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REAL 4TH OF JULY WEATHER

It was real "Fourth of July" weather here over the long holiday week-end.

Wednesday of last week the high reading was a mere 85 degrees. On Thursday the mercury column began a steady ascent, hitting 88 degrees. Friday were recorded 90 degrees, Saturday 92 degrees, Sunday, 92 degrees and Monday a mere 85.

Monday evening about 8:00 o'clock rain began to fall, and it really rained; gutters being hard pressed to carry off the water. The downpour was accompanied by a brilliant display of lightning and some really loud thunder-claps.

The rain cleared and cooled the air and Tuesday was one of the most beautiful days anyone could wish, the thermometer hitting a high of 86 degrees.

GRASSHOPPERS GET LETHAL DOSE

STEPS TAKEN TO ELIMINATE DESTRUCTIVE INSECTS

With a thunderous roar, about 5:00 o'clock Monday morning the spraying of grasshopper poison began in this area of Latah county.

So low were the planes — one a good-sized twin-engine job; that residents rolled out of their beds to see what was going on, and the word quickly spread, "grasshopper spraying." Said one resident, "I thought at first that the hot-rodgers and bang-pipers were holding their weekly convention rather than on Saturday night, but this noise is a pretty useful one."

Wayne Davis and Norla Callison, American ridge, who are prime workers in this activity, said that 9,646 acres were under contract to the Johnson Flying Service of Missoula, Montana, to receive the "treatment." This represents \$2,684.96 collected on 71 contracts, with \$500.00 appropriated by Latah County to aid the program.

Mr. Davis said that tests made indicated that these insect pests were more than twice as thick as last year (tests being made on previously tested areas), and that something had to be done immediately. The insects now range in size from that of an ordinary house fly to about five-eighths of an inch in length. And, of course, the older they grow, the bigger, and the more they eat!

Tuesday's spraying was done in the Pottlach river drainage area near Juliaetta and Kendrick, in Latah county, and in the Cottonwood creek drainage area.

Wednesday spraying continued, starting at 4:00 o'clock in the morning in the Cottonwood creek drainage on the south side of the Clearwater river. Pilots are expected to finish spraying in Latah county today (Wednesday) and begin on the area on the west side of Pottlach river from Catholic Gulch north in Nez Perce county, Loren Kamibitch, Nez Perce county agent said.

A heavy rain fell Monday night — almost reaching cloudburst proportions, and what damage, if any, was done, the distributed spray, seems to be anybody's guess. Only time will give the answer.

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BIG HAY BARN BURNS

Mr. and Mrs. Stewart Wilson of Cedar ridge lost a barn filled with 10 tons of hay by fire, Monday night.

They were awakened by the barking of the family dog, to see the barn roof engulfed in flames. An alarm was sounded and neighbors as well as the Kendrick Forest Service Fire equipment responded, but the holocaust was too far-advanced, and the building burned to the ground.

The cause of the blaze is not known. This was the night of the big electrical storm, so it may have been lightning, or faulty wiring, but lightning is believed to have started the blaze.

This is the second time in 11 years the Wilsons have lost a barn by fire. This year they had just finished putting in the last load of hay on Monday — and that night the fire!

ANSWER THREE FIRE CALLS

The Kendrick Forestry crew have answered three fire calls so far this season, says Norman Lewis, deputy state forester.

On Wednesday, July 2, they quelled a three-acre grass blaze near Spalding, caused by a cigarette being tossed from a passing car.

On July 4th they extinguished a lightning set spot fire in white pine timber 7 miles west of Deary.

On Monday night, July 7, they answered a call for help on a burning barn on the Stewart Wilson farm on Cedar ridge. Cause of blaze unknown, but believed lightning.

POLITICAL FILINGS AT LAST MINUTE

SIXTEEN DEMOCRATS ENTER RACES SATURDAY

Sixteen Democrats filed for Latah county offices at Moscow June 28 before the office closed at 5:00 p. m. Not a single Republican filed for office the final day.

There are four Democrats filed for state representative: Melvin J. Al-sager, Moscow; George F. Brocke, Sr., Kendrick; Kenneth E. Aherin, Genesee, and Harold Blood, whose mailing address is Palouse, Wash. This makes a five-way race for two posts on the Democratic ticket for state representative. The other Democrat running is John Anton Johnson of Bovill. Two Republican incumbents, Elvon Hampton of Genesee and Harold Snow of Moscow, have also been filed for re-election.

R. C. Lange of Moscow filed for sheriff on the Democratic ticket. He will oppose Raymond Snow of Moscow in the primary. Jack McBride, whose mailing address is Palouse, has been filed on the Republican ticket.

