### STORE ENTERED

The Abrams Hardware store was burglarized sometime Saturday night or early Sunday morning. The sheriff's office at Moscow was notified, but to date no clues have been found.

This is the second time this year that this store has been burglarized, the other break-in being in February.

## WORD FROM HAWAII

Under date of Oct. 19, from Kohala, Hawaii, comes a most interesting letter from Mr. and Mrs. Charles Christensen and family, and we take the liberty of reproducing most of it:

Dear Bill and Floy: I thought I'd drop you a line to let you know about my work and something about the area in which we live. I'm in the Extension Service and my work deals with 4-H Clubs, ranches and gardeners.

There are eight major islands in the Hawaiian chain. The county (Kohala) is located on the island of Hawaii, which is the largest island in the group (area 5,000 square miles). The three large mountains in the county and bordering it are: Mauna Kea, which is over 13,000 feet; Hualalai, over 8,000 feet, and Kohala, over 5,000 feet. Kapauu, the town where we live, is a plantation community. Kohala Sugar Co. plantation has 12,600 acres in sugar cane and employs 700 workers. Sugar cane is a 2-3 year crop. This plantation produces seven tons of sugar to the acre. The county also has a large vegetable growing area which grows cabbage, head lettuce daikon (a radish about 2 feet long used for pickling by the Orientals), Chinese cabbage, celery, sweet corn, carrots and gobo (a root of the burdock used for flavoring by the Orientals). There are two large ranches in the county — Parker Ranch and Kahua Ranch. Parker Ranch has 285,000 acres and carries 35,000 cows and 2,000 horses and 5,000 sheep. They have 300 employees and ship about 600 steers a month to Honolulu. Most of their cattle are purebred Herefords although they keep Santa Gertrude's short-horns and Angus for experimental purposes and cross breeding.

Kahua Ranch has 30,000 acres and runs 6,500 cows. They have 15 cowboys. We also have 48 homestead ranches of 300 acres each and several independent ranchers and two dairies. The homestead ranchers run from 150 to 400 head of cattle on their 300 acres. The rainfall varies from over 100 inches in the windward side to 12 inches on the leeward side, so you can drive a few miles and get the weather you want.

The climate varies with the elevation from temperate to tropical. The game they hunt here is wild cattle, wild boars, goats, sheep, pheasants, turkeys, chukars, quail doves and wild pigeons.

We have many races in the county — Japanese, Philipinos, part-Hawaiians, Portugese and Haoles (that's what they call Caucasians).

Our favorite hobby is collecting sea shells. So far we have collected over 200 varieties — all collected alive. The fish here are very beautiful; they come in all shapes and colors. I watch them through my goggles and glass box when I am looking for shells. The only thing we have to watch out for are sea-urchins, with 5-inch spines and moray eels. Out farther there are barracuda and the sharks.

We have a new daughter named Charlene Lehuanaui, born Oct. 14. She weighed 6 pounds and 14 ounces. "Lehua" is the flower of Hawaii and "nau" means beautiful.

Honey is quite a big girl now. She surely enjoys playing with her little sister. — Aloha — Charles Christensen and family.



**GAMBLING**

In a Las Vegas casino, the wheels never stop, the dice never rest. There are no windows in the vast, low-ceilinged room to inadvertently reveal whether it is daylight or nighttime, no telltale clocks on the walls to point out an hour. So it is never day or night or any particular hour or time. The action is incessant. In the gambling pit there is nowhere to rest — no place to sit except at a blackjack or roulette table. . . . The croupiers, blackjack dealers, stickmen and money changers who handle thousands every hour make \$20 a day; but the pit boss, who is in charge of the whole operation, gets \$40. A cocktail waitress, working in the pit where the gambling is done, averages, including tips, \$100 a week. None of them has very much sympathy for the big losers. . . .

Unless you have a credit card, you cannot cash a check in a Las Vegas casino. If you apply on a week-day they will phone the bank in whatever city you have your account. On a week-end your chances are slight if not impossible. Yet the intake of checks is astronomical, and they are rushed out each morning on special planes — to the banks in out-of-state cities. If, after getting home, you remember that gambling in our state is illegal (and that gambling debts are uncollectable by law) and decide to put a stop to all those checks you signed in Nevada, chances are you'll find they've already been cashed. If not, and you put a stop to them, you will first get a letter demanding payment — after that, two visitors. At this point, or shortly thereafter, almost all of the would-be welchers pay up. . . .

Las Vegas has the highest crime rate in the country. Its police force is therefore three times as large as any other community's the same size. Its ratio of suicides is the highest of any city in the entire world. The victims are mainly desolate go-brokers. — Newsweek Magazine, Oct. 13, 1958.





