HEATHS, KLOPHERS, SERIOUSLY HURT

A man and a woman were injured seriously in a two-car crash accident on the Lewis & Clark Highway at the Cheerylanes bridge at 4:30 Sunday afternoon.

A second woman was hospitalized, another man required medical attention, and a Clarkston minister, his wife and three children apparently escaped with only minor bruises.

Newton Heath, 67-year-old Cheerylanes farmer, and Mrs. Martin (Bertha) Klopfer, who lives on a neighboring farm, were reported in serious condition at St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston.

He suffered head and chest injuries and shock. Mrs. Klopfer had a severe scalp wound and back and ankle injuries.

Heath's wife, Mildred, who suffered head lacerations and a cut on her left hand, was reported in satisfactory condition. Mrs. Klopfer's husband, Martin, 74, had a laceration above his right eye.

Klopfer with his wife and the Heaths as passengers, was driving home from Lewiston and was turning left onto the bridge when a car driven by the Rev. Leonard G. Bernthal, pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church at Clarkston, struck the rear of the Klopfer car. Bernthal, with his wife and three children as passengers, was driving toward Lewiston.

Both cars spun around with the Bernthal vehicle crossing the highway and the Klopfer car coming to a stop on the bridge approach.

The back door of the Klopfer car came open and the Heaths were thrown out onto the pavement. State Patrolman Gordon Jones of Lewiston said the road was wet and slick when he arrived to investigate.

The Heaths and the Klopfers, who live across the Clearwater river from the accident scene, were brought to the hospital by ambulance. Both cars were towed here by wreckers.

Jones estimated damage of \$800.00 to Bernthal's 1955 Dodge and \$450.00 to Klopfer's 1956 Plymouth. Jones, who was assisted by State Patrolman Bert McGinnis of Orofino, said the investigation would continue.

He said traffic was not blocked by the accident. — Lewiston Tribune, Mon., Nov. 10.



OVERCOMES REAL HANDICAP

Bob Cain, Kendrick, is a shining example of what a man can do if he has the will and "keeps a stiff upper lip."

The crushing blow of losing his right leg above the knee four years ago could have left him sitting in a wheel chair for the rest of his life — but it didn't! A victim of sugar diabetes it became necessary to take the leg off when an infection developed due to poor circulation. He admits dark days followed and at times he felt his usefulness was over. The idea of being helpless, with time on his hands, was something he wrestled with in the year that followed.

"How foolish," says Mr. Cain. For he soon discovered that "Time" is not an enemy but a friend. It is an anodyne for suffering. For a while he was recuperating from the emotional shock and his body was healing, his mind was at work, and he knew his hands would soon be.

He began by fashioning slides or sled runners on a chair, so that he could "scoot over the ground" as he began spading their garden spot — 30x50 feet. Most folks, with two good legs would say it couldn't be done (especially his wife), but he did it and raised a vegetable garden that yielded everything from "A to Z." Of course the neighbors and members of the family gathered round and put in the seed — but he did the "ground work!"

Said Mr. Cain: "The more I looked around the more I saw that I could do, and decided I was a pretty lucky fellow," and set out to prove it.

He got so that he was using his crutches as if they were a part of him, but he needed a wheel chair — so he built a model in wood, using an old chair and bicycle wheels with small swivel scooter wheels at the rear. His son-in-law, Bruce Kidder, then took over and built from this model a steel frame.

"I'm no carpenter or cabinet maker," he said modestly, "but wood work has always been my hobby, and I have a little power saw and some hand tools that I can use with my two good hands." And in the past three years he has made a hope chest which he has given to his granddaughter, Doris Wilson. Also several end tables and a wardrobe for their home and built-ins for the family kitchen. He smiled and said: "I started out making picture frames and it just grew from there. All sorts of small things like clothes hampers, coffee tables and other items by the score come out of his work shop.

Living close to his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. John Wilson and family, "Grandpa" is called on to mend toys and repair a bike quite often. This he thoroughly enjoys — for he says there is no medicine like being useful.

His latest successful endeavor was the reshingling of his home. When asked how he negotiated a ladder, he laughed and said: "When you're handicapped you're thinking all the time of how to tackle something new. After trying I discovered I could climb a ladder by placing my stump on a rung, and my foot on another, and then pull myself up step-by-step. It really isn't hard."

Mr. Cain never asks for help, just tackles a job with grim determination — then neighbors, shocked by his grit, jump in and help him.

He said: "My neighbors and church friends have been wonderful." They say: "He's an inspiration to all of us."

Mr. Cain came to America in 1903 when he was 19 years old, from the Isle of Man, with six of his pals. The isle is small, 12 by 30 miles and is situated half way between England and Ireland, and residents there are known as Manxmen. He was one of a family of seven children, six sons and one daughter.

The island held no future for a young man, so all the boys left to "seek their fortune in America." All did not leave at once, but one by one, as if gathering courage to face new frontiers from the one that had gone before.

Mr. Cain, next to the youngest, is the only one left of the six brothers, in fact, the whole family. None of the boys ever returned to the isle.

When asked if he would like to go back he said: "Yes. My family is gone but I would like to see my old home. Perhaps there are some old friends left." Then he reminisced of his boyhood days, saying: "They were really hard days, even for a young lad. I worked in the mines and as a farm hand for 18c a day, and a long ten hours at that. It was a poor country and fish and vegetables were the main diet. One of the most beautiful sights I remember was the fishing fleet. When I wasn't too tired I would climb to a high cliff above the land I was working — to see the fishing fleet leave in the early morning with the tide. It was just as memorable to see them return in the evening as the tide came in."

"That was a long time ago, and although I was born there — America is my home."

Mr. Cain, now 75 years old, has lived in Idaho since 1906. He and his youngest brother came to American ridge after they had spent some years working in the iron mines in Michigan, Colorado, British Columbia and Arizona. Coming to Idaho they finally settled on a farm known as the "Eichner place," situated near the Harry Benscoter farm, and there they batched and farmed until Bob's marriage to Ada Roberts in 1912. She is a daughter of the late Henry Roberts. He and his bride then moved to the Toney Eichner place where they farmed for 45 years. They have two daughters, Mrs. John Wilson, Kendrick, and Mrs. Bruce Kidder of Plummer, and five grandchildren.

The family moved to Kendrick in 1947, and have lived in the west part of town ever since.
