WORK PROGRESSING

Work on the Bear ridge link of the Kendrick-Deary Highway is making steady progress, although to outward appearances it may seem slow.

Murphy Brothers, sub-Contractors under Carbon Brothers, have been experiencing difficulty in getting the proper degree of compactness in the roadbed, and some six or seven water tank trucks are now in use. The water is being hauled from Potlatch river.

The preliminary grading on the Kendrick end would indicate a really fine roadway.

Another crew is busy with drills preparing to remove a rocky point from the grade itself, to straighten and widen one narrow and crooked section.

We have no information on when or where the crusher or crushers will be set up for the rock surfacing. Nor do we have any positive information on whether or not the grade itself will be oiled this fall.

CARL KOEPP, PIONEER, DIES SAT.

Carl August Wilhelm Koepf, 82-year-old retired farmer, and a pioneer of the Cameron area, died at his home in Juliaetta at 3:10 p. m. Saturday, August 30, following an illness of six weeks. Cause of death was listed as cancer.

Mr. Koepf was born May 4, 1876, at Pomeran, Germany. He moved with his family to Arlington, Minn., at age of nine, and then moved to Cameron in 1901, farming there until 1950. He spent a year at Kendrick before moving to Juliaetta in 1951.

He was married to Minnie Brammer Wendt at Cameron, Jan. 30, 1907, and is survived by her. Other survivors include one son, Walter Koepf of Cameron; one stepson, Henry Wendt of Southwick; three sisters, Mrs. Emelia Zilkeback of Birmingham, Alabama, and Mrs. Ernestine Riggers of Nespeere, and one in Tacoma. Eight grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren also survive.

Mr. Koepf had seen the Cameron area change from a pioneer section of dirt roads, farm work done by horses and the kerosene light era, to the present of good roads, tractors and modern and beautiful homes. He loved the farm and loved to talk farming with friends and neighbors. He was always willing to lend a helping hand.

Funeral services were held at 11:00 a. m. Tuesday at the Emmanuel Lutheran Church at Cameron, with the Rev. Theo Meske, pastor, officiating. Mrs. Jack Lohman sang "In The Garden" and "Asleep In Jesus," accompanied at the organ by Mrs. H. C. Schupfer.

Active pallbearers were all grandsons of the deceased: Harold Siflow, Herbert Schwarz, Ernie Heimgartner, Kenneth Wilken, Frank Harbert and Walter R. Koepf. Honorary pallbearers were Herman Siflow, Herman Meyer, Ira Havens, August F. Wegner, George Wilkin and Wilbur Brunstiek. Interment was in Normal Hill Cemetery at Lewiston.

The family has suggested that remembrances be given to the church memorial fund or to the cancer fund.

LINE BEING TESTED

Tuesday morning at 11:00 the power at Kendrick was turned off so that workmen for the W. W. P. Co. might energize the new 110,000-volt line running from the Juliaetta sub-station to the Deary sub-station.

The line constructed of 2/0 aluminum wire with a steel core is 21 miles in length. The longest single span is the jump across Bear creek just above Kendrick, and is 2,300 feet. There are several spans of approximately 800 feet.

Construction of the new line was completed last week by the Geo. Chicha Construction Co., Spokane, and the energizing Tuesday was in the nature of a full-scale test for any flaws.

HARVEST AT END

Harvesting operations in this area are rapidly nearing an end, although there still remains some beans and clover, with odd-lots here and there of late grains.

On the whole, yields may be classified as "good" to "excellent."

Some fields, hit by stem and leaf rust, were hardly worth the cutting, the kernels being shriveled and very light in weight.

Bean and clover yields also varied greatly, depending on the time of seeding, soil conditions, etc.

The grasshopper spraying this spring apparently proved very effective, with little or no damage being reported from these pests.

SEAL COATING ENDS

Monday of last week a state highway department oiling crew arrived in Kendrick. They began seal coating the newly laid and repaired oil mat which runs from the "Y" east of Kendrick to Arrow Junction. On Monday evening the seal coating was complete to the Horton Thompson place between Kendrick and Juliaetta — and there it ended — Tuesday the crews had disappeared.

At the time of their arrival here we were given to understand that the road was to be seal coated from the "Y" to the beginning of the four-lane highway near Lewiston.

Why the crews were suddenly pulled from this job and left "hanging in mid-air" as the case may be, we do not know. Perhaps they may yet show up and complete the job.

We must say that the road is now in the best shape that it has been in for several years, and this is duly appreciated by those who travel it. However, all would like to see it finished!

The summer months provide an excellent opportunity to check the condition of the "crowns" on your buildings—the roofs of the house, garage, and, for farmers, the barn, toolshed, and other structures.

Here are some general suggestions and things that can be done for specific kinds of roofs:

Sweep the roof valleys clean of leaves, twigs, and other debris. Check these valleys for any signs of rust or holes. A thin coat of roofing cement usually takes care of these troubles.



Roofing cement can be used for temporary gutter repair.

If there are leaks between the valley flashings and the roofing, close them with a coating of roofing cement daubed on the flashing and under the shingles. Remove excess cement to keep it from forming a dam that will drive water under the shingles.

On wood shingled roofs, loose shingles should be nailed tight with galvanized shingle nails. Replace rusted nails with non-corrosive nails. Dab all the nail heads with roofing cement.

Leaks in wood shingled roofs can be fixed by slipping a piece of copper flashing all the way around under the shingle.

Gutters should be hosed out occasionally to wash away sooty deposits that, when dampened, corrode the metal. Gutter leaks can be temporarily patched with roofing cement and heavy roofing paper.



A lot of those wide open spaces around the house, garage, barn and utility buildings often become muddy after a heavy rain.

Rather than dump sawdust or gravel to make it easier to walk in these mud areas, why not make flagstone walks? They can be poured quickly in a concrete flagstone mold easily made in your workshop. The same mold can be used for making a patio for your home, too. Such walks and patios add beauty and utility value to your home.



Flagstone mold is easily made in home or farm workshop.

The frame of the mold can be built to any desired size. A popular dimension makes 10-inch square flagstones and consists of four pieces of stock each 10 inches long, 1 3/4 inches wide and 1 1/2 inches thick, mitered at the corners.

The four pieces should be sawed to shape with a portable electric saw or jig saw which easily makes the corner mitering angle. One corner should be joined with corrugated nails, the opposite corner with a 1/4 by 3-inch machine screw (cut off the head and fasten the screw with a wing nut). The other two corners should be fastened with 1-inch strap hinges.

The mold can be opened away from the poured flagstone within 15 minutes after pouring if you use a dry concrete mixture. Careful oiling of the mold is an additional safeguard to keep the concrete from sticking. You may want to make several molds, possibly in varying sizes, depending upon the length and design of the walk or patio.
