TIGERS SIT ON TOP FOOTBALL PILE

Kendrick Tigers won the championship of the Second District 8-Man Football Conference at Weippe last Friday afternoon, winning from the Gorillas to complete an undefeated season.

It was the first loss for the Gorillas, who are now tied with the Troy Troans for second place, with four wins, a loss, and a tie each.

In winning the game Kendrick scored twice in the first quarter to take a lead Weippe could not overcome. Reggie Wegner passed to Gary Browning for 30 yards and the first touchdown, then took a pass from Robin Magnuson for the extra point.

Later in the period Weippe was forced to punt from its own end zone and Dick Cuddy blocked the kick. Wegner recovered the ball for a Kendrick touchdown.

Weippe scored late in the third period on a fourth-down, four-yard plunge by Les Bood. Wegner again hit Browning with a touchdown pass in the fourth quarter. Gerald Batten ran for the point.

The 20-6 defeat of Weippe came as no surprise to Kendrick High School rooters.

Kendrick Coach Dennis Racicot said Elk River had forfeited the game scheduled for Oct. 24th. Kendrick thus completed its season with a 7-win no-loss record. Mr. Racicot credited the defensive work of three linemen, Dick Ostman, Dennis Lohman and Jack Mabbott, with a major contribution to the unbeaten campaign record.

DEMOS HOLD RALLY

The Latah County Democratic Central Committee held an organized rally at the Kendrick Fire Hall last Thursday evening, October 16th, in the Firemen's Hall, with somewhere between 125 and 150 present.

Opening remarks were by Ralph Farmer, precinct committeeman of Moscow Precinct No. 4.

Group singing followed. Next came the introduction of precinct committeemen: Robert Chilberg, Kendrick; Benjamin Weatherly, Juliaetta; Richard Benjamin, Kendrick. Ben Weatherly, Juliaetta, introduced the candidates, who responded with a few remarks. They were as follows:

Harold Lough, State Senator, for re-election.

Melvin Alsager, State Representative, Moscow.

George F. Brocke, State Representative, Kendrick.

James O. Broyles, County Commissioner, for re-election.

Gerald A. Ingle, county commissioner, for re-election.

"Speed" Lange for sheriff.

William E. Swope, prosecuting attorney.

"Kay" Pell, county assessor.

Introduction by Doris Lawton of the Hon. Gracie Frost, U. S. Representative in Congress, First District.

Closing remarks by R. E. Magnuson, county chairman, Kendrick.

Mrs. Frost told of the record of the recent Congress. Mrs. Frost attacked the Eisenhower administration for what she termed continuously increasing prices in general and declining prices for farm commodities.

Mrs. Frost also spoke briefly on Allen M. Derr, Democratic candidate for governor, mentioning that one word (gambling) is overshadowing the other planks in his platform.

Melvin Alsager, Moscow attorney also mentioned Mr. Derr briefly.

Mr. Alsager said in part: "I've talked to a lot of people about the governor candidates, and some have said, 'I won't vote for Smylie but I also feel I can't vote for Derr because he's for gambling.'"

"I'm afraid some won't vote for either. I'll be watching the votes to see if there are less votes cast of governor than other candidates." He then urged all present to vote for one or the other, preferably Derr.

REPUBLICAN RALLY

The Republicans of Latah County are scheduling a series of rallies this week, beginning on Thursday, Oct. 23.

On that day, accompanied by Gov. Robert E. Smylie, they will visit Juliaetta at 9:30 a. m., Kendrick at 10:30 a. m.; Deary at 1:00 p. m.; Troy at 2:00 p. m., and conclude the day with a general rally in the University of Idaho auditorium at 7:00 p. m.

Of course, the complications that develop envelope everyone in this or that situation.


The play is to be presented on Oct. 29, in the K. H. S. gym at 8:00 p. m.





