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## KENDRICK, JULIAETTA AREA HIT BY RAIN, HIGH WIND, THURSDAY EVE

### KENDRICK TOOK BRUNT OF WORST STORM IN MEMORY OF OLD-TIMERS

Heralded by sporadic gusts of wind, a light rain and a peculiar orange-yellow glow in the western sky, the worst storm ever to hit Kendrick in the memory of old-timers, began about 6:20 Thursday evening, following a day of oppressive 98 degree heat.

About 40 minutes later, or 7:00 o'clock the wind and rain storm hit in its full fury, carrying with it dust that, mixed with rain, left windows, porches and everything it touched coated either with dust or mud.

The wind from the north and east tore huge branches from trees, ripped some trees out by the roots, carried off the metal roof from the Blewett Building, tore part of the roof from the Nelson Fuel Co. shed and did thousands of dollars in damage.

A huge locust tree at the junction of Main Street and the school house hill (probably more aptly described as the old Martin Thomas place) was torn out by the roots, and fell across one of the main power supplies. This threw the automatic switches and plunged the town into darkness.

As the wind rose in slashing force it toppled more trees, a huge old locust landing squarely on top of the Kendrick pump house. Luckily this building was of unusually strong construction, and only minor damage resulted.

Across the street the copper roof was ripped from the Blewett Building, and as the wind tore the roof away it took with it the tops of the chimneys, scattering brick around the edges of the building. The roof, all but intact, landed in the alley at the rear. The Blewett's were in Gifford at the time.

The aluminum roof torn from the Nelson Fuel shed landed here, there and everywhere.

In the city park no trees were blown down, but huge limbs were torn off, the whole park littered with leaves and waste cans upset.

Further west a giant black walnut tree blew down against the home of Mrs. Grace Souders, inflicting considerable damage, but not crushing the house. It was so close to the home that it was unable to gather much fall momentum.

The home of Mrs. W. A. Perryman in the west part of town also lost a portion of its roof, the shingles literally disappearing into the night.

On down a couple more big locust trees were toppled, one in front of the Wayne Kuykendall home, the other in front of the James Candler home.

A 20-foot fir tree in the Stitzlein front yard was blown over to about a 45 degree angle, but not completely toppled. It has since been pulled back into its "socket," apparently none the worse for wear.

Even when the storm was still raging, residents began the work of cleaning up and repairing the damage. The brupp-brupp-brupp of chain saws could be heard as the fallen trees and limbs were cut to clear obstacles, and then Loyd Ware hooked onto them with his logging truck and dragged them away so that streets might be passable.

At 11:45 power line obstacles had been cleared and lights restored all about town, the W. W. P. Co., and volunteer helpers doing a tremendous job in short order.

The Potlatch Telephone Co., of course, also faced a monumental task in restoring all downed lines — not to mention the Brocke & Sons TV cable service.

At Juliaetta, the storm was not nearly so severe. Only one large tree fell on Main Street, near the Grose-close home, and it did no damage. At the Asa Cook home on the outskirts of town, a huge fir tree was toppled. It sliced through one corner of the back porch as it fell. Luckily the porch was vacant at the time.

#### CROP DAMAGE

The damage to crops was more severe in some areas than others. Barley fields were reported flattened, corn was blown over so that it was laying flat, with roots exposed, its "tresses" ripped to shreds.

Roy Glenn reported three fires started by lightning in pasture grass on their ranch on Texas ridge. He said they fought one out, and the other two were doused by the torrents of rain that fell.

#### STORM SIDELIGHTS

When it comes to co-operation, we believe Kendrick residents can stand with the best of them.

The chain saws used in the emergency were privately owned — but used in public service, volunteers literally swarming over each obstacle and helping in every way possible.

Probably the best example was the Blewett Building. When it was discovered that the roof was torn off and heavy damage could result from the driving rain, as if by magic, some 20 men equipped with hammers and flashlights swarmed to the job. A roll of roofing would be started at the upper edge, and it was all nailed in place by the time it had been unrolled!

To try to name the volunteers who helped during the night and those who assisted in the Friday morning clean-up would be an impossibility—

so we won't even try. But we can say that even some farm trucks appeared Friday morning and helped in the hauling of debris!

To everyone who helped in any way property owners, utility owners, the village of Kendrick and all concerned say "Thank You!"

## LOY C. MARTIN, PIONEER, DIES

### SOUTHWICK RESIDENT FOR 43 YEARS, PASSES AT 71

Loy Car Martin, a retired farmer, died of a heart ailment at his home near Southwick at 7:30 a. m. Wednesday, July 16. He was 71 years of age.

Mr. Martin had been a resident of the Southwick-Golden Rule area for 43 years. He had been ill for the past six months.

Loy Car Martin was born March 29, 1867, in Barton County, Kansas, moving to Oklahoma in 1890, to Yakima in 1906 and to Southwick in 1915.

He was united in marriage to Marjorie Cannon, at Lewiston, in 1933. She died in 1935.

Survivors include a brother, Roy B. Martin, Southwick, and three sisters, Mrs. Floy Nead, Mollala, Ore.; Mrs. Ben A. Reed, Springfield, Ore.; and Mrs. Holly Nicola, Butterfield, Mo.

Funeral services were held at the Southwick Community Church, Saturday at 10:00 a. m., with the Rev. O. A. Wells, pastor, officiating. Organist was Mrs. Ervin Fry, with Rev. Dwight Hall of Lewiston singing.

#### PUMP BREAKDOWN

Last week's water emergency was created, says Frank Abrams, mayor, when the main city water pump had pumped the well dry Tuesday, and sucked so much air into the pump that it caused an air-lock. It took considerable time to locate the cause of the trouble, and then to replace the burned out bearings and packings in the pump itself.