Allen Derr of Moscow filed for probate judge on the Democratic ticket. He has no primary opposition and will face the incumbent, Judge C. L. Woodward, in the general election.

Vacancies exist on the Democratic ticket for the post of clerk of the district court, county treasurer and county coroner, and justice of the peace for precinct two.

State Sen. Harold Lough of Moscow has filed for re-election. He has no primary opposition. His Republican opponent is Floyd W. Trail of Moscow.

There is a three-way Republican race in the primary for prosecuting attorney, Leonard Bielenberg, Peter G. Leriget and Cope R. Gale, all Moscow attorneys, have filed. The Democratic candidate is William E. Swope, also a Moscow attorney.

Only two of the three county commissioner seats are open in this year's election. Democrat James O. Broyles, whose post office address is Palouse, for first district commissioner, and Gerald Ingle of Kendrick for third district, have filed without opposition. A similar situation exists on the Republican side where Dwight Strong, whose post office address is Garfield, for the first district, and Eugene Taylor of Juliaetta, for third district, are the only candidates.

Our Note: As in the past, where politics are concerned — political "news" will be at "so much per politic" — but we want to say right now that this year's election should provide Latah county with the best chance in several years to "get a sheriff." Let's consider well and pick these candidates and our final choice with care!

INSURANCE HOLDS UP FLOOD PROJECT

N. P. RAILWAY INSISTS ON HUGE POLICY

The Army Engineers' Dike for flood control along the Pottlach river at Kendrick hit another "snag" last week, says Frank Abrams, Mayor.

The latest word from the Northern Pacific Railway Co., was their demand for insurance coverage by the village. Because construction equipment would be crossing the N. P. tracks in the dike building operation, this request was made.

Inquiry was made immediately by the Village, and it was discovered that the only company that would write this policy was Loyds of London. So, Monday, after final investigations were made a policy for \$200,000.00 was taken out. This policy will cost the Village \$150.00 for 90 days.

The project is expected to take 90 days for completion after work begins.

Everything is in readiness to begin as soon as the insurance clears.

Haste, carelessness, and the occasional defective automobile cause most highway tragedies. While we are on the subject of carelessness and courtesy we feel we should mention the fact that several mothers have spoken about the way the big "pulp trucks" bowl through town, particularly past the village park where youngsters are at play or coming and going around the swimming pool.

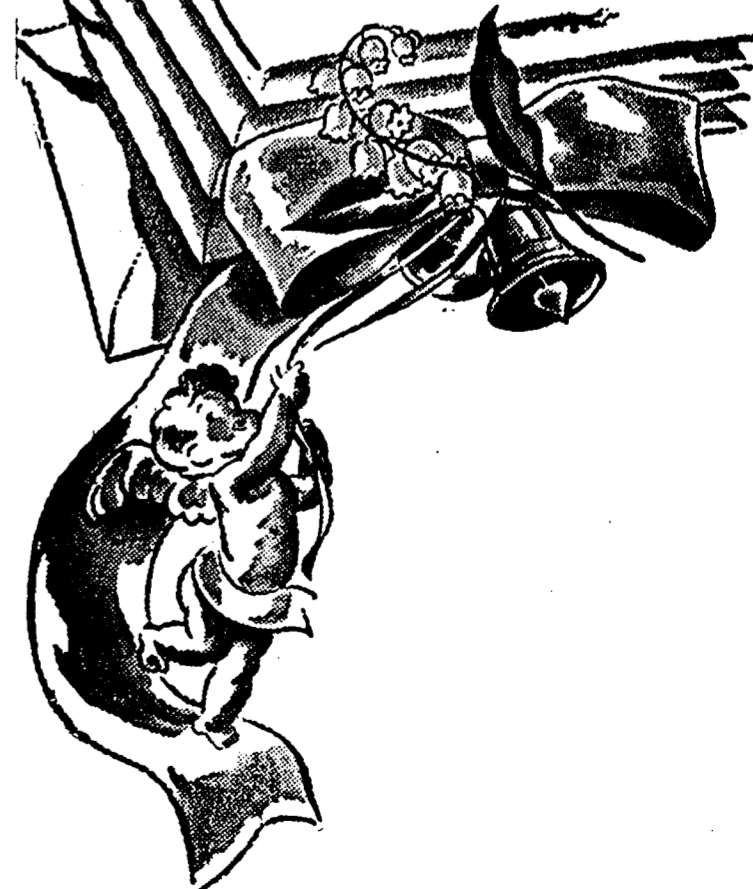

POINTERS FOR PICNICKERS



Nutritionists and outdoor chefs have some specific advice for picnic-goers:

Prepare sandwiches to suit occasions and conditions under which they will be kept and served; to keep open-face or unwrapped sandwiches moist, do not cover with a damp cloth—cover with a moisture-vapor proof material and refrigerate; carefully made sandwiches may be stored for 12 to 24 hours at temperatures under 50 degrees Fahrenheit.

