**DOROTHY MEYER WRITES OF PROBLEMS FACED IN INDIA**

Miss Dorothy Meyer, Lutheran Missionary in India, has written to all her friends in this area, and by permission we reprint the letter:

Nayudupet, Nellore Dist., Andhra State, India, Nov. 20, 1957  
Dear Friends:

Is it possible that a whole year has slipped by since I last wrote? The calendar reminds me that it is so. Each year seems to pass more quickly than the preceding one. Then as if we aren't having a hard enough time keeping up with the pace of life, we suddenly find ourselves in an age of satellites and space. In another year or less people will be taking trips to the moon, but that is not my concern

at the moment. I just want to take time out to get Christmas Greeting on the way to you.

In the way of news the thing that is uppermost in our minds these days is the recent flood which occurred on Nov. 4th and 5th. The losses and damages are simply staggering; 63 people lost their lives. Six thousand lost everything including their homes, livestock and possessions. These people are now being given temporary relief and food by the government. At present many of them are staying in public buildings. Roads and railway tracks are badly breached and damaged. Railroad officials are employing hundreds of coolies to repair the tracks. As I write this, trains are still not running, but most roads have been sufficiently repaired to restore

bus service.

How it did rain for four and a half days without ever stopping! Tanks broke, rivers overflowed their banks, and soon the whole countryside was engulfed in the flood. Since our compound was on just a little higher ground, we were saved from the ravages of the flood. Beripet, the tiny village which lies outside our compound wall, was not so fortunate. These villagers, many of them Christians, having been forced out of their homes by the flood waters, found shelter in the church which was located inside the compound. For several days after the flood we served food to these people. Then a group of our leading Christians gathered together and planned how they could best help their needy brothers in this

time of crisis. First they surveyed the community to find out which folk were really in need of help. Then they pooled their contributions and arranged to buy as much rice as they could. My teachers, girls, and I furnished and sewed the cloth bags which were used for rice distribution. About a week's supply of rice was given to 60 madigal (low caste) families and 92 Christian families. Here was Christianity in action.

We are thankful that no harm came to our boarding school. Our girls all sat huddled together in the big room in school during those days of incessant rain. For several days we were unable to hold school. When the rain subsided everyone seemed eager to get back to work. Since the flood they have completed so many orders that I have had to do several washings. After the orders have been washed and ironed, they must be checked for spots on the cloth, loose threads, mistakes in design, etc. Wouldn't you like to help check all these various cross stitch designs? (Monkeys, elephants, parakeets, peacocks, etc.?)

We are a big family in the boarding school and as any family does, we have our problems. Sickness is our most serious one. At the present time we have one of our girls in the Rengunta hospital. She is suffering from convulsions. In the boarding now we have several cases of flu. Since cholera is spreading in nearby villages, we are making arrangements for all the girls to receive inoculations as soon as possible. Other problems are petty quarrels and little frictions here and there. But on the whole, they get on quite well together. Last week I watched while food rations were being handed out. Each household of six to eight girls gets its week's supply of rice and curry stuffs. Then they do their own cooking. One look at our girls and you will know that their diet is sufficient. Since I'm not so sure that they get enough exercise, I'm stressing more participation in games and sports. At present they are learning to play softball. They are trying hard because they want to be able to play well for my sister, Hermina, who will be coming to visit me on December 4th.

Since my interests lie in the field of religious education, I have been spending some time with the teachers on this curriculum. In this I have been able to combine my work with the Bible women. Our practice-teaching class in Bible meets once a week and the Bible women and teachers have all taken their turns in presenting the lessons. The teachers have shown improvement in their teaching techniques as they hold their regular Bible classes each morning for the girls at school. I also teach one of the classes and have been using the film strips on the "Ten Commandments," given to me by the W. M. F. of my home district. In August we held a spiritual emphasis week at the school. All the school family as well as the twenty-two Bible women, who are stationed on this side of the field, took part. Miss Ramanjulu, the supervisor of the nurses' home in Remi-