When the reservoir indicator showed "empty" last Wednesday morning, it was first thought the pump was down with a broken main shaft — but the "crux" of the trouble proved to be a shortage of water. Pump experts from Spokane made the repairs. The pump was set back from a draw of about 80 gallons a minute to 65 gallons a minute — and the reservoir seemed well on its way to filling up when the storm of Thursday night cut off the power for some five hours. It was full, however, by Friday at noon.

## WATER RATIONING!

With the dawn of Tuesday morning, and the reservoir level indicator reading only about three-quarters full, it became apparent to all that Kendrick was again faced with a water shortage problem. Tuesday evening the village trustees met in extra session to formulate a rationing program, and in order to be fair to all water users, it proved to be a pretty knotty one. However, here is their solution:

The north side of Main Street and west side of the school house hill — proceeding on across the Bear Creek bridge — may water on "odd" days, such as 1 - 3 - 5, etc.

The south side of Main Street and east side of the school house hill, may water on "even" days, such as 2 - 4 - 6, etc.

There are no given hours, user may water at any time desired. Penalty for a violation will be the immediate shutting off of users water supply, and a charge of \$10.00 will then be made to resume service.

The above regulations apply only to sprinkling, irrigation and like use. They go into effect Thursday, July 24.

The Village Trustees are counting on and will appreciate the cooperation of all water users. In case above regulations fail to maintain a safe water level in the reservoir, more stringent ones will have to be put into effect.

Frank Abrams, mayor, said that the master water meter showed a well pumpage of 1,000,000 gallons for the first 15 days of July — and that the village well just couldn't produce to that extent. In fact, the pump had had to be cut back to some 40 gallons per minute!

Water users, therefore, are now being rationed!

## NEW SCHOOL NOW SEEMS POSSIBLE

### LATEST FIGURES FAR BELOW PREVIOUS ESTIMATE

The P.-T. A. Fact Finding Committee and the School Board have not been idle the past months. Following the recommendations of the Committee the School Board engaged the service of another architect — Dropping, Kelly & Finch of Boise, this firm was asked to submit sketches for a new Junior and Senior High School Building. They submitted a proposed plan at the regular meeting of the School Board July 14, Saturday evening, July 19, the School Board met with the Fact Find Committee for their reactions to the sketches. The Committee was very favorably impressed with the plans and suggested that the question be put to the voters of the District at the earliest possible date. Because of statutory requirements involved it will take at least until the latter part of September to clear the necessary hurdles involved, before an election can be held.

The Fact Finding Committee agreed and recommended that the Bear Creek site be adopted as the site for a new Junior and Senior High School building. They further recommended that the Wm. Fry property in that area be purchased for school use.

The School Board, in a special meeting Monday evening agreed to purchase the Wm. Fry property. The property must now be surveyed by a licensed engineer, and a Title Search made to be conducted. The Board made arrangements to have both done.

So, it looks like a new Junior and Senior High School plant is possible. The architect will supply the district with several copies of the sketches of the proposed building, and these will be posted throughout the District at an early date.

A description of the proposed new school will appear in the next Gazette.

#### ABOUT "JUSTICE COURT"

Some two years ago, at the request of the Idaho State Police, and the Idaho State Fish and Game Department, we began the publication of records of Justice Court in our columns — but only of the records never of charges, etc., until a matter of court record. This action was requested in hopes it would prove a deterrent to law violation.

Some may have wondered about the names of minors appearing in these records, questioning the propriety of this action.

Our prosecuting attorney Lloyd G. Martinson says that in traffic cases there is no such thing as a "minor," all vehicle drivers being treated equally in traffic cases. Fish and game violations by a minor are handled by Probate Court.

In juvenile court names may also be published unless the judge orders a "package" (case) sealed, in which case nothing may be said. We do not deal with juvenile court.

Names of minors in "Probation" cases have been published from our local Justice Court — so that no one may say we "played favorites."

Thursday, just about 12:30 p. m. the fire siren sounded, warning of a fire at the John Deobald home on the Schoolhouse Hill. In a very short time the local fire truck was on the scene and had the grass and brush fire out.

### HARVEST ROLLING

Mr. Watts says the wheat is pretty dry, and the test weight down somewhat from last year, due to the recent heat wave.

Both men say: "Please wait until your grain is ready. Be sure it's ripe and dry before starting operations."

**CLAY TEST SHAFTS**  
Hard-rock miners from Butte, Mont. started working in Latah county last week to obtain volume samples of clays underlying the area. Nine miners began sinking the first of several shafts into land under option to the Anaconda company. The Montana company has acquired options on some 3,000 acres of land in the county, contemplating conversion of clays into aluminum trioxide, from which metallic aluminum is smelted.  
The men are sinking a shaft on the N. T. Carson farm, two miles north of Moscow. Last summer numerous shafts were sunk on property west of Deary. These went to depths up to 80 feet. The shaft on the Carson property will reach the 130-foot depth.  
Samples are being removed every few feet and shipped to Anaconda for testing.

**WEED CONTROL PROGRAM**  
The Latah county weed program is progressing in fine shape with increased interest in noxious weed control. The farmers of Latah County can be congratulated for this extra effort in controlling noxious weeds, said John Gaiser, Latah county weed supervisor. There has been some delay in a few areas in weed spraying due to the rains, but Gaiser reports that these weeds should be taken care of in the next few days. If we are to make the best of this million dollar program everyone must at least keep noxious weeds from seeding.  
Weed control work on roadways is in the clean-up stages, with all reported patches being sprayed once. The county weed crews are going back over known infested areas attempting to get 100 percent coverage of noxious weeds on the roadsides.