Melted butter or margarine are absorbed by bread and are not recommended for spreading; before preparing sandwiches, make fillings and garnishes, refrigerating them if necessary; wrap sandwiches individually to prevent flavors or fillings from mingling.

It may sound unbelievable, but there are recipes for ghost burgers, sweetheart sandwiches, and clown, sailboat and top hat sandwiches. To make your 4th of July complete, there is the firecracker roll sandwich. The ingredients of this list—as you might imagine—are far too numerous to list.

Americans—large, medium and small—will eat one billion, five hundred million meals outdoors in 1958.

In their picnic pursuits, they will consume 10½ billion buns during the current year—and just about that many hamburgers and hot dogs.

And all this is in addition to the 40 million loaves of bread sold each day, and to the millions of pounds of pies, cakes, cookies, cereals and crackers.

These figures come from E. E. Kelley, Jr., president of the American Bakers Association, who has a firm belief that outdoor eating, whether it be strictly a family affair or one including company, helps build family and community relations.

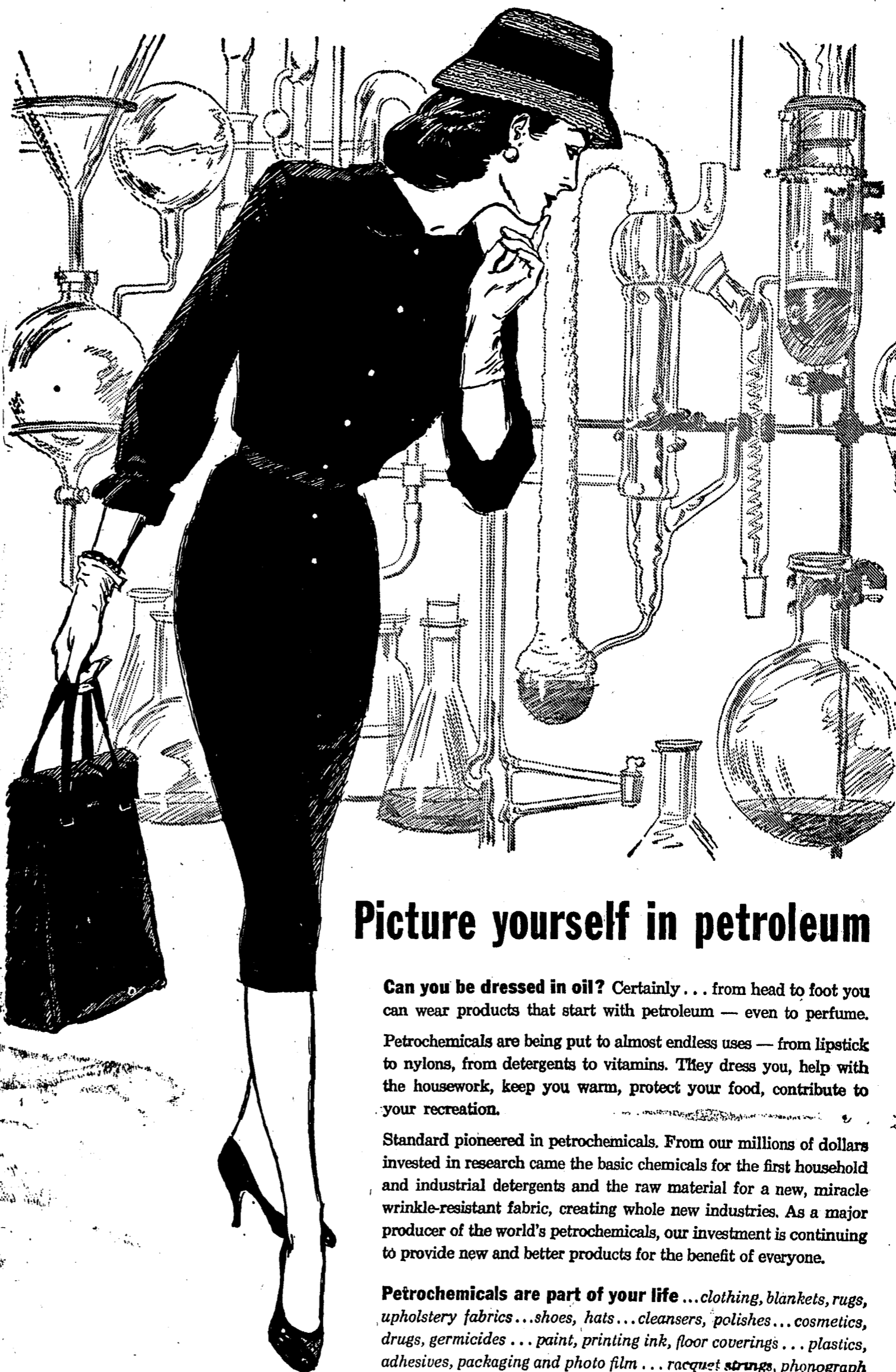

Recipe of the Month

PRIZE-WINNING CHERRY PIE



NANCY HAVEN

This is the recipe that won for CAROL MICHIE of Fort Collins, Colorado, the Western Regional Championship of the 1957 National Cherry Pie Baking Contest. More than 150,000 contestants ranging in age from 14 to 20 compete in local, county and state contests leading up to this event sponsored by the National Red Cherry Institute.

This award for her delicious cherry pie is one of several Carol, a busy and versatile participant in many young people's activities, has won. Carol was 4-H State Canning Winner in 1954 and was awarded a trip to 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. She has also received the Farm Bureau Good Citizens Award.



