ESTIMATED 1200 ATTEND THE ANNUAL SALES DAY ACTIVITIES IN KENDRICK

SUNNY SKIES CONTRIBUTE TO DAY'S SUCCESS

Nobody will ever know whether it is the lure of the auction sale, the desire for entertainment or just the time-honored habit of visiting with old friends and neighbors that attracts area residents to the annual Sales Day. But be the cause what it may, a crowd estimated at 1,200 (judging from a car count) swarmed the streets of Kendrick last Saturday.

The day, of course, began with the annual auction sale, with Auctioneer Roy Glenn "in the saddle." The crowd was good and bidding brisk. This activity occupied the time of the elders, while the "younger set" busied themselves with concessions and games — both in preparation and participation.

From 12:00 to 1:00 the food concessions, operated by the Kendrick High school senior class, the Kendrick Good Doers 4-H Club and the Assembly of God — not to mention the restaurants and cafes, did a thriving business satisfying the hunger of the visitors.

Other concessions were: The Kendrick W. S. C. S. held a rummage sale; the High school Pep Club sold cakes and pies; the freshman class and the American Ridge Hi-Hope Club sold candies; the junior class conducted a bingo stand; the sophomores a ball throwing stand — not to mention a miniature train, powered by a gasoline motor, which "clack-it-clacked" around an oval track in the park, taking the little tots for rides. The Senior class ran a car washing concession at the Union Service Station, to add to their class income.

Promptly at 1:00 the Pet Parade began, led by the K. H. S. band and followed by the Kendrick Fire Department's big truck, which was polished until you "could use it for a mirror." The parade concluded at the Kendrick park, where awards were made as follows: Becky Racicot, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Racicot, daughter of Juliaetta, attired as Daniel Boone, and complete with conkin cap and musket, won the prize for the most original costume. The largest Pet award went to Larry Helton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ward Helton, Kendrick — a horse.

The Oddest Pet division went to Ricky and Evelyn Arnett of Cedar ridge — a magpie. The Smallest Pet was awarded Bruce Davis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Davis, American ridge — a white rat. Bradley Thornton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Thornton of Leland won the prize for the best decorated bicycle.

The winners received \$2.00 gift certificates — and all taking part received treats of candy. There were 30 youngsters in the parade.

In its march down the street the pet of one youngster — a big yellow cat — decided it had had "enough of this monkey business" and to the accompaniment of terrific yowls and the barking of dogs and cackling of chickens, squeezed through the bars on its cage. It set off down the street "in high gear" with its tail straight in the air and resembling a huge bottle brush. Seeing a dog, it "slammed on its brakes, reversed course and peeling rubber all the way" shot into the vacant lot adjoining the Gazette office. It was later retrieved by its little owner.

At the conclusion of the Pet Parade and Band Concert in the park all went to Armitage Field, where the Kendrick Tigers tangled with the Genesee Bulldogs and downed them by a score of 53 to 28.

In various awards made about town Mrs. Gail Clark of Juliaetta won the Hamper, Thermos and Sleeping Bag given by the Kendrick Canyon Klub. In the Band Mothers group the steam iron was won by Bob Watts; the Lift Cake pan by Ross Armitage; the big Tiger by Rayner Havens and

the little Tiger by Frances Rowden. In the Bean Guess the big teddy bear was won by Don Lombardi of Lewiston, who guessed 4,600 beans. (There were 4666 in the jar). Bill Blewett sold the most tickets.

Mrs. Wayne Davis was awarded the chest filled with linens which was given by the Hopeful Club.

All clubs, groups and organizations operating concessions reported people were most generous, and all extend their thanks.

One item that attracted a great deal of interest was a closed circuit television display at the Variety & Gift Store. The circuit was set by Mr. Choate and the representative of the Eastman Kodak Co. It gave you a picture of your friends as they walked the street, or even of yourself — if you cared to stand still and watch the TV set.

Without exception the Kendrick merchants reported an excellent trade day. Said one: "My feet were almost killing me before I could close the door in the evening — but trade was very good — so why should I kick?" And so it went. Stores said that their specials proved very popular, and in some instances were completely sold out.

