Traveling Student May Have Set Record

DAVIS, Calif.—The student who shuttled between Yakima, Washington and Davis, California may have set a new record among classroom commuters.

John W. Griffith's 1,700-mile-a-week jaunt in search of knowledge will be hard to beat.

Griffith, an agriculture instructor at Yakima Valley Junior College, enrolled for post-graduate study in the summer session of the University of California's Davis campus.

Back home in Yakima, carpenters were constructing a new agriculture building at the junior college and Griffith wanted to oversee the work on the classrooms he would be using in the fall.

He got the commuting idea when he found that his classes at Davis were scheduled for Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of each week.

On Wednesday evenings, he took an overnight train from Davis to Portland (700 miles), then drove from Portland to Yakima (150 miles) in his own car.

Griffith, car to Portland, overnight train to Davis, and he was a student again. It was as simple as that.

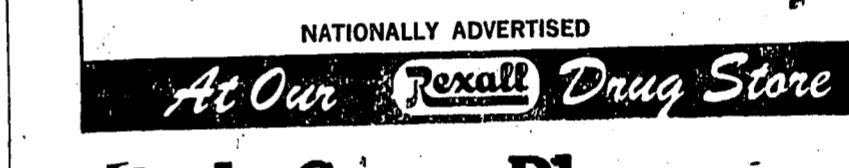

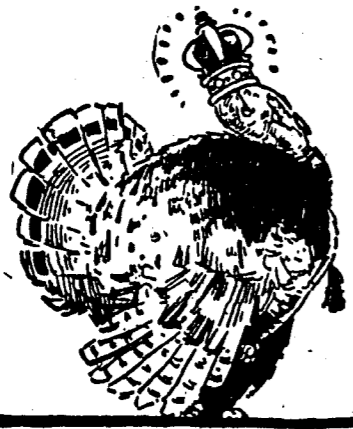

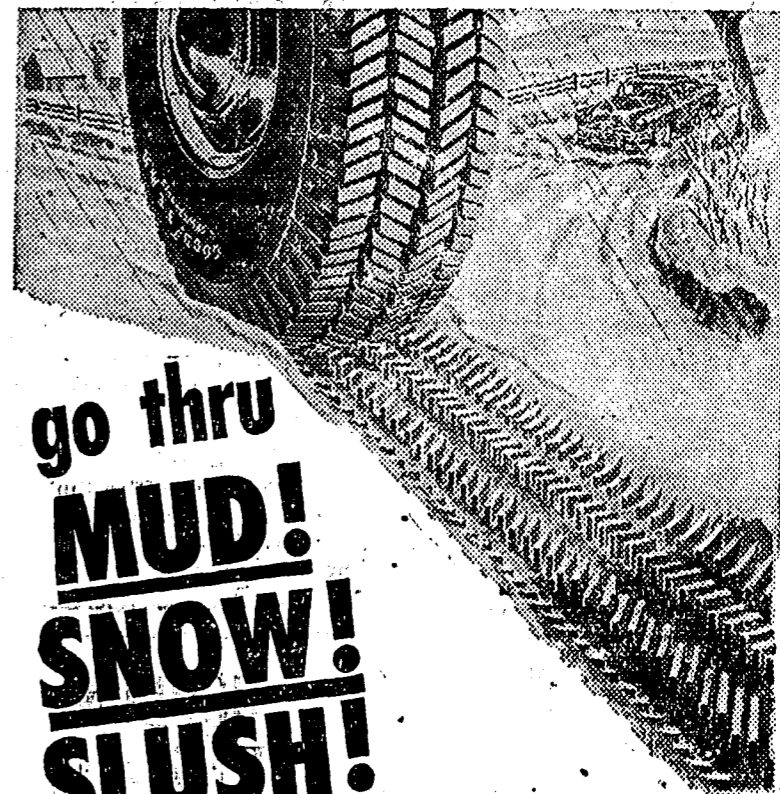
