## RECORD GROUP OF SWIMMERS TAKE FREE RED CROSS INSTRUCTIONS

### NUMBER PROVES REAL SURPRISE TO ALL CONCERNED

Red Cross approved free swimming lessons began Tuesday morning, July 15, at 9:00 o'clock in the Area Living War Memorial Swimming Pool at Kendrick, with a total of 149 registered in the various categories.

Classes for Beginners, Intermediates, Swimmer and Adult Beginners are being offered, says Gerald White, lifeguard and instructor.

Mr. White will be assisted by Mrs. Wm. Johnson and Wanda Peters in teaching the different classes, which will go straight through Tuesday and Saturday for a two-week period — except for the Adult Beginners, which will be held in the evening, beginning Thursday, July 17, at 8:00 o'clock and continuing Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings for a two-week course. Mr. White will teach this group. Registration for this class is open until Thursday.

The different swimming classes are being divided into three separate phases, according to the student's ability, with a separate teacher for each phase. In this plan each child will have better supervision and individual attention from the teacher. The timid child will not hold back the aggressive one — each will progress faster being in a group on his or her own level.

Much of Tuesday morning was

spent in orientation and placing the children in their proper category. Mr. White held orientation classes in the park and Mrs. Johnson and Miss Peters helped the children through tests that automatically placed them in their proper phase.

Classes begin at 9:00 a. m., and run through the following schedule: Beginners at 9:00 a. m. till 9:40. Intermediates at 10:00 a. m. till 10:40. Swimmers, 11:00 a. m. till 11:40.

## NO GAMBLERS NEEDED IN IDAHO

### LET'S KEEP IDAHO A CLEAN STATE — FOR IDAHOANS

Not many Idahoans, we're convinced, want the gangsters from New York, New Orleans and Havana to move into Idaho to make themselves richer at the expense of the suckers, either native born or the gullible who might be attracted to our state for a good time (if being shorn like the sheep is anyone's idea of a good time).

We had our taste of legalized gambling a few years ago. It was supposed to help the tourist business. Perhaps it did bring a few folks into Sun Valley and a few from across the line next to Utah, but we doubt it increased Idaho's wealth.

One of the Democratic candidates for governor said at Boise over the week-end one of his campaign weapons would be to urge the legislature to pass laws instituting casino-type open gambling in Idaho as a tourist lure. He was promptly joined by a few legislative candidates. We don't think the philosophy espoused will lure any great following.

Nor do we think that if the legislature would be so foolish as to pass legislation "legalizing" casino-type (where all forms of gambling go the limit) that it would be legal. The Idaho supreme court in 1953, gave, we think, the final answer on that one when it ruled slot machines were not games of skill but were pure and simple gambling devices and as such prohibited by the state's constitution. The Washington supreme court arrived at the same conclusion at about the same time.

If it is to be legalized gambling in Idaho it will come only when the people say so by a two-thirds majority, voting a constitutional change. And we can't ever imagine that ever happening in Idaho. They won't want the foreign-born gangsters who have taken over Las Vegas gambling casinos to branch out over the state line into Idaho. The McClellan Senate rackets investigating committee shortly is going to expose some of these "gentlemen" whom the Senator recently said comprise a "close knit" clandestine criminal syndicate that has become a serious menace to the nation's economic destiny.

Let Nevada and Cuba have them — Idaho doesn't need them. — The Daily Idahoian, Moscow.



## Life Insurance Investments Upped During Past Year

NEW YORK — The five East North Central States showed the largest regional dollar gain in life insurance investments in the most recent analysis released today by the Life Insurance Association of America.

The analysis, covering investments by geographic region at the start of last year for companies representing 86 per cent of total life insurance funds, showed a one year rise in these five states of \$834,805,000. This brought total life insurance investments in these states of the companies surveyed to \$14,995,773,000, nearly double the investment at the end of World War II.

The three Pacific States accounted for the second largest gain, the year's increase of \$763,091,000 bringing total investments in the region to \$9,312,869,000, about three times the 1945 figure.

In the four West South Central States, the year's increase was \$620,117,000 and the new aggregate \$8,797,723,000, up about 180 per cent from 1945.

In the three Middle Atlantic States, which lead the United States regionally in total life insurance ownership, the year's increase in life insurance investments was \$383,985,000, bringing aggregate investments of the life companies to \$14,218,915,000 or about 50 per cent over the 1945 figure.

## Alfalfa Club Is Just For Fun Group

WASHINGTON—Ever since the days when Washington notables wore boards and sidebeards, they've gathered once a year to let down their hair.

Medium for the high jinks is the Alfalfa Club, with a membership limited to 150 of the nation's top diplomatic, executive, congressional, judicial, military, business, and professional men. They uphold tradition with an annual banquet, and with less formal get-togethers throughout the year.

The President, Vice President, and a quorum of the Cabinet are among Alfalfa's members. A World War II hero named Dwight D. Eisenhower was admitted to membership 12 years ago, long before destiny led him to the White House.

Despite its "Who's Who" composition, the club has no purpose beyond convivial fun. In a city where politics is a pervading, tensely serious business 364 days a year, the annual dinners give members an opportunity to forget political lines and lightly jibe at each other.

Climax of each Alfalfa banquet is a mock political convention. Members choose their own candidates for President of the United States. Needless to say, no candidate of the Alfalfa Party has ever garnered a single electoral vote—though many members have reached high office by both the Democratic and Republican routes.

## Egypt's Sphinx Gets Beauty Treatment

WASHINGTON — There's nothing inscrutable about the Sphinx's present smile. The 4,500-year-old lady is getting a facial.

