Attend School Lunch National

Mr. and Mrs. E. M. White returned Friday from a two-week trip which was initiated to allow her to attend the National Convention of the American School Food Service Association, as Idaho State representative, at St. Louis, Missouri, which lasted four days.

Mrs. White says it was a thrilling experience which she wouldn't have missed for anything. There were 44 states represented, six new states being admitted to membership — one of which was Idaho. The new members were presented their charter and gavel at a luncheon which was most impressive. Close to 3,000 were registered.

The object of the convention was to improve school lunches and increase participation, with a maximum of nutritive foods at a minimum of cost. Mrs. White added that she was proud to report participation in the local schools was far above the national average.

One goal of the association is to encourage recruiting and training of school lunch personnel. Another is the education of adults and children to the need of having a hot, well-balanced lunch and "not just something that fills you up."

An interesting side-light of the convention was an interview by a reporter from the St. Louis Globe Dispatch, who wanted to know about school kids liked to eat in Idaho. Not willing to take her word for it, she was invited to give a demonstration of some of her favorite recipes. So Mrs. White prepared scalloped Idaho potatoes and little pig sausages — and cherry cobbler — big favorites of her "school lunch kids." All of this was photographed in the Union Electric Home Economics Kitchen, and will appear in color as a feature story some time soon.

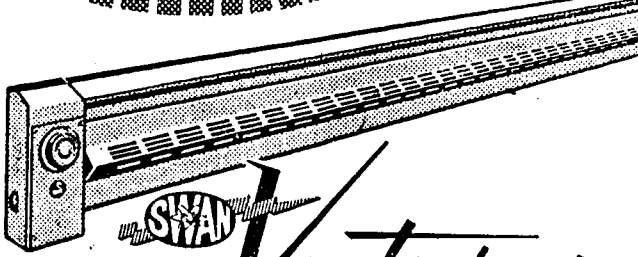
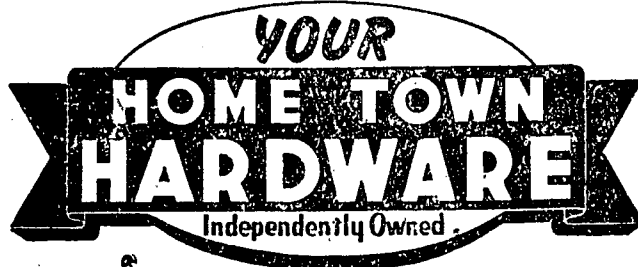

Mail Early For Christmas
 Postmaster F. O. Stedman said today: "We hope to keep up our good record on the Christmas mails, by getting everything processed and delivered well before Christmas Eve." He said further that much depends on your cooperation in mailing your Christmas cards and gifts within the next few days.
 Mr. Stedman said: "Most people realize that the early arrival of a Christmas card or gift is always welcome, although there are still some who have the mistaken idea that a gift or card arriving on Christmas Eve has special significance. Actually, it's the thought behind the gift or card, and not the time of arrival that is the important consideration."
 The postmaster asks for your special consideration to be sure that your return address and the recipients address are plainly typed or written on all labels and Christmas cards. Use zone numbers, and it's always a good idea to include an extra label inside your package. Parcel post size and weight limitations vary according to destination. Ask about them when you go to the post office to buy stamps.
 Be sure to use first class postage on your Christmas cards, because this enables you to include hand written messages. Cards sent by first class mail will be delivered promptly, and forwarded or returned, if necessary, provided you include your name and address on your Christmas card envelope, a custom, by the way, which is entirely socially correct.
 Beginning Dec. 16 service windows at the post office will be open from 8:15 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. The windows are most crowded at lunch time, so the postmaster suggests that packages be mailed before 10:00 a. m. or between 1:30 and 3:30 p. m.

