Lewiston — Bids are to be opened July 15, on Project Nos. S-DS-4789-3. Work to consist of constructing the roadway, drainage structures, and a roadmix bituminous surface on 2.155 miles, Big Bear Ridge-Deary; reconditioning and a roadmix bituminous surface on 4.359 miles, Bear Ridge Grade, on State Highway 7, and furnishing crushed rock in stockpile, Bear Ridge-Deary, known as Idaho Federal Aid Project Nos. S-DS-4789 and Idaho Stockpile Project No. 276, in Latah County.

5-CENT MAIL PENALTY

Effective July 1, 1958, all classes of mail received at the post office, without postage or with insufficient postage, will be dispatched promptly, rating deficient postage, plus any special service postage due, plus a 5c deficiency penalty, says F. O. Stedman, local postmaster.

If the addressee refuses to pay postage plus the deficiency penalty, the mail will be returned to sender for collection of the fee (postage due plus penalty).

Patrons mailing packages and letters on the rural routes should make sure there is enough money to cover postage, plus any special service requested.

Mail having no return address (where mail is unclaimed by addressee and is sent to the dead letter office) will be returned at a fee of 10c, instead of the 5 cent fee now charged.

Mr. Stedman then added: "An increase has been allowed in weight and size of overseas mail packages to 70 lbs., and 100 inches in combined length and girth, air mail included."


