VANDALS SHOOT UP BUILDINGS

ROAD PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

Boise — The Idaho Board of Highway directors announced through their chairman, R. C. Rich, the following construction planning program for District IV. This is approximately a three to four year planning program, with the projects marked with asterisks to be eligible for construction in 1958. (We list only those pertinent to this area) as follows:

* Bovill-Deary; * Deary-Bear Ridge Hill (SH 7, 2.2 miles); * Ahasahka-Kendrick-Por. Devil's Elbow-Southwick (SH 7, 9.0 miles).

The 1958 projects will be built as plans are completed, as right-of-way is purchased and as construction funds are available. This action further authorizes the Highway Department to proceed on the approved 1958 projects as fast as possible, and to prepare in an orderly pattern the remaining projects on the planning program.

The total list above includes all programmed projects not previously built, together with annual additions. It is the policy of the Highway Board not to remove any projects from this list once programmed, and thus each project remains programmed until such time as it can be built. The 1958 planning contemplates an expenditure of approximately \$3,264,000 covering about 57.2 miles in District IV.

It is impossible to be assured exactly which projects may be ready to advertise for bids on schedule, due to:

1. Right-of-way procurement difficulties due to litigation, since the department must have clear title to all parcels before construction may begin.
2. Technical engineering delays caused by lack of road material sources and unforeseen delays in pro-

IT'S THAT TIME AGAIN!
Boise — Everyone whose total income exceeded \$600 during 1957 is required to file a federal income tax return. The only exceptions are for persons over 65, for whom the filing exemption is \$1200. Anyone who did not receive return forms by mail may obtain them from Internal Revenue offices.

Most wage earners whose income was under \$5,000 last year will find it easiest and best to use the "short-way" card form 1040A federal income tax return. They can also easily figure their own tax with the simple table, showing the refund claimed or how much they owed so they can enclose payment with the return. But whatever form is used there has been little change from last year in the way to prepare a federal income tax return.

So taxpayers who carefully follow the instructions showing line-by-line how to do it, should have little trouble preparing their own returns. Their last year's return copy will help.