**DON INGLE WRITES,  
IS IN NEW ZEALAND**

Dargoville, New Zealand  
Oct. 1, 1958

Dear Mom and Dad: I'm having little time to write. Am managing to keep a diary, record of talks, pictures, addresses, and special interests. My first district has been broken as I told you, but I have lived a very short time with my second host because I was staying with two other families. I attended a farewell dance the other night which really demonstrated what you can do to win friends in a strange country by being yourself and not afraid to try what the people have been doing. I have docked, earmarked and castrated sheep, and sheared sheep — which practically turned into a butchering session, run up hills and were myself out, and walked and walked over many farms. You eat many different foods, drink much tea, and have different meal schedules.

I'm thoroughly enjoying myself. So far this trip has been described as "on the ship" we only ate, slept and talked," and in New Zealand, "we are eating and talking." My hosts have been very good about the late nights — have even taken away my alarm clock, and some forgot to wake me up in the morning! One day started at 5:30 a. m. and I got home after a dance at 2:30 a. m. — but I didn't awaken until 11 — just in time to go to the local school to give two lectures. I have addressed 10 different groups containing some 500 people; 300 were in groups which viewed slides and heard talks. You should hear the questions they ask me.

I get a lecture every other day about butter exports and how the U. S. should subsidize the consumer instead of the producer. You see it costs over three shillings to produce the butter here, but it sells for 2 shillings, 28 cents per pound on the market. Butter is consumed in enormous quantities here and you never see margarine. Could you send me the prices you received for the NZ five beef which was shipped to the U. S. while I was on ship? A shipload of beef was shipped to the U. S. and I didn't hear anything about what happened to it after it reached the U. S.

I am now living with a young couple, who have a 6½-month old baby boy. Don is 25 and Wendy is 21. Gordon is the little boss. An interesting thing is that she is still nursing the baby, and the system is being encouraged in N. Z. Also she had the child by a system called "natural birth." This means that no anesthetic was given, and the husband was with her all through the time of giving birth. The idea is being advanced by an American Doctor Reed. I guess I hadn't heard anything of the procedure being advanced at home, but it does sound different! You very seldom see maternity uniforms on the street — the women usually don't wear them until 7 months pregnancy.

Don and Wendy are very interesting people. They live on a 360-acre sheep and cattle ranch. The land is all very steep and is all a very heavy clay which resembles our white hard pan for soil. With top dressings or fertilizers of 1½ tons of lime, 400 lbs. super phosphate and molidum traces per acre he is building top soil to raise grasses and white clover for pasture.

New Zealand is very keen in its views about politics and government actions. The Labor government is in power with Mr. Nash as Prime Minister. The Labor government has placed many trade restrictions, higher tariffs and complicated inconveniences for the farmer. Of course, all their policies will be passed because they are in power, and have a majority in the one house parliament. Nash wanted to go to the U. S., where he is right now, so he started pushing his policies through. The opposition, only one voter in minority, began objecting and filibustering so to speak. They were in session from 9:00 a. m. until 2:00-4:30 the next day. It was really interesting because the newspapers report a blow-by-blow account of everything. One member even told the Prime Minister he hoped his plane crashed enroute to the U. S. Anyway, parliament is still in session and M. Nash is in America!

Everything in New Zealand depends upon exports of meat, butter and wool. Each year the budget is based upon the income from exports. There is very little industry, and probably never will be because there are no raw materials here to speak of anyway. But the government is always talking about industry and forgets about farming — their real industry. They have a lot of fun, and we enjoy listening to them.

I have seen Howard three times recently. First it was at a dance, then at a bull sale, and then we toured the Moari treaty signing place, in Martangi. We will meet again Oct. 19 when we end our next stay in Auckland to travel to Wellington before moving to the South Island.

Some friends are coming to visit tonight, so better close. Have enjoyed very much your letters. It is difficult to keep up with the U. S. and its activities. We heard about Sherman Adams, and are still hearing about Formosa. — Cherrio, Don.

A goal of \$25,000 has been set for the 1958 fund-raising drive of the Idaho Chapter, Arthritis and Rheumatism Foundation, which starts Nov. 1, Frank Shinn, Boise, chapter president, said this week.

According to Mr. Shinn, this sum represents the minimum needed to provide vital services to the 40,000 victims in Idaho who are afflicted with arthritis and other rheumatic diseases. He added that the chapter has every expectation of reaching and surpassing the local goal because "the public has come to appreciate the magnitude of the arthritis problem which afflicts 11,000,000 Americans."