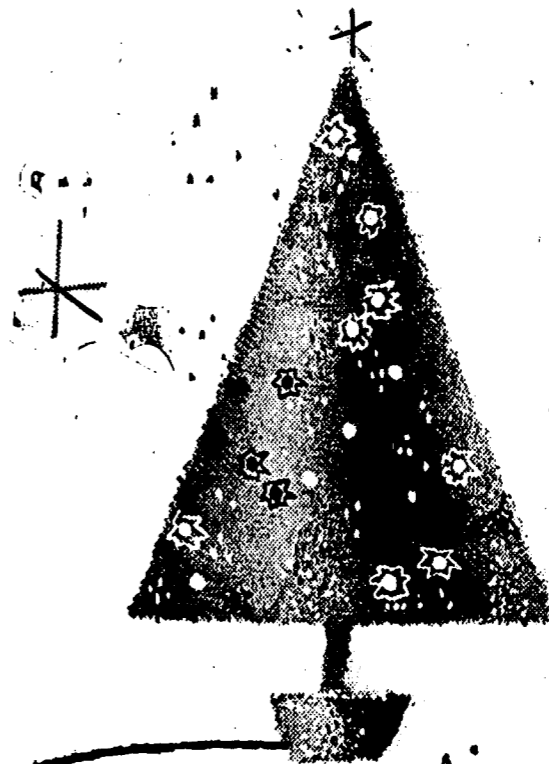

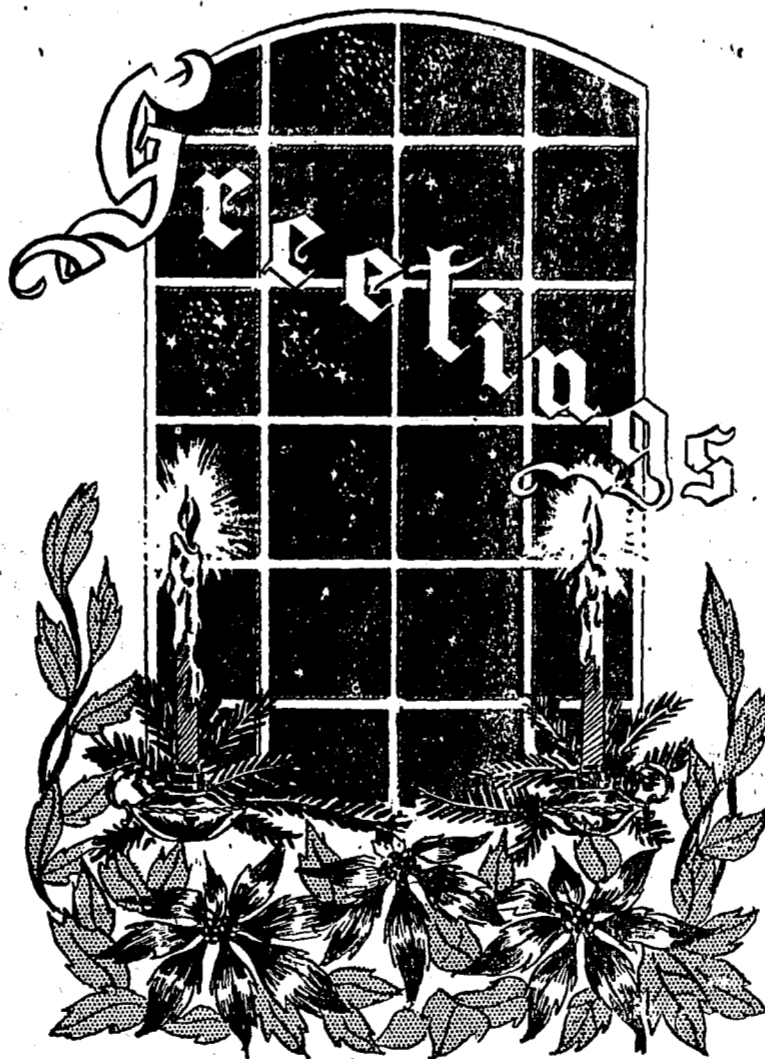

U. of I. Moscow — Journalism students at the University of Idaho can learn the "tricks of the trade" in the classrooms.

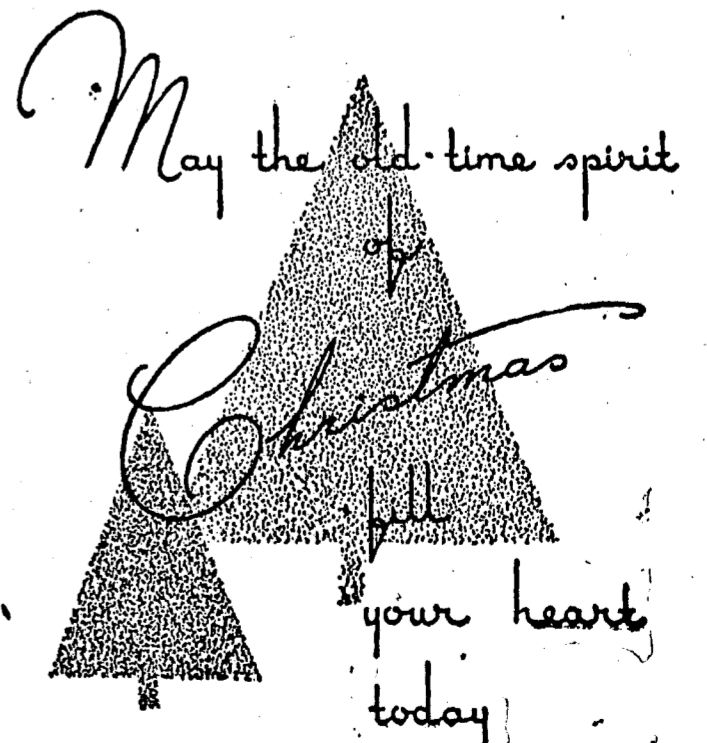
A special news reporting laboratory which meets six hours a week under the direction of journalism instructor Marlan Nelson aids students in the bridging of the gap between the textbook and the profession.

Students are assigned regular news beats on the campus. Stories are written in the journalism classroom which serves as the "city room" for