A COLUMNIST TELLS HOW MISTAKES GET INTO A PAPER

There must be a million different ways of making mistakes in publishing a newspaper, and soon or later an editor makes most of them. The worst of it is, his errors are spread out in the open for everyone to see — everything is down in black and white with no chance to renig. His nightmares concern typographical bloopers of assorted types. Recently a correspondent sent us an obituary. Usually these are rewritten but this one was sent back to the Linotype with only minor revisions. Only after publication was it discovered that our correspondent, a near relative of the deceased, had his funeral dated three days before death. It is not common to hear a proof-reader chucking to himself (or herself) in a newspaper office. For if you think some errors that get into the paper are funny, you should see some of those which don't — which are caught and corrected before publication. For example, we came close to having a "Mr. and Mrs. Itch" visiting friends over the week-end recently (Fitch). On another occasion a "cloud of haze on the horizon" came out a "cloud of hogs on the horizon," which would have been quite a sight. Illustrative of what a tremendous difference in meaning the substitution of one letter for another could make was a church announcement

that there would be "congregational sinning" on the next Sunday morning. That would have been a dilly. Maybe, some day, they will teach one of these robot machines to use Webster's and make proof readers out of them. However, it won't be in my time, I'm afraid. — The Bard, in the Albion (Ill.) Journal-Register.

ATHLETE'S FOOT NASTY

Boise — Athlete's foot is the common name for a fungus infection of the feet. Although the fungi may be found practically anywhere, they seem to be most prevalent on moist floors, such as shower and locker rooms connected with swimming pools and gymnasiums. This, of course, is the reason for the name.

The infection is a superficial one of the skin of the foot, especially between the toes, characterized by cracking and scaling accompanied by intense itching.

Control is difficult because the offending organisms are widespread in nature, and can be found in healthy feet as well as on the infected. Excluding infected persons (if known) from pools and shower rooms is of little value because such localities are never free of these fungi.

However, here are a few rules of foot hygiene which help prevent infection:

Avoid, if possible, contact of bare feet with floors in public places. Use foot clogs in public showers.

Dry feet well with a clean towel after bath, especially between the toes.

Wear clean stockings every day, and change them if the feet become wet.

If possible, alternate shoes, wearing one pair one day and another pair the next. The use of absorbent antiseptic foot powder may help.

Do not use remedies prescribed for other persons. Consult your own doctor.

TRITE SAYINGS

The truth, as the late Rudyard Kipling pointed out, is often twisted by knaves to make a trap for fools.

Driving carefully may not get you anywhere as fast as possible, but it will probably get you there safely.



WINTER IS A TIME OF REAL DANGER

Boise — The danger of carbon monoxide — the silent killer which claims many lives each year — is increased during winter months when ventilation from the outside is decreased and when there are more hazards from heating facilities and automobiles.

Carbon monoxide is formed when solid, liquid or gaseous fuel is incompletely burned. It may be produced during the burning process in space heaters and hot water heaters, during combustion of coal and oil in furnaces and stoves, and during the combustion of gasoline in automobiles. As temperatures go down, windows are kept closed in our homes and, frequently, in our automobiles. This increases the danger of carbon monoxide.

A few proper precautions can do a great deal to reduce the hazards of carbon monoxide. When operating a car, remember not to run the engine in a closed garage. Leave the car windows open a little when driving, even though your car may be equipped with a fresh air heater, as

leaks sometimes develop in the engine exhaust to allow carbon monoxide to accumulate inside the car. If you feel a headache or dizziness developing on a long trip, ventilate your car even more thoroughly. — you may be suffering ill effects from very small amounts of the gas. Don't run the engine when sitting in a parked car, either, unless the windows are open, and do have your car's exhaust system checked frequently for defects.

If you find a person overcome with carbon monoxide poisoning, open the doors and windows wide, and move the patient into the fresh air at once. If breathing has stopped, start artificial respiration immediately, call a doctor and get an inhalator as quickly as possible. When breathing is restored, keep the person as quiet and warm as possible.


