

Predict New Type Family Doctor Will Soon Appear

CHICAGO—Prognostication is in the air with the beginning of the new year!

And from his vantage point as a trustee of the American Medical Association, Dr. Julian P. Price sees a new type of general practitioner emerging within the next 30 years.

Dr. Price, who is 56, the father of three grown children and a practicing pediatrician in Florence, S.C., said the next 30 years will show as many scientific achievements and changes in the way medicine is practiced as the American people and physicians have experienced in the last 30 years.

Dr. Price said: "Medical practice will change. The trend toward specialization will continue, with an increase in group practices in clinics. These clinics will be staffed and equipped to furnish complete care for the ambulatory patient, and a large segment of the population will patronize their services.

"There will still be those, however, who want individual physicians for themselves and their families, and for these a new type of general practitioner will emerge to take the place of the present general practitioner.

"His work will consist of internal medicine, pediatrics and psychiatry, with office procedures in orthopedics, gynecology, and surgery."

Tons of Cure For National Headache

NEWARK—Americans must have plenty of headaches. In a recent year they took a multitude of pain relievers, including over 7,000 tons of aspirin products, more than 100 tablets for every man, woman and child in the country.

While headaches and remedies are plentiful, there is a lack of complete scientific understanding of their causes and effects, according to Dr. Morton J. Rodman, professor of pharmacology at Rutgers University College of Pharmacy here.

The State University pharmacologist explains that doctors know the brain itself is insensitive to pain. They think that most headaches are caused by large arteries and veins on the surface of the skull "pulling" on nerves which carry pain impulses.

Anything which enlarges, displaces or presses on these blood vessels tends to stimulate pain-sensitive nerve endings.

Cuban Curiosities Added To Institute Collection

WASHINGTON—Lizards apparently immune to bullets, bat-crushing snakes, pigmy boa constrictors, frogs that never are polywogs, and frogs less than a third of an inch long are among the curiosities of reptile and amphibian life recently collected in Cuba by the Smithsonian Institution by David Hardy, a graduate student of the University of Maryland.

Most curious of the lot are the "bulletproof" lizards. They are large iguanas, 3 to 4 feet long, with a curious resemblance to antediluvian monsters. Mr. Hardy found them in limestone outcroppings and on sandy islands along the Cuban coast.

"You just can't kill them with bullets," he says. Over and over again he has hit them with a .22 rifle. When shot, he says, they turn over on their backs and lie still, but when approached the apparently dead reptile suddenly "comes to life again," gets on its feet with marvelous speed, and disappears down a hole. About the only way to collect specimens is with a noose.

Tell How Tranquilizers Act on the Brain

LOS ANGELES—More light has been thrown on the way tranquilizers act on the brain by scientists at the University of California, Los Angeles.

In animal studies it was found that reserpine by itself acted directly on certain brain areas to bring about its tranquilizing effects. These effects are apparently brought about by an action of the drug on regulating mechanisms in the brain stem.

One of the mechanisms affected by the drug is a center called the RAS (reticular activating system) which is known to regulate how "awake" we are.

It had previously been thought that reserpine stimulated the flow of serotonin, a substance thought to be a neuro-hormone, which in turn acted on the brain.

Home Taught

CHICAGO—Today, an estimated 10 per cent of the nation's licensed engineers are home taught. More than 32,000 persons enrolled in home study engineering courses through correspondence schools in 1955.

NEW TYPE CAR DEVELOPED

"The Pig Palace", a revolutionary new kind of livestock car, equipped with adjustable shutters for cold weather protection — has just been introduced by the Northern Pacific railway.

The first of a fleet of 22 unique, 40-foot, roller-bearing, double-deck stock cars, designed by the railway to pamper its pig passengers, rolled off the assembly line at NP's Brainerd Minn., car shops last week.

Most unusual feature of the cars, to be used principally in hog shipments from the midwest to the Pacific Northwest, is a system of metal shutters, arranged in panels, which may be manually adjusted for complete or partial closing of the space between the car side slats. The flexibility of the adjustable shutters also makes it possible to provide quickly the degree of protection needed in case of unexpected changes in weather during shipment.

Comfort during hot weather has not been overlooked, either. Aluminum paint has been applied to exteriors of roofs and car ends to reflect solar heat during summer.

