dreamed by legendary or historical potentates. An essential force in the creation of this standard is advertising, that system and philosophy of intelligence whose function is to stimulate production and put its fruits within the reach and enjoyment of everybody. This in turn results in a theme that "America is a Better America, Thanks to Advertising."

What this means more precisely can be expressed in a number of ways. An admirable definition of advertising has been given by Sir Winston Churchill: "Advertising nourishes the consuming power of man... sets up the goal of a better home, better clothing, better food for himself and his family. It spurs individual exertion

and greater production. It brings together in fertile union those things which otherwise would not have met." To this we add that by encouraging competition, advertising has enormously reduced the price of goods and brings forth their improvement, and vouches for their quality. Advertising is no longer a mere announcement of goods or services for sale. It has adopted the ways of education and the arts and accepted the obligations of our economy. The evidence of this is everywhere: In the tools, utilities, textiles and appliances we use; in our automobiles, our entertainment, medicines, books and cosmetics — everything, in short, that makes "the American standard of living" not only a goal achieved, but a promise of the same abundance to all men. — Los Angeles Examiner.

HOT JETS ON THE HIGHWAY

Deaths on the highway, says a dispatch from the National Safety Council, are now going up faster than the increase in travel. Alarming, obviously. And there are doubtless many reasons. Might not one of them be a mania for speed, which subtly affects even the soberest of us? If so, is the automobile industry trying to stem this wave or is it riding it? It seems only accurate and fair to say: "Both." The makers are spotlighting safety

features. But also, what do slogans such as the following convey? "The hot one's even hotter." "Takes off like a jet." "Outperforms any car on the road, bar none." "Like a Navy jet catapulted from a flight deck." A responsible official of one of the great companies admits, "A considerable proportion of the advertising... is far from sedate... The buyers do want more power." But has a great industry no responsibility to society as well as to the "buyer"—no responsibility to help protect the thoughtless driver from himself? — Christian Science Monitor.

Historic Scale At University
A scale that weighed more than a million dollars worth of gold dust and nuggets in Idaho's early mining history, has been formally accepted by the regents as a gift to the University of Idaho, President D. R. Theophilus said last week.

There's still gold in that scale, too. Gleaming flecks can be seen imbedded in the wooden base of the scale — "dust" that had been spilled out in the weighing process and then had been pressed into the wood when the scale's iron weights were placed on it. A. N. Dyer of Boise, who presented the scale to the university, said that in 1883 it came into the possession of Vollmer & Scott, a general merchandise firm operated by John P. Vollmer and Wallace Scott of Mt. Idaho and Grangeville. The firm acted as agent for the Wells Fargo Express Co., and weighed gold that was brought in by pack train, principally from the Warren mining camp. The gold had to be weighed before it was transferred to a stagecoach for shipment to the San Francisco mint.

Boise — More than 400 Idaho citizens have received length-of-service certificates for uncompensated service in the Selective Service system, it was announced this week.

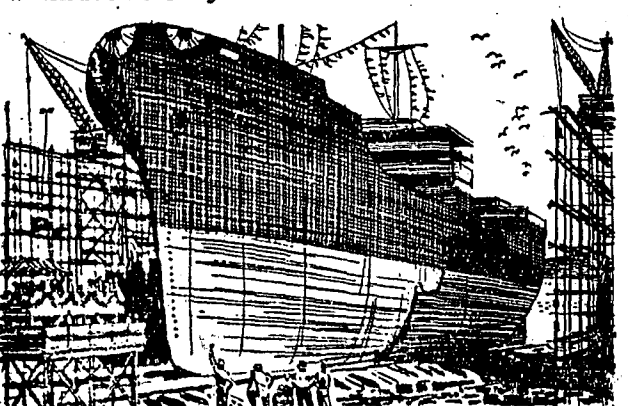
Among those who have received 15-year certificates are Mahlon E. Follert, Genesee, and W. T. Marineau of Moscow — both from Latah county.
