PAYS FLYING VISIT

A Kendrick man who took civilian pilot training under the late Bert Zimmerman of Lewiston in the spring of 1942, was at Lewiston Airport on Monday in a somewhat larger plane than he flew in his training days.

Lt. Com. John Wallace, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester A. Wallace of Kendrick made the trip in a navy Neptune patrol bomber — a twin-engine plane with jet power for takeoff assists and emergency use.

Accompanied by Lt. R. G. Wilson as co-pilot and two mechanics, Wallace flew here on a training flight from the Denver Naval Air Station. He visited his brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. John Thiesen in Clarkston Monday afternoon.

Monday evening he went to Kendrick to visit his parents and see his nephew, Randy Wallace, son of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn B. Wallace of Mojave, Calif., graduate from high school. He returned to Denver Tuesday.

Wallace, who was a student pilot under the man who later formed the Zimmerman Air Transport, which grew into Empire Air Lines and the present West Coast Airlines, served in the Atlantic during World War II and on Okinawa during the Korean War. He has been stationed at Denver for three years. He will report for station-keeper duty in July at the Naval Air Station at Los Alamos, Calif. — Lewiston Tribune.

CHESTER MCIVER DIES ON MONDAY

SOUTHWICK PIONEER FARMER SUCCEUMS TO HEART ATTACK

Chester McIver, well known pioneer farmer, retired, died at his home at Southwick Monday morning at 7:30 o'clock, the victim of a heart ailment. He had suffered with heart trouble for more than a year and a half.

Chester McIver was born at Southwick Jan. 25, 1897, and had made his home there all of his life with the exception of a four-year period, 1912-1916, when he lived in Saskatchewan, Canada.

On Jan. 26, 1916, he was united in marriage to Stella Triplett, at Lewiston. She survives him at the family home in Southwick.

Other survivors include a son, Don McIver, and a daughter, Mrs. Roy Gertje, both of Southwick; and a brother, Don McIver, in Canada. Seven grandchildren also survive.

Mr. McIver loved the soil and his chosen profession, farming. He engaged in this pursuit from the time he was a youth until forced by ill health to retire. Following his retirement Mr. and Mrs. McIver spent some months in Lewiston, but as soon as health permitted, they returned to the family home at Southwick. Although in poor health his sudden passing comes as a shock to friends and neighbors alike.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 o'clock Wednesday afternoon from the Brower-Wann Chapel, Lewiston, with the Rev. Keith Himple officiating. Interment was in the Southwick cemetery at 4:00 p. m.

FINAL RITES FOR PETER HALSETH

Final rites for Peter Halseth, who passed away May 11, were held at 2:30 p. m., Thursday, May 15, at the Zion Lutheran Church, Deary, with the Rev. Manley J. Helleborn bringing the message. Vocalists were Virginia Corey and Harriet Hammond, who sang "Heaven of Rest" and "Beyond the Sunset," accompanied at the organ by Sallie Howell. Interment was in Zion Lutheran Cemetery, Deary.

Active pallbearers were Archie Carman, Ray Johnson, George Carman, Howard Springer, Art. Burke and Ed. Magnuson, Honorary, Don McKinney, Sam Anderson, Victor Anderson, Ed. McKinney, Tom Whybark and Don Lawrence.

Peter Halseth was born in Opdal, Norway, Aug. 13, 1886. At the age of nine years he came to America and with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Louis Halseth, lived at Janesville, near Helmer, where he attended school. Later the family purchased the Halseth farm on Big Bear ridge and moved there. In his early twenties he went to Montana, where he was employed by the Reclamation Service at Fort Shaw. Ingvold Aas and he took up a homestead near Dutton, Montana.

In 1913 he was united in marriage to Miss Mattie Klette, a sister of the late Mrs. Ed. Halseth, at Cheateau, Mont. To this union were born three children, Mebel (Mrs. Arthur Bemig, of Spokane); Melvin, at Deary, and Howard. The latter was killed in action on March 28, 1945, at Mainz, Germany, during World War II. He was laid to rest in the U. S. Military Cemetery, Stromberg, Germany. His two sons, Terry and Claude, live at Helmer.

The Peter Halseth family lived in Montana until 1919, when they came to Kendrick for two years they purchased a farm east of Deary where he resided continuously until his death. He worked for the Mark P. Miller Milling Co. at Deary for several years, later being employed by the Hitchcock-Shaefer Cedar Pole Co. at Bovill until his retirement from this and farming six years ago.

He had been a life-long member of the Lutheran Church and was an active member of the Deary Grange when this was first organized. He also served as a member of the Deary School Board. He succumbed to a heart attack at his home May 11.

The large number coming to pay their last respects to this good friend and neighbor and the beautiful floral offerings and gifts in memoriam bore testimony of the high esteem in which he was held by everyone.

In addition to his children he is survived by his wife Mattie; a sister, Mrs. Tora Pearson, Spokane; a brother, Ed. Halseth, Kendrick; a brother, John Halseth, Auburn, Wn.; 14 grandchildren, and several nephews and nieces.