The Egyptian Department of Antiquities recently began cleaning and restoring the magnificent monument—an object of speculation, admiration, and mutilation since prehistoric times.

This is not the first time that the mysterious guardian of the pyramids has needed urgent care. King Thutmose IV ordered repairs some 3,500 years ago. It has received beauty treatments several times in the 19th and 20th centuries.

By and large, however, the colossus with a human head and lion's body has admirably weathered the erosion of old age and sand.

## Insecurity Is Often Cause of Insomnia



## SWIMMING IS A NECESSITY TODAY

### USE WATER "COMMON SENSE" AND STAY ALIVE

Boise — Thirty-one Idahoans lost their lives during 1957 because of drowning, according to the Idaho Department of Health's vital statistics bureau. Of these deaths, 14 were classed as "public accidents," which would include drownings in lakes, rivers and the like, while 17 were "home drownings," which may also include drownings in small farm ponds or similar waters.

Probably all of these deaths could have been prevented by a little more common sense and safety precautions. Summer is naturally the peak season for drownings, since it is during the summer months that people relax and play in and around the water. It is well for everyone to learn to respect the potential danger of any body of water.

According to the National Safety Council, the major causes of drowning are: Careless handling of small boats, failure to wear life jackets, children playing alone in water, and carelessness or "showing off" while

swimming. Elimination of these causes will go far in helping reduce the needless loss of life due to drowning.

These few tips may help save your life, or the life of a family member, if you heed them. Always have someone in attendance when children are playing in water, even if it's a backyard pool. At public beaches be sure there are qualified lifeguards on duty. Find out your physical capabilities for swimming, and don't over tax them. Do not swim alone, or when tired, over-heated or chilly, and wait about an hour after eating before you enter the water. Always know the depth and condition of the bottom before diving into strange water, and try not to be a "show off" when swimming or boating.

Try not to "lose your head" in the event of trouble in the water, as panic can always get you into real trouble. Always wear an adequate life jacket when out in a small boat, and remember that the only time you stand up in a boat is when entering or leaving it.

Learn how to administer artificial respiration, you can never tell when you'll be called upon to save a life.

## BACK THE ATTACK ON TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS

Boise — Strict obedience to all traffic laws is the most effective way to avoid accidents — as most accidents are caused by traffic law violators!

Take the speeder for instance. A large percentage of the people killed in highway crashes annually die because they were driving faster than the posted speed limits. This is very definitely a defiance of a traffic law. Driving within the proper speed limit could have saved many lives.

Another cause for much trouble on the highway is the motorist who passes on hills, curves and other places where the road ahead cannot be seen clearly, if at all. In Idaho all black-top highways are marked indicating areas where passing is unsafe. White line in your lane means that it is dangerous to pass. These markings were put there by competent people for your protection. To pass when the white line is in your lane is defined by Idaho law as "Reckless Driving." Don't endanger your and other people's lives by foolish disobedience of these and other traffic laws.

We are very fortunate in Idaho to have a fine system of warning signs posted along the highways at appropriate locations. These are signs warning us of unusual road conditions ahead, railroad crossings, stop signs,

narrow road, rolling rocks, and a number of others familiar to all motorists. These signs are part of the network of traffic aids and were meant to guide us safely along the highway. Too many people who disobey traffic laws and disregard traffic signs have found out the hard way that these laws and signs are for their protection and safety. You can help back the attack on traffic accidents by driving with care and caution and by paying attention to all traffic laws and traffic signs.





**SCHOLARSHIPS; TRIPS**

Chicago — If the 4-H Club girls have anything to say about it, the family dinner table will groan under the weight of all the delicious meals heaped upon it.

The girls are participating in three major 4-H Food projects this year which will help them to learn the basic as well as finer points of serving home cooked meals. These projects are Girls' Home Economics, Canning, and Food Preparation.

Under the guidance of their local volunteer 4-H leaders and the county extension agents, the young homemakers learn to select, preserve, prepare and demonstrate a variety of good things to eat. Not only will the girls stretch the food budget, but they will also step up the nutritive value of about 1,100 meals served in each of their homes this year.

And it isn't all hard work. Exhibits at Fair time and 4-H events bring recognition to the club members. Each of the 4-H projects is supported by donors who provide incentive awards. Awards are the same in all three programs. Six national winners in each category will receive \$400.00 scholarships to the college of their choice and an all-expense paid trip to the 1958 National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov. 30 to Dec. 4. The state winner will be a delegate to the Congress through funds provided by the donor.

A maximum of four county winners in each project can earn handsome gold-filled medals.

The 4-H award programs are arranged by the National Committee on Boys' and Girls' Club Work, Chicago, and are conducted by the Cooperative Extension service.

Additional information regarding these projects may be obtained from local 4-H Club leaders or the County Extension office.

**DARN OLD MONSTER**

We'll never forget the first time we saw a Linotype. It was the most complicated machine we had ever seen. And we believed the printer when he told us that the darn thing could make coffee in addition to lines of type.

Adapting the language to Linotype was a lengthy and complicated task taking long years of work on the part of an Ethiopian printer and typographic experts. The list of characters required to print the modern Ethiopian language comprises 231 letters, or more precisely "syllables." And yet all the technical and mechanical difficulties have been overcome. The first work to be composed in Linotype Amharic was part of the Gospel according to St. John.

An old book, set by a modern method, to restate some truths that are always timely.

Now with faster, more economical means of composition available on the Linotype, the spread of cultural and technical enlightenment in Ethiopia will be greatly advanced and a lot of the tribute goes to the darn old monster you see in every country newspaper shop, the machine that looks so complicated to the newcomer to this business — the Linotype. — Christian Science Monitor.