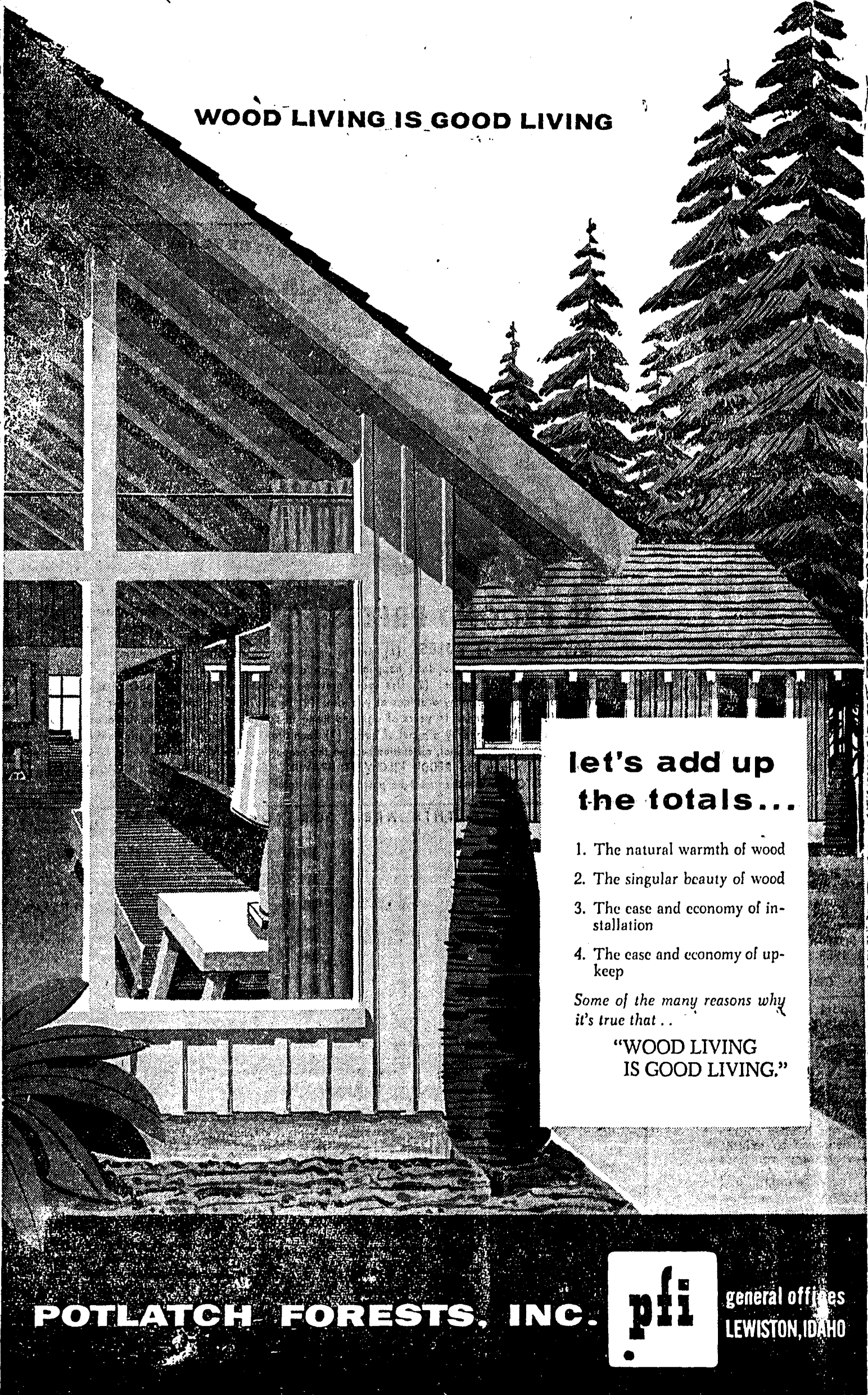

W. W. P. SCHOLARSHIP CONTEST

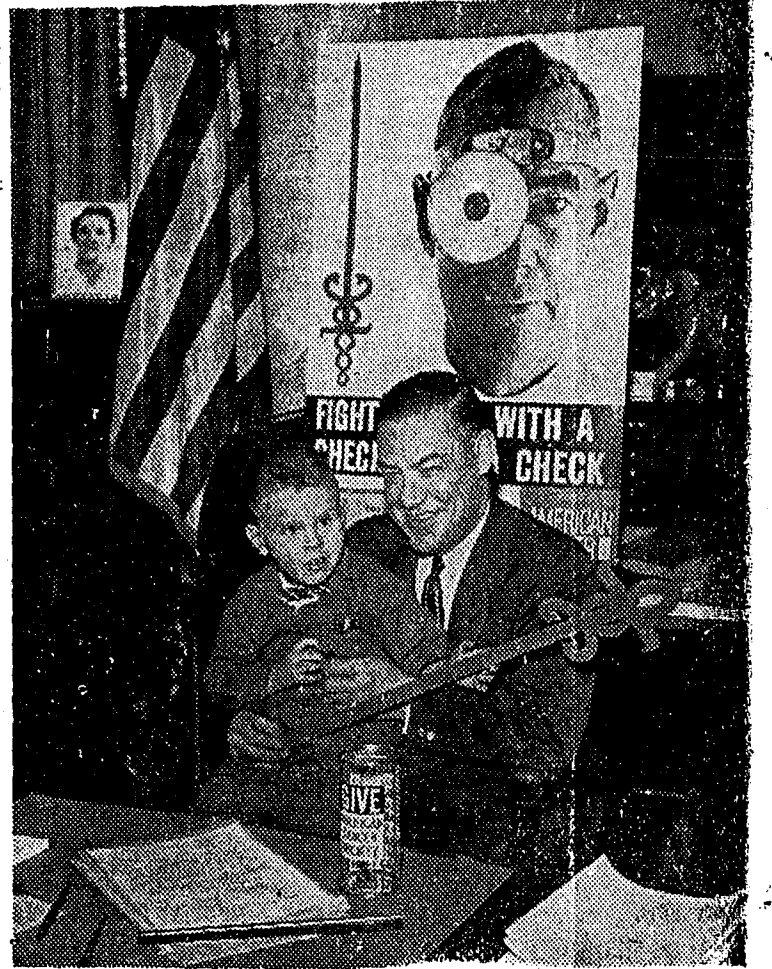
