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## Life Insurance **Investments Upped During Past Year**

North Central States showed the largest regional dollar gain in life insurance investments in the most recent analysis released today by the Life Insurance Association of

The analysis, covering investments by geographic region at the start of last year for companies representing 86 per cent of total. life insurance funds, showed a one year rise in these five states of \$834,805,000. This brought total life insurance investments in these states of the companies surveyed to \$14,995,773,000, nearly double the investment at the end of World War II.

The three Pacific States accounted for the second largest gain, the year's increase of \$763,-091,000 bringing total investments in the region to \$9,312,868,000, about three times the 1945 figure.

In the four West South Central States, the year's increase was \$620.117,000 and the new aggregate \$8,797,723,000, up about 180 per cent from 1945.

In the three Middle Atlantic States, which lead the United States regionally in total life insurance ownership, the year's increase in life insurance investments was \$383,985,000, bringing aggregate investments of the life companies to \$14,218,915,000 or about 50 per cent over the 1945


