Truck Over Grade — Burns

A two-ton '57 Ford truck went over the grade above the Ormand Manderfeld ranch on Big Bear ridge Monday night about midnight.

Mr. Manderfeld was aroused by his cattle, who were giving evidence of fright, and went out immediately, to see the vehicle burning near his herd.

Neighbors were alerted and began a search at once to find the injured, as the truck cab was empty. Evidently it had rolled over several times, coming down the bank, and may have been burning when it left the road, as burned material was found (in the morning) a little way down.

The cab was well burned out, as well as the tires.

The Halseth Brothers, Herman Hinrichs, Joe and Edwin Forest, Oscar Slind and Ormand Manderfeld, working with flashlights, combed the hill side, looking for someone who might have been thrown out, but not a sign of anyone was found.

Joe Forest came on into town to report the accident to E. M. White, and in the morning the search was again taken up. The license plates were being checked, but as yet no light has been shed on who the truck belongs to, or how it got there.

Mrs. Olga Christine Halseth, 64, died at the family home on Big Bear ridge, Monday morning about 10:30 o'clock, after suffering a stroke. She had suffered with a heart ailment for several months.

Mrs. Halseth was born at Torpen, Norway, Jan. 24, 1893. She came to this country in 1910, settling in Montana. She was united in marriage to Ed. Halseth, Sept. 22, 1916, at Great Falls. They moved to Big Bear ridge in 1919 and have resided there since.

She was a member of the Deary Lutheran Church, and the Happy Home Club.

Surviving are her husband; five sons, Ervin of Craigmont; Orville of Lewiston; Arnold and Gerald of Deary and Harold of Moses Lake; three daughters, Mrs. Betty Jones of Lewiston; Mrs. Helen Leland of Clarkston and Mrs. Margaret Cox of Biloxi, Miss; two sisters, Mrs. Mattie Halseth of Deary, and Gunda Asabeggard, West Torpen, Norway, and nine grandchildren.

The body is at Short's Funeral Home in Moscow, with arrangements pending.

Mrs. Halseth was a wonderful mother, and neighbor, and was beloved by all who knew her. For many years she had been crippled by arthritis and suffered greatly, yet through all her pain she did not complain, but managed her home and had a cheery smile for everyone.

Her passing will be felt deeply in the community.

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

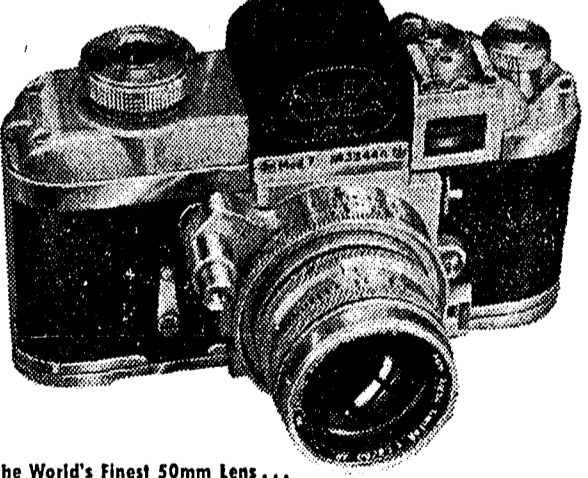