All-in-all it was a day to be remembered. The K. H. S. Band netted \$70.55 on the tickets sold Sales Day. To Mrs. Ben Westendahl of the P. T. A. goes much credit for her organization.

DON INGLE WRITES FROM NEW ZEALAND

Under date of Sept. 18, from Tangitoria New Zealand, Don Ingle has written to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Ingle, as follows:

"Dear Dad, Mom and Marge: Please excuse me for not writing sooner. I intended to write at Fiji, but didn't get it done. The ship didn't furnish much of an atmosphere for doing anything but loafing and tearing around talking to all kinds of people!

"We were met at the dock in Auckland by Mr. Wards, who has done a tremendous job of organizing our program. We each will be in 12 areas of New Zealand. We are moving together as far as time is concerned, but will be in different areas. Right now we are 40 miles apart. Howard currently is expecting 12 hosts. I'm expecting 14. All our tickets are already purchased, hotel reservations made when needed, and we have 30 pounds spending money which is ours to spend on anything. We are expecting to make arrangements to attend the Royal Sidney Easter Show in Sidney, Australia, March 25-31, and then fly home. The ship schedules are not good and our time is limited because of Howard's wedding date and his time to report to the army, and the other boys' deferment is running out.

I am living in the same area as Gordon Downey, an IFYE who returned from the U. S. on the same ship. I traveled here from Auckland Sept. 15, 120 miles or so by bus to Dargoville, where Berry Smith, my host's 22-year-old son, who is local chairman of the Young Farmers Club, met me.

After picking up some work clothes, we went to a boys farm near where I'll be staying in about a week, and walked all over his dairy farm. After dinner we went to a YFC meeting where I gave my first talk — all with about 10 minutes notice.

In Auckland the Sunday before, we went to the Methodist Church, were invited to a Bible Study Class in the evening, where we each spoke for five minutes on the Churches in the U. S. Quite an initiation. We have been touring a lot of the country and meeting many people.

Tomorrow night we are going to a Nurses' sponsored dance. Saturday night to a dance honoring Gordon. Monday is a special program featuring yours truly at the local school. I have been almost freezing. The homes do not have central heating at all — only a fireplace in the living room — and maybe a small heater. It has been raining a lot — in bucketfuls for two minutes — then the sun shines brightly. It was a good day today, and the wind has died down.

My host is the Bill Smyth family. Both are very interesting and extremely pleasant and cordial. They breed Romney sheep, about 1400 with 1000 ewes; and Angus cattle, about 100 cows, 60 yearlings, 42 2-year-olds, on 900 acres of steep grass land. There are no crops grown here, it is all grass land. It is early spring, and the grass is about as green as it can possibly be. Mr. Smyth breeds cattle and sells feeders. He is very progressive and intensely interested in his work.

Oranges, grapefruit, prunes, mandrake oranges and lemons all grow here. Rugby is the national sport in New Zealand and the season is closing now. Gerry plays with a local team and today we went to a District YFC tourney of their game. They call it football. Here we saw North Auckland beat an Australian team, or I should say Australia's Star team, yesterday. I know what is going on now, and I hope to write a letter about it soon. Cricket and tennis start soon. I forgot to mention that Berry has three married elder sisters away from home.

Tomorrow we are going to dock some sheep. I'm becoming a sheep man fast, even though there are many beef and dairy cattle here. All milk from dairies is separated and the cream is used in butter making. The skim milk is fed to the pigs, which are sold at 140 pounds as "baconers." Pigs as weaners were selling at \$9.00 or less each, at the sale the other day. Cattle are sold by the head, and not by the pound, as is everything else.

I don't know if they sent out my first letter I sent in or not. It was on the ship and didn't have much meat in it. I hope to send one on sheep dogs, Rugby, and Gordon Downey in the near future. Did my first roll of films arrive? If anything is wrong, please tell me. I'm going to send a couple of films to Tom and the National 4-H Foundation for analysis and then have them send them on to you. — Cheerio Old Chaps, —Love, Don.