TEACHERS FETED AT POT-LUCK

Following the dinner Elmer Stitzlein led the group in singing "School Days." Mr. Meserve presented Mrs. Kluckholm with a pen and pencil set and Norla Callison presented Mr. Calvert with a desk pen set — each a gift from the P.-T. A.

Seven former students of Mrs. Kluckholm, Patsy Christensen, Sonja Swanson, Sandra Cantril, Carol Lohman, Hazel Perkins, Rona Armitage and Rose Lettenmaier, each presented her with a rose, as they gave a sentence showing appreciation of her devotion to them.

Mrs. Darwin Tarry then presented Mrs. Kluckholm with a leather purse from the teachers of the District.

In a program "This Is Your Life, Mr. Calvert," Eugene Taylor acted as MC to give a brief history of the 44 years Mr. Calvert had taught. His first job was teaching in the Preparatory Dept., Edwards College, Albion, Wash., in 1911. From then on his heart was in his work with children, and though he held other positions he always came back to the school room.

He married one of his former pupils, Gladys Hoskins, Aug. 9, 1917, and took up a homestead in Twin Falls county, and there he built a home.

In 1918 he took a job as mechanics helper in Twin Falls, later went into the Service (World War I). Home from duty he worked for a time in Close Book Store, until the fall of 1920 — when he returned to teaching.

He served as principal of the High School at Southwick in 1923; principal at Leland 1925-28; principal of the grade school at Anshika from 1928 to 1935. Following, he was principal of a two-room grade school at Crangement for seven years. From 1942 to 1943 he served as principal for the two-room Banner school at Orofino. From 1943 to 1948 he was principal of the Deary Grade school. He came to Juliaetta in 1948, where he was for ten years principal of the Juliaetta six-room school.

Many humorous incidents were recalled and some hard times, too! When he was principal of the grade school in Albion, Wash. (1913-14) his wages were \$75.00 a month, with \$15.00 for room and board. At one school he had to walk three miles to and from, and carried groceries "home on his back — no car!"

Those present who had "gone" to school to him or taught under his supervision were introduced. Among them were Mrs. Darwin Tarry, Mrs. Eugene Taylor, Mrs. Cecil Gruell, Mrs. Lester Nelson; George Nelson of Moscow, and Robert Meserve. A letter was read from Jasper Nutting of Lind, Wash., expressing regrets that he could not be present for the occasion. Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Erwin of Colfax, son-in-law and daughter of the Calverts were introduced.

Mr. Taylor concluded the program with this summary: Mr. Calvert had taken elocution and dramatic reading lessons for two and a half years; had been president of the Clearwater County Association for eight years; president of the Latah County Teachers Assn. three years; president of District 283 for a year, and was representative to the State Association at Boise on ten different years.

Mr. Meserve presented the Calverts with lawn chairs, from the District teachers. They will make their home in Lewiston.

Mrs. Kluckholm's home is at Clarkston, where she will reside.

It is a real loss to the community to lose these teachers by retirement, but all wish them happiness.

DR. INGLE TO BE SPEAKER

U. of I. Moscow — A University of Idaho graduate who has attained fame as a research scientist will return to his alma mater on Sunday, June 8, to deliver the Baccalaureate and Commencement address for the class of 1958.

He is Dr. Dwight J. Ingle, who is a professor of physiology at the Ben May laboratory for cancer research at the University of Chicago.

In recognition of his research on the functions of the body, he has been the recipient of the Roche-Organon award and the W. E. Upjohn prize, and has been named a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

Dr. Ingle was born in Kendrick in 1907. He was graduated from the University of Idaho in 1929 with a bachelor of science degree. While working toward a master's degree, which was conferred in 1931, he was a teaching assistant in psychology. He received a Ph. D. from the University of Minnesota in 1941.

He became an assistant biochemist as a Mayo Foundation Fellow from 1934-1938, until named a George S. Cox medical research fellow at the University of Pennsylvania.

In 1941 he became an Upjohn Fellow and worked in the research division. In 1943, Dr. Ingle was named a research scientist at the Upjohn company, a post he held until 1953, when he joined the staff at the Ben May laboratory.

He is a member of the American Physiology Society, Society of Experimental Biology and Medicine, American Diabetes Association, Sigma Xi, and the Endocrine Society, of which he has served as vice president.

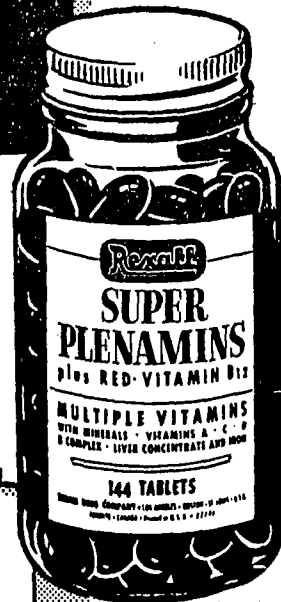
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Finds Degrees Are Aid
U. of I., Moscow — A University of Idaho sophomore is after his second degree. The first was from a barber college and is leading toward the second to be conferred by the university. Skills learned in earning the first degree are aiding Larry Cook of Melba financially toward a diploma in dairy manufacturing.