CRUST:

- 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ cup lard
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 5 to 6 tablespoons cold milk
- 1 tablespoon soft butter

• Add salt to flour and sift into mixing bowl. Cut one-half the lard and the two tablespoons butter into flour until it has appearance of fine meal. Cut in remaining lard until size of large peas.

• Mix in one-half the milk; add remaining milk and press dough together. Divide the dough into two parts, one slightly larger for the bottom crust. Roll larger portion on lightly floured pastry cloth until ¼ inch thick; place in 9-inch pie pan. Trim edges. Brush lower crust with the tablespoon of soft butter.

• Roll remaining dough for top crust. Cut into one-half inch strips for a lattice top.

FILLING:

- 2 (#2) cans (4 cups) frozen cherries*, partially thawed and drained
- ¾ cup cherry juice
- ¾ cup Beet Sugar*
- 3 tablespoons cornstarch
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ⅓ teaspoon red food coloring, if desired
- 1 tablespoon butter
- ⅓ teaspoon almond extract

• Combine Beet Sugar, cornstarch and salt in saucepan; blend in cherry juice. Fold in cherries. Cook over low heat until juice is thickened and clear. Remove from heat, add red coloring, butter and almond extract. Cool.

• Pour cooled mixture into pastry-lined pan, top with pastry. Trim; flute edges. Bake at 425°F. for 20 minutes, reduce heat to 350°F. and bake for 15-20 minutes more or until golden brown.

* If canned red sour cherries are used, increase sugar to 1½ cups.

She brought word her mother, Mrs. Hannah Lewis, also of Vancouver, had undergone surgery this spring, and was now beginning to feel quite well again.

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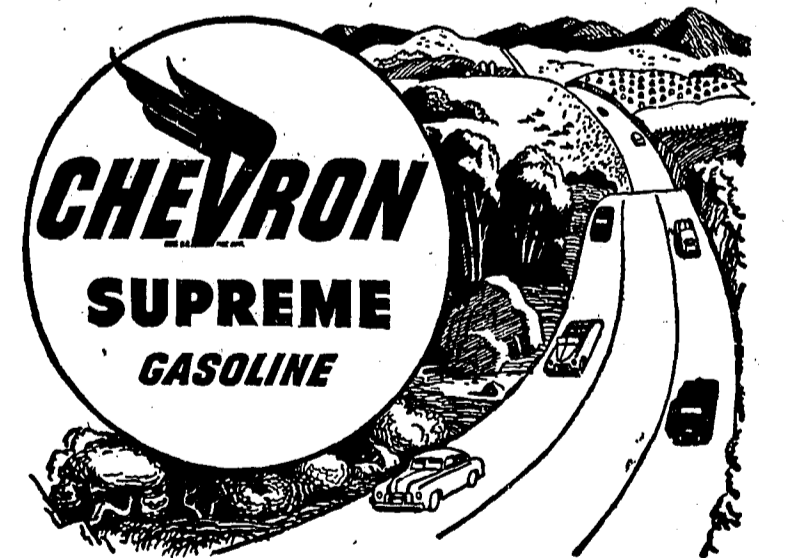
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
