

## FLOOD CONTROL PROJECT ON POTLATCH O. K.'D: HOPE TO BEGIN EARLY JULY

**ENGINEERS, RAILWAY, TOWN, REACH AGREEMENT**

Neal Swanson and O. L. Coombe, representing the Corps of Army Engineers of the Walla Walla District, made an official visit to Kendrick Monday morning, conferring with Frank Abarms, mayor, and other members of the village trustees on the proposed dike for flood control along the Potlatch river, adjoining Kendrick.

The Engineers stated all the money — \$118,000.00, had been appropriated and everything was in readiness to call for contracts as soon as the necessary easements from the Northern Pacific Railroad were signed. At the conclusion of this formality contracts will be let and construction should start soon thereafter.

The project is expected to take approximately three months to complete, with the dike extending from the Lewiston Grain Growers upper warehouse in the east part of town, to the Kendrick Rochdale Co. warehouse in the west part of town. The bluff above the "old swimming hole" which contains the bore that once carried water for power to the Kendrick Flour Mill, will be removed; the island sitting in the middle of the river just above the depot will be taken out, the creek bed deepened and straightened — and the dike added.

Mr. Abrams talked to the N. P. railway company officials in Seattle Tuesday morning by phone, and was informed the necessary easements had been signed, and they were forwarding them here immediately. He was assured all speed would be used.



### TREE FARMS ON INCREASE

Lewiston (Special) — Idaho, one of the nation's leading states in growing timber crops on private, taxpaying lands — is about to push its Tree Farm acreage past the million mark, a forest industry leader said today.

E. C. Rettig, executive vice-president of Potlatch Forests, Inc., Lewiston, said it appeared that the Gem State's millionth Tree Farm acre would be certified in May.

Mr. Rettig said 655 owners were practicing timber crop management on 899,844 acres of certified Tree Farms in Idaho as of April 1. Only four other states — Mississippi, Texas, Alabama and Arkansas — could top Idaho in the number of certified tree farmers, he added.

A certified Tree Farm, Mr. Rettig explained, is private, taxpaying forest land managed to grow forest crops to help meet present and future needs in wood supply. Related

benefits, he noted, include wildlife, recreation and water and soil protection.

Nationally, he said, there are more than 45 million acres in 46 states dedicated to this program, which is sponsored by private forest industry.

Tree Farm certification in Idaho, said Mr. Rettig, is administered by the Western Pine Assn. of Portland, Ore., which maintains a forester in Coeur d'Alene. Woodlot owners wishing to become tree farmers also can check their nearest forester for details.

**FOREIGN USE OF WHEAT**

Lewiston, Idaho (Special) — Don Herring, executive secretary of the Idaho State Wheat Growers Assn., reported on the activities of the Wheat Growers of the Northwest in the development of the Japanese market for the consumption of wheat and wheat products.

A report to Herring from Otto A-men, president of the Washington Wheat Growers Assn., stated it is now established that over 500 schools throughout Japan have started lunch operations, using wheat since July of 1957, when the Washington Wheat Assn began the program.

The lunch program includes a bread roll that resembles an American hot dog bun. Steps are being taken to change some of the diet habits of the traditionally rice-eating Japanese. The self-help program of the Wheat Growers to increase the foreign market is being carried out with the cooperation of the Foreign Agricultural Service, USDA, and the Japanese Federation of School Lunch Co-operatives.

Herring reported that the Idaho Assn., which was formed 18 months ago, is now laying plans to join the activities of the other Northwest states associations in the development of these foreign markets for wheat of the area.

If the Pacific Northwest associations are successful in starting school feeding in every Japanese school, it could boost exports by as much as 5 million bushels yearly from Northwest ports. Herring re-

ports lunch bread rolls served in Japanese schools are made of a blend of 40 percent western white and 60 percent hard wheats. Exact percentages are prescribed by Japanese law.

**INTEREST RATE DOWN**

Lewiston — The interest rate on new Land Bank loans has been reduced from 5 1/2 to 5 percent, Joe M. Skok, secretary-treasurer of the Nezperce National Farm Loan Assn., announced this week.

Skok said that effective May 1, the new 5 percent rate also is being made applicable to loans already on the bank's books which bear higher rates of interest. In the four northwest states, the Federal Land Bank of Spokane has more than \$16 million in 5 1/2 percent loans outstanding and \$7 million in pending loans which will be leveled to the new rate.

Skok explained that the interest rate on Land Bank loans is geared to the cost of money in the investment markets where the banks sell bonds to raise funds with which to make loans.

The Nezperce association makes loans for its parent institution in Nez Perce, Lewis, Clearwater and Asotin counties.

Money may talk, but the amount most of us handle barely speaks above a whisper.





