### HIGHWAY WORK IS SLATED IN AREA

#### ALMOST 12 MILES SCHEDULED LOCALLY FOR 1958

Lewiston — The Department of Highways is now negotiating for purchase of the right of way for the 2.2 mile project known as the Bear Ridge-Deary job.

The District's design on the 9½-mile portion of the Ahsahka-Kendrick road, which is included on the 1958 construction program, is 90 percent complete and will be forwarded to the Boise office in the near future, says Phillip A. Marsh, Dist. Engineer.

#### Right of Way Acquisition

Good highways are vital to the continued progress of our people in raising themselves to new heights of living standards. We must have a better highway system. No nation can exist without good highways.

So, to benefit all the people of Idaho, the state exercises an inherent governmental function by acquiring private land for public highway purposes. Your constitution and laws provide the manner in which this land is acquired and require just compensation (fair market value) to be paid or determined by a court or jury prior to acquisition.

In purchasing right of way for highway purposes the Highway Department has a dual responsibility. First, to make certain the property owner receives full compensation for the property taken. Second, to protect the taxpayer and see that he receives full value for his dollar.

After right of way lines are established by engineering studies, the Right of Way department determines the ownership of the land needed and appraisals are then made. If the land required is part of a larger tract, the appraisal is made on the whole parcel (including improvements) to determine the fair cash market value of the entire property before the taking of right of way (what the property would sell for on the open market). An appraisal is then made to determine the fair cash market value of the land and improvements remaining after the taking. The difference between the two, of course, being the amount the state would pay. This reflects the value of the portion taken as well as damage to the remaining property.

Whenever possible the state employs local men to do the appraisal work, as well as using men from the department's own appraisal staff. After the appraisal is completed, a negotiator from the right of way department contacts the owner and explains the project and appraisal. The negotiator then makes an offer to purchase the property. The purchase price is based on the appraised amount. If, after interviewing the property owner, the negotiator or the owner feels that the appraisal is not correct, the negotiator so reports to his supervisor, who again reviews the appraisal, and if deemed necessary, secures and additional appraisal.

Should there be a failure to reach a price accord, a court hearing will be held.

### SOCIAL SECURITY REPORT

Social security reports on domestic workers for the January-March quarter are due in April, Marlow V. Wootton, manager of the Lewiston social security office announced this week. Under the present law, most domestic employees, such as gardeners, cooks, maids and housekeepers, are covered under social security. Employers of these and other household workers must report the cash wages paid and remit the social security tax of 4 1/2% of the employee's wages. In cases where the domestic employee has earned less than \$50 cash in the quarter, the employer does not have to make any report. Mr. Wootton stressed the point that these wage reports are extremely important to the domestic employee, since old-age, survivors and disability insurance benefits under social security are figured on the basis of the amount of earnings credited to a person's account. The form used in making the re-

turn on household employees requires only a few minutes to complete and may be obtained from the office of the District Director of Internal Revenue in Boise, Idaho.
