Cuban Curiosities Added To Institute Collection

WASHINGTON - Lizards apparently immune to bullets, bat-crushing snakes, pigmy boa constrictors, frogs that never are polywogs, and frogs less than a third of an inch. long are among the curiosities of reptile and amphibian life recently collected in Cuba for the Smithsonian Institution by David Hardy, a graduate student of the University of Maryland.

Most curious of the lot are the "bulletproof" lizards. They are large iguanas, 3 to 4 feet long, with a curious resemblance to antidiluvian monsters. Mr. Hardy found them in limestone outcroppings and on sandy islands along the Cuban coast.

Tell How Tranquilizers

LOS ANGELES-More light has been thrown on the way tranquilizers act on the brain by scientists at the University of California, Los Angeles.


In animal studies it was found that reserpine by itself acted directly on certain brain areas to bring about its tranquilizing effects. These effects are apparently brought about by an action of the drug on regulating mechanisms in the brain stem.

One of the mechanisms affected by the drug is a center called the RAS (reticular activating system) which is known to regulate how "awake" we are.

It had previously been thought that reserpine stimulated the flow of serotonin, a substance thought to be a neuro-hormone, which in turn acted on the brain.

College Students Of Today Not As Wild As Formerly

LOS ANGELES-If you think the younger college generation is going to the dogs then you're barking up the wrong tree, according to a University of California dean.

In a study of the morals and manners of college students of past generations, Adolph Brugger, Assistant Dean of Students at UCLA, writes: "The earliest accounts of university life quickly dispel the illusion that the medieval undergraduate was devoted to Biblical study and religious virtue."

Records of Italian courts of law in the 13th century, Dean Brugger said, have preserved a tedious detail of petty and not-so-petty offenses - quarrels with tradesmen, armed attacks on citizens, cutlass duels in the classroom, the abuse of women, robberies and "lesser riots."

"Again, a century later, we read of the Town and Gown Riot at Ox-Yord which lasted for almost a week, resulting in the death of more than 50 students and townsmen,"

At Leipzig there were graded penalties, "for him who picks up a missile to throw at a professor, him who throws and misses, and him who accomplishes his fell purpose to the master's hurt."

U.S. Opens Doors Wide To Sesame

WASHINGTON-The United States has opened its door to sesame.

Though sesame was one of the first seed plants cultivated by man, the tropical herb has only recently been grown as a commercial crop in this country.

Sesame seed has many uses, ranging from stock feed to medicine and cookery. Most familiar as a garnish on baked goods, the seed is also used as a seasoning and as the chief ingredient of "halva," a confection that originated in the Mediterranean area.

The seeds yield half their weight in oil that is highly resistant to rancidity and suitable for all edible-oil uses, such as salad dressing and shortening. The oil goes into cosmetics and soap. It is used as a carrier of certain drugs, including penicillin.

Irregular Beat **Of Heart Doesn't** Mean Sure Death

CHICAGO - The irregular beak ing of a person's heart at frequent, intervals - or even constantlydoesn't mean he's going to have a heart attack and die.

In fact, one New Yorker's heart beat irregularly for 38 years before he suddenly died at the age of 94, "having been most active until the very last moment," a New York: doctor reported today.

He was suffering from auricularfibrillation, which is a convulsive movement of the upper chambers: of the heart. His was the familial type.

He was one of 22 members of the same family, all of whom had anricular fibrillation. The family's history, covering 36 years and 112 members of five generations, was outlined by Dr. William L. Gould, Albany, N.Y., in the Archives of Internal Medicine, published by the American Medical Association.

The first two cases occurred in a stepbrother and a stepsister. Eight members of the second generation who lived to the sixth decade or beyond all developed auricular 5brillation. In the third generation, 11 cases have already developed and more may appear from time to time, Dr. Gould said.

Only one case has appeared in the fourth generation-in a 32-yearold man, who is the youngest onr to have the condition. So far the fifth generation is too young too show signs of the disorder.

The usual symptoms of paroxysmal auricular fibrillation are paipitation, irregular beat, "the heart in the mouth" feeling, weakness, dizziness, faintness, and cold sweat. They present many problems of diagnosis, since they usually disappear before a doctor can arrive and make a diagnosis.

Farmers Rely On Outside Earnings

NEW YORK-Over a third of the income of the nation's farm operators and their families is now coming from sources entirely outside of agriculture, reflecting a longterm shift in major sources of farm income and a progressively lessening dependence on farming itself as the predominant source of livelihood.

The chief factor in this trend have been the big growth of non-farm, job opportunities as the result of the expansion of the economy over the last decade and a half, but an

appreciable and growing income is being contributed by a return on savings and by public and private retirement benefits, annuities, etc. A special survey made by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the Bureau of the Census shows that farm operator families had an aggregate nonfarm income of \$6:9 billions in 1955 out of a total income of 19.3 billions in that year. Thus nonagricultural income represented 38 cents of every dollar of income of farm operators and their families in 1955,

20 Years Added To Lifespan Since 1900

NEW YORK-About 20 years: have been added to the average lifetime of the American people since the turn of the century, according to statisticians. The expectation of life at birth on a nationwide basis has increased to 694 years.

Figures from the National Office of Vital Statistics indicate that the chances for a white man of age 20 surviving to age 65 increased from 514 to 686 per 1,000 between 1900-02 and 1955.

At the same time, more than three-fourths of the men aged 50 may now expect to reach the normal retirement age of 65. The expected lifetime of those reaching 65 also has been extended somewhat, the chances of living to age 75 having increased from 545 to 605 per 1,000.

Mortality Up Slightly **During Past Year**

NEW YORK--Reflecting largely the widespread outbreak of Asian influenza, the general mortality im the United States increased moderately in 1957.

The national death rate for 1957 is estimated to be 9.6 per 1,000 population, compared with 9.4 for 1956. It is the tenth year in succession to record a rate below 10 per 1,000.

Since the beginning of September, the acute upper respiratory diseases, including Asian influenza, disabled about half the population for at least one day, according to information available from the National Health Survey.