About School Lunch Program
 Wash., D. C., Nov. 20 — The National School Lunch Program of the department of agriculture made school lunches available to 56,488 children in 458 Idaho schools during the fiscal year 1957, according to a report from the department to Idaho's Senator Henry Dworshak.
 The program provided lunches for 2,053 more school children last year than were provided for in 1956, when 54,435 Idaho school children participated in the program.
 The federal school lunch funds proportioned to Idaho in the fiscal year amounted to \$399,639. In addition, the department of agriculture distributed to schools 592,828 pounds of food costing \$80,015 purchased specifically for their nutritive values.
 A special milk program was also operated in 397 schools and child-care institutions in the fiscal year 1957. The report to Sen. Dworshak said that under the program the children consumed 5,000,000 half pints of fluid milk. Federal funds expended in reimbursement payments for this milk totaled \$174,000.00.

Pheasant Season Over
 The Chinese pheasant hunting season ended Sunday evening, with most hunters reporting generally poor success. Some, of course, said "fair," but we have yet to hear anyone say "good."

The program will include music by the Idaho Vandaleers, an address by the Rector of St. Mark Episcopal Church and the ritualistic portion by the officers of the lodge.

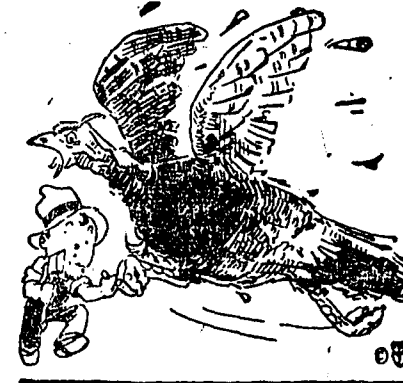
Has Lucky Escape

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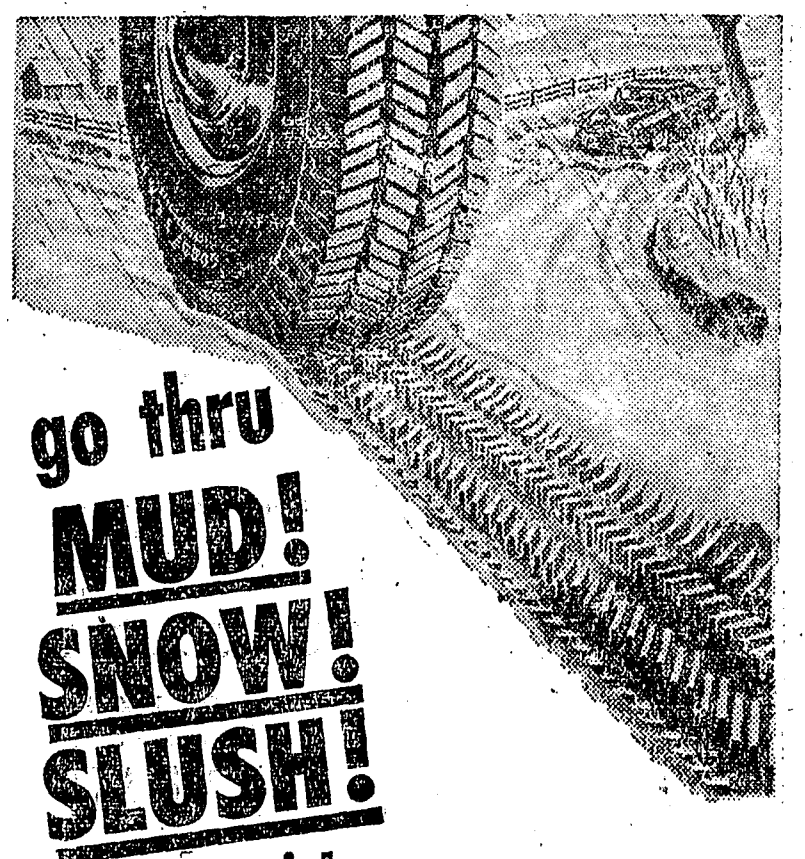