the class. The fruit of their reporting appears in the Argonaut, the campus newspaper.

"By using practical situations the students become more news conscious and often develop good news stories out of contacts made on the campus," Nelson said.

Many news courses are taught out of books alone, Nelson added. But by giving the students a beat of their own to cover, the book becomes alive and fires the student's imagination. Problems in news coverage are more real to the student.

Students taking the course include Frank P. McCreary, Kendrick.



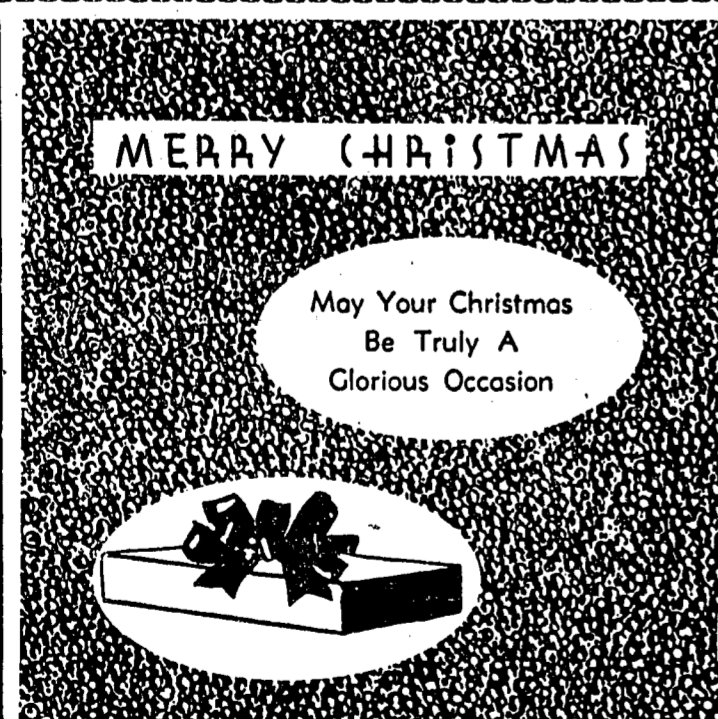
