Chewing plants can be dangerous, evening luncheon guests of Mr. and Robert Higgins, agronomist of the University of Idaho extension servicepointed out this week. He said he had recently had several calls from parents of children who had eaten weeds

and become ill. The most likely cause of trouble, he said, is hemlock. Children mistake it for celery, carrot, parsnip or rhubarb. It looks a little like all of them is poisonous. Poison hemlock has a finely di-

vided leaf, coarse stem spotted with

purple blotches, and a branched tap

root. The root is solid and yellow. The plant has a strong mousy odor. All parts are poisonous. It is one of several poisonous plants growing in many Idaho areas, usually Mrs. Marvin Vincent spent Monday in moist places. They are rank, rapid growers and have hollow stems. They

attract children because they look like unusual vegetables. Water hemlock has a leaf divided into two or three parts, but not as finelly divided as the poison hemlock. Historic Scale At University A scale that weighed more than a million dollars worth of gold dust and nuggets in Idaho's early mining history, has been formally accepted by the regents as a gift to the University of Idaho, President D. R. Theophilus

said last week. There's still gold in that scale, too. Gleaming flecks can be seen imbedded in the wooden base of the scale — "dust" that had been spilled out in the weighing process and then had been pressed into the wood when the

scale's iron weights were placed on it.

A. N. Dyer of Baise, who presented the scale to the university, said that in 1893 it came into the possession of Vollmer & Scott, a general merchandise firm operated by John P. Vollmer and Wallace Scott of Mt. Idaha and and Wallace Scott of Mt. Idaho and Grangeville. The firm acted as agent for the Wells Fargo Express Co., and weighed gold that was brought in by pack train, principally from the Warren mining camp. The gold had to be weighed before it was transferred to a stagecoach for shipment to the San Francisco mint.
